# **Gordon: Medical marijuana helped me**


I'm all for medical marijuana, because it helped me tremen-

dously nearly 40 years ago.
In March of 1977, when I was 14, I was diagnosed with acute granulocytic leukemia. Back then, a diagnosis like that was pretty much a death sentence. The survival rate was 5% — five kids out of 100 made it.

I was in Albany Medical Center for six weeks. They bombed me with two types of chemotherapy, adriamycin and cytosar. It was a nasty poison cocktail. I got an infection in my hip from a poorly executed bone marrow test, and the infection almost killed me. I ran a fever of 105 degrees for a week, sleeping on a mattress that had ice water pumped through it.

They are among dozens of companies vying for five state licenses to grow, manufacture, distribute and dispense medical marijuana for patients being treated for cancer, epilepsy, Parkinson's disease, Lou Gehrig's disease and HIV/AIDs and other life-threatening diseases.
