Fort William Henry to turn Towers Hall into 'Carriage House' for weddings, arts

The Fort William Henry and the Lake George Music Festival are collaborating on a plan to transform the vintage Towers Hall into

Aim to finish ized, atmospheric venue to be called the Carriage House —

suitable for large concerts as well as weddings, conventions and other gatherings.

"This is something we've been looking at for at least five years," Fort William Henry CEO Kathy Flacke Muncil tells *The Chronicle*. They've retained BBL Construction of Albany to create plans, including the renderings shared here.

Ms. Muncil said they hope to complete renovations by 2021, "or maybe the year after." She projects the cost between \$600,000 and "a million and a half, maybe \$2 million, depending on what we do for sound and such."

"It is a beautiful post-andbeam building from the 1800s," Ms. Muncil said. They've used it of late for large wedding receptions, banquets and conventions including an NRA gathering, Americade and the Adirondack Nationals Car Show.

The project is coordinating with Alexander Lombard's *Please turn to page 26*
