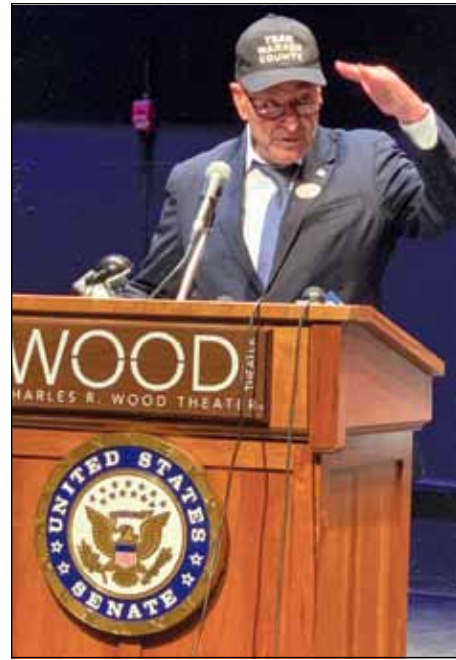
then in effect, they would check our county's COVID rate on the Tuesday prior to our scheduled arrival. If it was too high, they'd cancel our reservation and refund our deposit.

The pros & cons of adding a half-bathroom

When it comes to renovating a home, homeowners expect to spend money. No home renovation or home improvement project is free, but some are less costly than others.

The addition of a half-bathroom is a popular project among homeowners, and it won't necessarily break the bank.

If converting existing floor space into a half-bathroom, such a renovation can cost as little as a few thousand dollars, making the addition of a powder room one of the few home improvement projects where the value added to the home exceeds the cost of the renovation.

Before deciding to add a half-bathroom, it helps to consider some of the pros and cons of the project.

Pros

• **Convenience:** A half-bathroom is often added on the home's main floor or in the basement or attic. This makes it more convenient for guests to use the restroom during a dinner party or when coming over to watch the big game in a basement home-theater area.

• **Value:** Though an inexpensive half-bathroom addition might recoup its value and then some at resale, the project won't add as much resale value to a home as a full bathroom addition might.

• **Loss of storage:** If storage around the house is sparse, homeowners might be better off keeping the area designated for the half-bathroom as a storage closet instead of a bathroom.

Once the pros and cons have been weighed, homeowners who want to go forward with the project should then **check with the local municipality** to ensure the codes and requirements won't restrict their project.

Size or window restrictions might curtail the project or limit what homeowners can do, which might change their minds on the project altogether.

The addition of a half-bathroom often makes practical and financial sense. But before making any addition, homeowners must weigh the pros and cons to make the best decision possible.

Their dog in terrible pain; their gratitude that Warren County deputies took interest

Dear Mark:

Generally, we hear about the people in law enforcement only when they do something heroic or overstep their authority. My wife and I had an experience last week, however, that points to another aspect of that job — serving the public in situations that have nothing to do with crime or enforcement.

On Easter weekend, our 9-year-old German shepherd suddenly became unable to stand and was whimpering with what was obviously extreme pain.

That Saturday morning, it became obvious that we needed to get him to a vet, but we were faced with the challenge of how to transport him from the house to our car, both because of his weight (120 pounds) and our reluctance to aggravate whatever was affecting him.

Somewhat at a loss, I called the Warren County Sheriff's Department, hoping that they might know of anyone local who could supply us with a gurney or something similar (I was thinking of the local animal control officer, but he was unavailable).

A few minutes later, a Warren County deputy appeared at our door. Seeing Luke's situation and size, he said: "I'll get some reinforcements." Two others from the sheriff's department showed up, put a towel around Luke and carried him out to the car.

I didn't get anyone's name, but just wanted express my appreciation and offer a reminder that not all the interaction between the public and law enforcement is adversarial.

Mark Frost, who knows Mr. Laurant from prior correspondence, **replied:**

Thank you, Darrell. That's a quietly amazing story. We'll be glad to publish it. How is your German shepherd doing?

Mr. Laurant replied: Hi, Mark —

Thanks for asking. Sadly, he didn't make it — we got him to the emergency animal hospital, but it turned out he had a massively enlarged prostate — probably the result of cancer — that had cut off the blood flow to one of his legs and was causing a lot of the pain. Surgery was a possibility, but it would be very invasive and risk debilitating side effects. Plus, he was already showing signs of the hip problems that many older shepherds get. The vet spelled it all out, and we decided to have him put to sleep. ("I would do that if he were my dog," the vet told us). Luke was an amazing dog in many ways, and we will miss him greatly. (We do have two

Take the Home Builders' home maintenance quiz!

The National Association of Home Builders writes: Here is a home maintenance quiz that will test your maintenance knowledge. While this quiz does not address every home maintenance project, it does provide helpful tips and reminders for chores you may have overlooked.

1. How often do forced-air **furnace filters** need to be changed?
 Answer: At least every three months during the heating season.
2. What part of the **faucet** usually needs to be replaced when you have a water leak?
 Answer: The washer.
3. Should you run hot or cold water through your **garbage disposal**?
 Answer: Cold water.
4. How often should the moving parts of **garage doors** be oiled?
 Answer: Every three months.
5. What tools can you use to **unclog your drains**?
 Answer: A plunger and a plumber's snake.
6. What tool can be used to **unclog a toilet**?
 Answer: Coil spring-steel auger.
7. What **faucet part** needs to be cleaned every three to four months?
 Answer: Aerator — the screen inside the end of the faucet.
8. What can you use for **traction** on icy sidewalks, steps and driveways?
 Answer: Cat litter or sand — never use salt because it damages the pavement.
9. Where should the fire in your **fire-**

- place** be built?
 Answer: On the andirons or grate, never on the fireplace floor.
10. What will **prevent soot** and add color to the fire in your fireplace?
 Answer: Throw in a handful of salt.
11. Where should your **firewood** be stored?
 Answer: Outside, away from your house and not directly on the ground.
12. What helps keep unpainted **concrete floors** easy to keep clean?
 Answer: Concrete sealer.
13. What should you use to **clean unpainted concrete** floors?
 Answer: A solution of 4 to 6 tablespoons of washing soda in a gallon of hot water. Mix scouring powder to the solution for tough jobs.
14. When can you clean **hardwood floors** with water?
 Answer: When the floors have a polyurethane finish.
15. Do hardwood floors need to be **waxed**?
 Answer: Hardwood floors that do not have a polyurethane finish probably will need to be waxed periodically. Use liquid or paste "spirit" wax.
16. What is the best polish for **vinyl floors**?
 Answer: Water emulsion wax.
17. When is **basement condensation** at its maximum?
 Answer: In new homes because gallons of water went into the concrete of basement walls.
18. Why should **noisy water pipes** be fixed promptly?
 Answer: The condition that causes noisy pipes may be accompanied by vibration that can cause fittings to loosen and leak.

Warren County Airport solar farm proposed

Warren County's Floyd Bennett Memorial Airport is on track to host a two-part solar farm on its property. The County Board scheduled a **public hearing Friday, April 16, at 10 a.m.**, to move forward on its proposed contract with Boston-based firm Nexamp Solar.

The public may access the virtual hearing online via the County Website, www.warrencounty-ny.gov.

\$6.6-million for 25-year lease

Eight "proposers" replied to a request for proposals put out by County Public Works Superintendent Kevin Hajos and members of the Board's Facilities Committee.

"We chose the top three, sent them questions and held meetings with them," Mr. Hajos told the Facilities meeting on April 1.

The solar farms would be located on unused airport property — 28 acres to the north and 22 acres to the south, he said.

The committee is moving with some haste, as federal incentive "blocks" are limited "and they fill up quickly," Mr. Hajos said. He said Nexamp will need a letter of intent from the Board to apply for those cost-saving incentives.

\$206,000+ annually for 25 years

Some contract specs, from the meeting: The contractor will pay the county \$170 a month during the construction period.

Once the solar farm is completed, the lease is \$3,765 per acre annually for the 28 acres to the north, and \$4,607 per acre for the 22 acres south — with a 2 percent "escalator" or built-in increase per year.

"That's a combined lease revenue of approximately \$206,838 per year, and about \$6.6 million total of revenue coming in to the airport over the 25 year contract," Mr. Hajos said.

Facilities Committee chair Brad Magowan said, "That is a lot to offset county costs for the airport, with land that is otherwise just sitting there."

They plan a 25-year lease, with an option to renew for five additional years. The installer would assume removal costs, if needed, at the end of the project.

Mr. Hajos said he expects the project will take 12 to 18 months to complete, as stated in the request for proposals.

He noted that the county negotiated a simple lease per acre fee, rather than a power sharing arrangement with the company, which is more typical.

Crandall reopens

Crandall Public Library planned a "soft" opening Tuesday of this week and an official opening with "a party atmosphere" for Tuesday, April 13, for the next phase of its post-Covid offerings.

"We are so excited," library director Kathy Naftaly tells *The Chronicle*. "People can finally come in to browse the children's area and the stacks. We will have Internet and computer stations, but fewer, socially distant."

The library will be open for browsing on the first and second floors, Tuesdays and Wednesdays 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Thursdays through Saturdays 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.,

"We are not encouraging lingering," Mrs. Naftaly said. "No comfortable chairs and only a few tables with seating."

There will be no public restrooms. "We don't have enough staff to guarantee keeping them clean," she said.

Admission will be limited to 50 people at a time — not including staff. Once in, how-

ever, patrons may stay as long as necessary. Visits will not be timed as was recent practice, when the limit was 10 at a time.

In order to keep count, entry will be through the Glen Street entrance only.

The Crandall Park door will serve only as an emergency exit.

"We will be closed on Mondays for disinfecting," Mrs. Naftaly said. "Of course, we will be disinfecting every day but that is our opportunity to make sure *everything* is fully disinfected."

Some children's and adult programming is planned in late spring and early summer — all outdoors, in City Park — "no in-house programs," for now, Mrs. Naftaly said.

Plans, not finalized, include the "beloved" Teddy Bears Picnic, outdoor story-times and summer reading programs with live animals or STEM (science, technology, engineering math) projects.

Charles Barkley on race & politics

Charles Barkley, the Alabama-born Basketball Hall of Famer now a hugely popular TV commentator, spoke his mind once again on "Inside the NBA." He said:

"Man, I think most white people and black people are great people. I really believe that in my heart. But I think our system is set up where our politicians, whether they're Republicans or Democrats, are designed to make us not like each other so they can keep their grasp of money and power. They divide and conquer."

"I truly believe in my heart most white people and black people are awesome people, but we're so stupid following our politicians. Whether they are Republicans or Democrats — and their only job is, 'hey, let's make these people not like each other. We don't live in their neighborhoods. We all got money. Let's keep the whites and blacks not like each other, let's make rich people and poor people not like each other, let's scramble the middle class.' I truly believe that in my heart."

Patten's apt. plan tabled again

Chronicle Chief Operating Officer Sandra Hutchinson writes: The City of Glens Falls Planning Board at its April 6 meeting again tabled — for both site plan and architectural review — Chris Patten's proposal to develop a 21-unit apartment building on the current lawn at the corner of Bay and Glen Streets.

During public comment, Judy Calogero, who said she represents a group of concerned citizens and the Glens Falls IDA, said that under the city code's density requirements, only 9.5 units could be built. She said that to allow 21 units, the lot would have to be more than double its size.

She also urged a "shadow study" to assess impacts on neighboring Church of the Messiah, particularly its Tiffany stained glass windows. She called for hiring a historic preservation expert to advise on design.

Other citizens argued to retain the property as green space, asking Mr. Patten to construct his project elsewhere downtown.

Attorney Jonathan Lapper, representing Mr. Patten, said that if the city imposes a density requirement on this project that it would be acting selectively. He says the city did not enforce the requirement on several other major projects, such as 14 Hudson.

Planning Board architectural consultant Dan Brown said a number of items were incomplete in the site plan application, including surface contours and signage. He also expressed concern about the impact on vehicular traffic if the parking lot entry is built as proposed, across from Maple Street. The city engineer also filed comments about a potential increase in traffic accidents if the entry and exits are built as proposed.

Ultimately the board unanimously tabled the site plan review and said it will provide a list to Mr. Patten of needed items and information.

The board discussed the architectural review application but found details missing from the computer generated drawings. It tabled the review pending receipt of improved and more detailed elevation drawings.

LGA members OK FUND merger

The Lake George Association and FUND for Lake George said Tuesday that 98% of the LGA's membership that voted — 745 of 760 — approved merging the two organizations "to create a new, preeminent Lake protection organization" that will take the LGA's name.

"The approved merger plan will now go to the Office of the New York State Attorney General for final review and approval," said the joint press release.

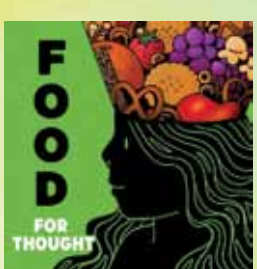

Doing her own painting in redo leads to chalk paint & Saratoga Workshop

As part of a whole house renovation that started in February 2020, my husband and I decided to reuse many pieces of furniture we already owned, but update them with paint. Since the task would fall to me, I didn't want laborious projects that would stretch for weeks.

Through watching lots of online videos, it seemed that chalk paint was the way to go because there would be minimum preparation, easy application and quick clean up.

Chalk paint is somewhat of a misnomer: there is actually no chalk in the paint. It's a latex-based paint that results in an ultra-matte finish that looks like chalk. There are many brands available, from ones carried at major discounters or the hardware store to the more exclusive boutique brands in specialty shops that can cost almost \$40 per quarter gallon.

A few weeks ago an ad popped up in my Instagram feed for the Saratoga Chalked Painting Workshop. I emailed owner/instructor Pam Krison to schedule a one-on-one teaching session and drove to her workshop off Gick Road in Saratoga on a recent Saturday afternoon.

Pam started her business 2 1/2 years ago because she hated to see furniture end up in the landfill and saw the satisfaction people got when they could revive pieces they already owned. Since the pandemic hit a year ago, Pam said she has seen interest in furniture painting increase "probably four times" because DIYers have the extra time to devote to the hobby. And like me, many want hands-on instruction.

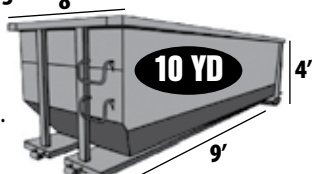
I was told to bring an easily transportable piece to work on but I actually brought two: a small occasional table and an oval maple-framed mirror. I explained to Pam,

 who sells Dixie Belle Mineral Paint, that I was looking for a smooth-as-glass finish. Earlier that week the company released its new Silk line — made up of cool, muted neutrals — which promised to give that flawless surface I wanted. Its selling points were minimum prep work, a built-in blocker, primer and top coat, and if you used a dark color, you might get away with just one coat. Best of all, unlike some chalk paints, you don't have to thin the paint or mist the paint brush with water. I chose the colors Deep Sea for the mirror and Black Sands, which retail for \$25 each for 16 ounces. Pam laid out all the materials I would need and explained and demonstrated each step before I took over to clean, sand and finally apply a first coat. Within about 15 minutes, the first coat was done on both pieces, although it would take two hours to properly dry, taking up the remainder of my appointment. In the meantime, I asked Pam about techniques she used on furniture she had for sale or commissions she was doing for others. She showed me how to use a product called Gator Hide, a water-repellent sealer

that would give my table extra protection from scuffs, and sent me home with small containers of paint to apply the final coats because I wasn't convinced they could be completely covered with just one. I also bought some decorative paper to decoupage a wooden tray that's been languishing in the basement. The newly painted table and mirror are paired in my front entrance hall and I like the results; they have what my designer friend would call a "curated" look. I'm sold on the Dixie Belle line, too, and am looking around the house for more projects to try. **For more information:** Visit Saratoga-workshop.com or call 518-937-1315. weekend we had.

Grafton is on the way to nowhere. From Manchester, we drove 30 miles east past Londonderry on State Route 30, then Route 11; then 10 miles southeast on Route 121.

In Vermont, its being a state highway doesn't mean it's a paved road. Route 121 wasn't. And it was mud season.

Rutted, mushy, slippery enough that the chance of running off the road or bogging down was real. Can't drive fast, but don't want to risk going too slow.

We had a big laugh when along the way through the woods we passed an AAA sign in front of a house, presumably where a tow truck operator lives. We told ourselves, at least we know where we can turn for help — although we wouldn't be able to call for it. No cell service on our phones. We found out later only AT&T reaches around there.

The road was passable, but on the return home Monday we opted to take the longer, paved Route 35 back to Route 11.

Grafton, 76 miles from Glens Falls, isn't on the way to anywhere, which is its charm but was almost its demise.

In the 19th century it thrived with production of cheese, wool and soapstone quarried on Bear Mountain. As those industries faded, Grafton did too. The population dwindled, the town withered.

Enter Dean Mathey, Princeton-educated "successful New York financier who [as a youth] spent summer vacations with his cousin, Matt Hall, in Grafton."

In 1963, Mathey established the Windham Foundation, which bought and restored the inn and numerous other houses and buildings — and set about making Grafton a viable, attractive destination.

Mr. Mathey died in 1972 at 81, but the Windham Foundation continues its mission "to preserve Vermont's rural way of life," in Grafton and elsewhere.

The Inn and town are wonderfully low-key, friendly and genuine. There are extensive trails for hiking and snowshoeing. The inn has bicycles for guest use. The Inn's

1801 Restaurant and Phelps Barn Pub are open to the public as well as to guests. Our room rate included one night's dinner and daily breakfast. The inn was just a short stroll through our backyard to get to.

Our dogs appreciated having a backyard, which has a grill like you find on a Lake George picnic site and a bag of charcoal was there for us. Nice back porch too.

We enjoyed our dinner at the inn. Another night we ordered the daily take-out dinner — this night it was chicken marsala — offered by the market around the corner. The privately owned store is in the mercantile building the Foundation owns.

Our fireplace was large and ready for instant use — just light the match; the kindling, wood and paper were prepped. There's a vintage pot arm once used for cooking. On the front porch was plenty of good, seasoned firewood. We used a lot of it, particularly Sunday, when it rained and the wind blew hard most of the day.

It was perfect. As Hutch is now telling people, it inspired me to skip my usual fare of news and sports and read a novel. The inn and its houses have WiFi available — until, on Sunday, the power went out in

the wind and rain for a couple of hours.

At that point — Sunday afternoon — the inn was actually closed for business, the start of a 10-day mud season shutdown. But because we were already in our house, they let us stay over even though we may have been the only lodgers still there.

Another thing we prize about Vermont is that they trust you not to be an imbecile. The only guidance at the fireplace was "Please Open Damper Before Lighting Fire." In New York, we'd have expected 27 warning clauses that would have ended in a ruling that you couldn't actually use the fireplace.

The Grafton library was at the other end of the block where our house was. Hutch moseyed in and had a nice conversation with the friendly librarian, who let her take a book for the weekend on the history of the Windham Foundation.

The Foundation headquarters is a short walk away, adjacent to a pond that says

"Swim At Your Own Risk," "No Diving" and "Fishing Only by Children Under 12." Just up the hill is the local elementary school.

The Foundation re-launched Grafton Cheese as an additional economic development effort. The pandemic has curtailed its operation in the town, though its cheese shop in Brattleboro is said to be doing well.

There's a nice little home furnishings

store and a blacksmith shop, too, but Grafton is not a shopping destination.

It's a relaxation destination, and that's exactly what we did. We hope to get back to "our house in Vermont" with both our dogs, both our sons and maybe more friends and family too.

Several other houses are also available.

The Innkeeper told us, though, that in normal times, on most weekends May through October, all the rooms — in the inn and houses — are frequently taken entirely by a wedding. For Vermont enthusiasts, this would be as nice a destination as a wedding entourage could hope for.

eligible for their own, DIRECT, federal pandemic relief, thanks to a provision he championed," said the press release distributed after the senator spoke.

The Senator wore a "Save Our Stages" mask. Warren County Board chair **Rachel Seeber** presented him a **Team Warren County cap**, which he then also wore.

The \$1.9-trillion American Rescue Plan includes "\$15 billion to create the Save Our Stages program after Schumer's tireless effort to pass it into law," said the press release. "The application process for the \$16.25 billion program begins... April 8."

The Senator detailed other aid specifically designed for restaurants.

He touted the Rescue Plan's anti-poverty impact. "Researchers have said that the American Rescue Plan will cut the child poverty rate in half, which is important for the 14% of children in the Glens Falls region living below the poverty line."

The senator's statement said that the direct payments of **\$1,400 each** to people below the income threshold **will result in "\$144 million in direct payments for nearly an estimated 58,000 households** in the Glens Falls MSA" — Metropolitan Statistical Area, encompassing **all of Warren and Washington Counties**.

The Senator said the law makes the Child Tax Credit "fully refundable and increases the credit amount from \$2,000 to \$3,000 per child age 6 to 17 — and \$3,600 per child below the age of 6."

It also "Strengthens the Earned Income Tax Credit...for childless workers, many... in lower-paid but essential jobs on the frontlines of the...pandemic response."

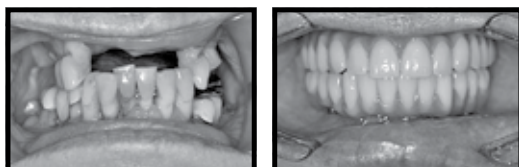
"As part of the deal," Senator Schumer's statement said, "more than \$23.8 billion in state and local aid will be going to New York with more than \$30 million going directly to the Glens Falls region — including **\$12.23 million for the city of Glens Falls**, over **\$12.40 million for Warren County** and over **\$11.87 million for Washington County**. New York State government will receive over \$12 billion, solving the state's budget woes."

It said the senator was "able to secure more than \$7 billion in transit funding for New York, with **\$407,614 [for] Greater Glens Falls Transit**" and **"\$59,000 for Floyd Bennett Memorial Airport."**

"As Majority Leader," said Senator Schumer's statement, "I fought hard to ensure this deal sent real relief to the tune of \$100 billion to New York for workers, families, farmers, healthcare, small businesses including our hard-hit industries like restaurants, and communities in Warren and Washington Counties — the things we need to support in order to weather this crisis and then work to recover."

ily Murphy, executive director of the Wood Theater. "We also appreciate that all along, no matter what her plan was, Martha always intended for the Wood to be included."

Ms. Banta told *The Chronicle* Tuesday, "We've been following whatever the state has been allowing." New regulations announced Friday allowed the company "to switch gears, and do all the necessary things" to perform indoors, she said.

ATF's season will run four weeks, from July 19 to August 15. That is down from its usual recent seven-week seasons.

Ms. Banta co-founded ATF in 1995 with her now-husband David Turner. She's returned to take up the reins after director Chad Rabinovitz stepped down this winter.

She says ATF plans to announce the shows and launch ticket sales at the end of April or the first week of May. They plan two main stage shows, not the typical four.

"One will be a play, comedy. The other a musical offering...more than a cabaret, not a book musical but something fully staged," Ms. Banta says.

ATF is also collaborating with Crandall Public Library to present its usual PB&J children's matinee show outdoors in City Park, for free — bring your own lunch.

They'll also offer a new play reading.

The theater will operate at 33 percent capacity — 97 socially distanced seats per show "in sets of 2 or 4," Ms. Banta said, with "spacer" seats blocked off.

To avoid the indoor lobby "crush," Ms. Banta said she envisions pre-performance "Shows on the Side."

"We will string lights in the alleyway between the Wood Theater and SPOT Coffee, and set up a sort of outside lobby on the sideway and alley, with a musical person or people, local performers, each night."

Ms. Banta said sponsorship sales are going well. "We've heard from several large donors, including Glens Falls Hospital, StoredTech and SUNY Adirondack, that they are back in."

Last year, due to Covid, ATF scrapped the entire summer season it had announced in January, instead launching the "In the Box" series of in-real-time interactive shows from autumn to late winter.

Yes, Film Fest — but Jess departs

Ms. Banta said in an earlier interview that the Adirondack Theatre Festival is committed to continuing the Adirondack Film Festival launched by Mr. Rabinovitz.

However, Jess Levandoski, who from the start programmed the film festival alongside Mr. Rabinovitz, "decided not to do it without Chad," Ms. Banta said.

Ms. Banta said she is reaching out to connections of her own who are experienced in running film festivals. "We are in the process of finding someone for that."

This will be the Film Festival's fifth year. It takes place in October.

Wood Theater exceeded fund goal

The return of the Adirondack Theatre Festival will be the Wood Theater's "first big production," since Covid shut the Wood down last March, director Emily Murphy

says. "It's the first one we're certain of."

"We'd like to start showing movies, hopefully in May," Ms. Murphy said.

"There is some talk of Broadway Upstate (the children's theater company) doing a showcase, and of the Dance Center of Queensbury performing their show here. But the regulations are so new. Everybody wants to just sit with it for a minute."

Meanwhile, the Wood had a successful two-part fund-raising campaign with a goal of \$100,000. "We raised \$44,000 with the first part, and then an anonymous donor offered a match of up to \$25,000 for any donations through March, and Tom and Sally Hoy matched that with \$25,000 as well." (Mr. Hoy, then-Glens Falls National Bank president, headed the Partners for Progress effort that built the theater.)

"We raised \$138,000 total," Ms. Murphy reports — enough to bring all three Wood staff members back on, full-time, to prepare for the reopening events.

She said the Wood will apply for about \$100,000 through the \$16.25 billion Save Our Stages program in President Biden's American Rescue stimulus legislation.

GF Park Theater marks Year 3, Sat.

The Park Theater in downtown Glens Falls marks its third anniversary with an **open house on Saturday, April 10, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.**

It's a joint celebration with Epithet Floral — owned by Park Theater hostess Emily Rubin — which is marking its one-year anniversary as a business.

Complimentary food and drinks, a cash bar and music by Pat Decker.

It's free, open to the public for walk-ins, with capacity limited to 150 people at a time, and Covid protocols in place.

The press release said the Park Theater & Doc's Restaurant are partnering with Epithet Floral for events and weddings. An event coordinator will be on hand at the open house as well.

The Park Theater reopened in 2018, after a \$3 million renovation by owner Elizabeth Miller. They look forward to "furthering their contribution to the expansion and vibrancy of downtown Glens Falls," said the release. Info: www.parktheatergf.com or call 792-1150.






