years of the inspection program. "It was kind of a pretty good

'catch" by the inspectors, Mr. Wick said.

A fisherman had trapped the crayfish around the intersection



of Schoharie Creek and the Mohawk River, and "brought them up just as bait," Mr. Wick said.

One of the questions that we ask in the inspection process is, 'Do you have any bait on board?"" The fisherman said he had a bucket of crayfish.

The boat inspectors have cards identifying invasive species, including the rusty crayfish, Mr. Wick said. Other Commission staff confirmed the identification, and the bucketful was confiscated.

"The size and aggressive

behavior of rusty crayfish allow it to outcompete native crayfish and minimize predation from other fish," says the website of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC).

"....Rusty crayfish can also alter aquatic plant habitat and prey on fish eggs, further impacting native crayfish and fish populations."

DEC says, "The rusty crayfish (Orconectes rusticus) has spread to New York State from the cen-
