

Throng for women's march in Glens Falls

Saturday's Women's March in Glens Falls, in conjunction with the signature one in Washington, D.C. and others around the country and around the world, drew a crowd variously estimated at 800 to 1,500 people.

My own guess is upwards of 800, but fewer than 1,000.

It was an impressive showing from where I stood at Centennial Circle.

When the marchers started coming down both sides of Warren Street from their starting point at the Planned Parenthood building, they just kept coming.



They filled Centennial Circle, several bodies deep, beginning at the corner of Warren and Ridge, curved down and around nearly to the Burger King entrance on Glen Street and to Congresswoman Elise Stefanik's office on the other side (no coincidence), then up and around to Hudson Avenue.

They were women, men, chil-

dren, families, couples, groups of friends. Many carried preprinted signs supporting Planned Parenthood, or handmade cardboard signs with all sorts of clever messages touting women's rights, the Affordable Care Act, human rights, anti-Trump sentiments. Many wore T-shirts with politi-


Can we at least agree on this: President Donald Trump is a


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Restoring Lang Rig's conservatory
