So much has happened in the past week.

Governor Cuomo officially ended New York's school year.

He gave indication that his stay-at-home order will likely be lifted after May 15.

But he also established a high bar — a seven-point health **readiness test** — that a region must meet before non-essential businesses can reopen.

When he unveiled the checklist Monday, no region achieved a passing grade.

Mr. Cuomo laid out the phased order in which businesses would be allowed to reopen.

Phase 1, which already included manufacturing and construction, was expanded to allow "select retail —curbside pickup."

Phase 2: Professional services, finance and insurance, retail, administrative support, real estate/ rental leasing.

Phase 3: Restaurants/Food Services and Hotels/Accommoda-Please turn to page 8






In FE, drive-thru ice cream drew **Sunday throng**
