Lymphoma breakthrough: Tina Bureau's new lease on life

"I didn't cry when I was sick, but now I'm crying and it's tears of joy," says Queensbury schoolteacher Tina Bureau.

Diagnosed a year ago with an aggressive non-Hodgkin's lymphoma that did not respond to chemotherapy, Mrs. Bureau accepted a chance to participate in an experimental immunotherapy clinical trial at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston.

The treatment, called Yescarta and made by Los Angeles-based Kite Pharma, involved drawing Mrs. Bureau's blood, separating out the specific T-cells, then reinjecting them after programming.

"The cells are engineered to attack just the cancer," says Mrs. Bureau. "It's like soldiers going into your body and killing the

Film Fest fantastic

The second annual Adirondack Film Festival — organized by the Adirondack Theatre Festival was a rousing success, electrify-

ing downtown Glens Falls. For two days and nights, Friday and Saturday, we were our own little Park City, Utah — Sundance Film Festival's home.

Sidewalks overflowed with filmmakers and

film-goers rushing to get on line for screenings, pausing to eat out, even doing some shopping.

Pass holders were everywhere, lanyards around their necks, swag bags over shoulders, annotated programs in hand.

They were all ages, skewed maybe a little artistic and urbane, an instant, friendly, energized movie-centric community. Who watches four movies in a day? This crowd did, and in many cases, wanted even more.

A total of 767 passes were purchased or distributed, far more than last year's 400, even surpassing event director Chad Rabinovitz's early estimates. That

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
