

Boating & golf get NYS limited OK

New York State golf courses can open, marinas can operate, and recreational boating is now officially allowed, after New York's Empire State Development altered its rules Saturday.

Many restrictions still apply.

Airway Meadows Golf Club in Gansevoort opened on Saturday, said Joan Heber, who owns and operates the course with her husband James. She said it has been "very challenging and exhausting." Golfers must call ahead to reserve a tee time, and pay ahead with a credit card. No golf carts are used, and golfers may not enter the clubhouse.

No hugs for Betty: 'Nobody wants to kill grandma'

"I find it very difficult," says New York State Senator Betty Little about coping with the coronavirus crisis and living with the stay-at-home mandate.

At the age of 79, she has a large family — including 18 grandchildren; seven live locally — but there's no comforting embrace.

"My grandchildren don't want to come close to me," she says.

"They have a hug signal. Nobody wants to be 'the one who killed grandma.' That's what they're saying."
