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## Uncas Island on Lake George

Uncas is a state-owned island consisting of 14 campsites on

six acres. It is located just west of Glen and Phantom Islands and south of Big Burnt.

Families who camped here every year, one named Geffen.

The island was **named** 

for Chief Uncas, the hero in James Fenimore Cooper's classic novel, **The Last of the Mohi**cans, in which Lake George played an important role.

In 1883, L. H. Fillmore of Ticonderoga established a photo studio on Uncas, specializing in scenes of Lake George. He also constructed a crude but functional darkroom which he made available to other amateur photographers. In addition to his photo finishing services, he also

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
