Tom Jones's proposal to operate a jet-ski tour business from Twin Birches Cottages property on Lake George is drawing plenty of opposition from residents of Sunnyview Estates next door.

Mr. Jones and Twin Birches owner Jim Rose are seeking a Class A marina license so they can offer guided personal watercraft tours to their guests.

Sunnyview Estates residents have sent 18 letters opposing the project — to the Lake George Planning Board and Lake George Park Commission, which ultimately will decide whether to grant a marina license.

Contacted for comment, Mr. Jones said he hopes to operate four personal watercraft, three for clients and one for the tour operator. That's down from his original proposal of eight PWCs.
