

Lake Luzerne: 75th year of **Bennett's Riding Stable**

"My Uncle Willis [Bennett] always had horses," recalls Larry Bennett of Lake Luzerne. "As

a teenager, he worked in the woods with his team of horses."

Dude ranches were big in Lake Luzerne in the early 1940s.

"Apparently, my uncle saw the opportunity for expanding his horse interest" and 75 years ago, Willis started Bennett's Riding Stable in the Town of Lake Luzerne's Lake Vanare area.

Larry said it's still very much a family business, now owned and operated by his wife Bonnie, with their children and grand-



children also involved.

Willis "never bought a square foot of land in the area, he always leased it," said Larry, so the stable moved around a little, although not far from its present location on Lake Avenue (Route 9N) about 5 miles west of Northway Exit 21. The Bennetts own the land where the stable is now.
