

Some possible candidates might balk at the pay cut that being mayor entails.

The mayor's salary of \$56,650 is less than 43 city employees are paid, including 18 police officers, 18 firefighters, the City Clerk, Controller, Engineer, Assessor, and three employees at the Water & Sewer plant, make more.

Half the City's budget is taken up by paid police and fire departments; retired members get their health care paid for for life.

Glens Falls's aging infrastructure needs work, and 23.5% of the property in the city is tax exempt, owned by not-for-profits.

"Financially, the model is not sustainable," said Matt Funiciello, the once and future congressional candidate who operates the Rock Hill Bakehouse Cafe. (He lives in Hudson Falls.)
