

Douglass Crockwell, born in 1904, lived and worked in Glens Falls from 1932 until his death in 1968. He lived on

East Sanford Street.
Crockwell, much like his contemporary Norman Rockwell, was famous for his illustrative paintings created for the Saturday Evening Post, Life, Look,

Crockwell lived on Sanford Street and utilized local people as models. 
