Looking to capitalize on the exploding worldwide popularity of parimutuel pig racing, as well as tap Washington County's agricultural heritage, New York has okayed a year-round pig racing track and gambling casino to be built at the Washington County Fairgrounds, *The Chronicle* has learned.

"This will cause a boom in Greenwich such as we haven't seen in about a century," a state official told *The Chronicle*, although he pronounced it GREN-itch, not GREEN-WITCH. The Chronicle corrected him.

It's expected the track — and full-scale gambling casino — will draw upwards of 1,000 Chinese tourists a day, far more during the Lunar New Year celebrations (Feb. 19 in 2015).

The bettors will also be able to place wagers on the Demolition Derby during the Washington County Fair itself.

A key to the deal was that animal rights activists approved. Two activists will be employed at all times at the track, and the pigs will have access to fitness coaches, massage therapists and life counselors.

"This is far better for the pig," an activist

said. "Instead of being fattened up, slaughtered and ending up as bacon in a frying pan, these pigs will be in great shape, be gainfully employed and will have jobs after their racing days are over. A busy pig is a happy pig."

Retired pigs will become truffle hunters. Truffles, the underground tuber prized by chefs and food connoisseurs, are thriving now in Washington County and much of northern New York amid climate change.

Pigs find truffles, which will be another boon to the local foods movement.

"Local boars for locavores" is the marketing slogan already circulating among county restaurants and foodies.

Boar's Head Provisions is lead sponsor. The track will also address the growing feral swine — wild pig — problem afflicting New York State and much of the nation.

"The Greenwich pig racing track has committed to a non-stop outreach effort that will bring pigs in from the wild and train them as productive racers," said the state official. "A lot of these pigs that have gone wild — they only lacked for a good opportunity. Now they'll have it."
