Now he aims to row across the Atlantic Ocean


— west to east, Christopher Columbus's 3,000 mile route following the trade winds from the Canary Islands off Morocco to Antiqua in the Caribbean next January through April.

"Joe was the smartest, gentlest, kindest person I know," said Amy Turcotte, at her husband Joe Turcotte's funeral on Thursday,

Oct. 3, at the Parish of St. Isaac Jogues in Chestertown. Mr. Turcotte, 38, of Brant Lake, was killed on Sept. 26 when the truck he was driving on the I-87 Exit 25 exit ramp
