Colvin at 206 Glen: \$945,000

The five-story Colvin Building at 206 Glen Street in downtown Glens Falls sold for \$945,000 on Jan. 4.

The buyer was Brian Bronzino's 206 Glen Street, LLC, represented by Candi Seiler of All-American Properties.

Through Mrs. Seiler, we requested to speak with Mr. Bronzino, but he declined.

The seller was the Steven David Tessler Trust. Mr. Tessler bought the building in March 1998 for \$173,000, records show.

The Colvin Building is currently assessed at \$530,000. Taxes are \$22,990.24, according to the real estate listing.

Listing agent was Craig Darby of CBRE-Albany.

The 35,100 square-foot Colvin Building includes

an elevator. The listing says the first floor is leased out to retail tenants, with "commercial tenants throughout."

Mr. Bronzino also recently bought the former Gold Star building at 18-22 Ridge Street (across from The Chronicle office) for \$330,000.

Beauty Bubble, a salon formerly in the Colvin Building, has moved to 18-22 Ridge and plans a grand opening on Friday, Jan. 11, 6 to 8 p.m., says its Facebook page.
