Jim Brock: Supervisors need common sense re: sales tax distribution

Dear Editor,

Common sense on how sales tax is given back to the taxpayers is in short supply on the Board of Supervisors.

Common sense should say that reducing the total tax burden for taxpayers is their first priority, but it isn't.

Common sense should say that those with the biggest tax bill should get the most help, but it isn't. Instead, many Supervisors have twisted the tax burden to mean only the town and County taxes should be considered — and not the biggest cost to taxpayers, school

Here is an example, comparing a single-family Bolton home at almost the average value of \$580,000 to the average family home in Queensbury in the Queensbury School District, where most residents live.

The Queensbury home, valued at \$225,000, less than half the value of the Bolton house, pays the same amount in total
