The 15th annual Christmas Eve Road March founded by Retired Sgt. Arthur Coon, will take place Monday morning, Dec. 24,

beginning at 9 a.m. The four-

mile march in Glens Falls and Queensbury begins and ends at the Cool Insuring Arena downtown.

"We don't do a sign-up, so we are never sure of who is coming," says Sgt. Coon.

"We think last year was roughly 2,000 — and like I always say — to think that at the first one there were 10 of us. We have come so far. What a great community we have that has supported this for 15 years. Wow."

When Sgt. Coon started the march in 2004, local National Guard soldiers were still deployed in Iraq.

There is no cost to participate and it is "open to absolutely everyone," Sgt. Coon writes. "Soldiers, veterans, civilians, kids, dogs, and even strollers! Prizes awarded and will be announced as we get closer."
