He long ran tiny **Getty station at Ridge & Rt. 149**; buys land, builds much bigger biz

For 25 years, Pakistan native Toby Sheikh operated the tiny Getty gas station and store at the northeast corner of Routes 149 and 9L in Queensbury — directly across Ridge Road from what is now a brand-new Stewart's Shop.

When Getty put this site and other far-flung properties up for sale, Mr. Sheikh purchased the 3.59 acres for \$230,920 in October 2014, according to county

records.

"I had an opportunity with the land, and I want to get the most out of it," he said. "It's a great location.

"My old store here used to do a lot of business in that 12 foot by 12 foot space."

Now Mr. Sheikh has constructed a 6,500 square foot
