"I've never gotten so many positive comments about anything" as about the new roundabout at the intersection of Aviation Road, Dixon Road and Farr Lane, enthused Queensbury town supervisor John Strough, at the

ribbon-cutting

celebration on Friday, Oct. 10.

Opened earlier this year, the roundabout "is a much more functional intersection, and it is a safer intersection for cars, walkers and bicyclists," Mr. Strough said.

The project cost of \$1.67-mil-

lion was split 80% federal, 15% state and 5% town. The work included sidewalks, crosswalks, lighting and landscaping.

Mr. Strough said that back in 2003, when he was campaigning door-to-door for the Ward 3 town council seat, he heard complaints "over and over" about the

intersection in its previous form.

Since then, he said, a series of studies, meetings, petitions and public hearings determined that a roundabout was the preferred alternative. The Adirondack-Glens Falls Transportation Council, the town, residents and
