

LG small vessel charter boat biz booms

Lake George charter boat tours in small vessels are very much on the rise.

There are now 56 approved tour boat operators on Lake George and the number

only increases, said Dave Wick, executive director of the Lake George Park Commission, in response to a Chronicle inquiry.

Mr. Wick said three were added in recent months. "We only started tracking charter boats within the last few years," he notes. "Traditionally, we would

renting boats



only oversee marina operations that would run the full size tour boats," rather than the trending "tour boat operations that are in your standard 26-foot Cobalt."

"From a public safety standpoint," says Mr. Wick, "we think it's definitely an improvement over increasing rental fleets of the marinas that we have around Lake George. So we see that as a positive. We haven't really seen a lot of negatives from it yet."

Mr. Wick says, "We strongly prefer tour boat operators over

rental boats, because you have a licensed captain. We know where they're working out of. And we have a record of them....

"Anybody that's new, or relatively new, has to go through the commission process to essentially be operating as a tour boat on Lake George. It also helps make sure that they have insurance, that they have the regular public vessel operator's license, those types of things."

Don Daley who owns Lake George Island Boat Tours, said, "The biggest issue that we pro-Please turn to page 8

Schools' plan: 'In-person 100 percent,' masks, more

When the school year starts in Septembers, students will be heading to class.

"We know one thing for certain," says South Glens Falls Superintendent Kristine Orr. "100% of our students will be in person, 100% of the time." She

said, "We can't wait to see 100 percent of our students, pre-K to high school, in the fall.,

Gueensbury Superintendent Kyle Gannon says, "While many questions remain," as to state and federal directives

and lederal directives regarding Covid, "our district anticipates schools will reopen at full capacity. Our goal remains to keep students in school full-time."

Glens Falls is "back 100 percent, with masks, no hybrid" classes, **Superintendent Paul Jenkins** said. "Every student comes to school every day." He said gyms and cafeterias will be back to full capacity.

New **Hudson Falls superintendent Dan Ward** says the mission is to run "as open as possible, safely. We're looking at 100% in-person learning five days a week for all students."

Students and teachers will be required to wear masks, with some variations.

Mr. Ward said, "If we didn't have to be masked, we wouldn't be. If there's a time... transmission rates dropped really low, our hope would to be not masked."

He said, "We took them off for the greater portion of the summer school period. And then we had to put them back on." "So it's not a sentence for the whole year,"

"So it's not a sentence for the whole year," Mr. Ward added.

Mr. Gannon said Queensbury will enforce three-foot distancing in all indoor classrooms, but offer "alternate row mask breaks" throughout the day — "protecting everyone" by effectively creating six-foot distancing between unmasked students and staff at any moment.

Queensbury will require athletes and spectators to be masked at all times for indoor sports. Outdoors on the field, players can remove their masks.

Glens Falls's Mr. Jenkins said, "We can't require, but we are **encouraging vacci-nations** for everyone."

South Glens Falls's Ms. Orr said, "Vaccinations continue to be the highest thing we can have happen to safely reopen."

She said more than 40 percent of eligible students, ages 12 and up, are vaccinated.

Ms. Orr said the district respects family choice in the matter but hopes to see the percentage rise "before the start of school."

Mr. Gannon said Queensbury students "fared pretty well" in mathematics, despite the pandemic, but **reading and writing** *Please turn to page 13*

ager Rebecca Breese.

We're coming back bigger and better than ever,' Mrs. Breese says.

The jam-packed schedule will see the full return of the demolition derby, rodeo, tractor pulls, grandstand activities, livestock shows, daily entertainment, 4-H animal displays, the BOCES Demo Tent and more.

The Big Push live cow-birthing observation spectacle returns Saturday-Sunday.

"Witness the miracle of life unfold," overseen and narrated by veterinarians and farmers, touts the Fair. "It is our hope to have a total of six births over the weekend, but much will depend on Mother Nature."

Mrs. Breese estimates "over 700 animals" will be shown at the Fair this year, including cows, sheep, goats, rabbits, and more. "With some of our animals, like poultry specifically, our numbers are up."

"Depending on the breed we're pretty consistent across the board," with the number of registered animals in pre-pandemic years.

Rest assured, said Mrs. Breese: Fairgoers can still pet farm animals - with permission of the farmer. The fair encourages hand-washing after petting an animal and after leaving a barn housing animals. Agriculture exhibits remain a steadfast

Heartless & incompetent

I am heartsick at the disaster President Biden has wrought in Afghanistan.

I can accept his decision to end U.S. military involvement, but there is no justifying or rationalizing the irresponsibility in how he abandoned the mission, directly jeopardized Americans, our allies and countless Afghans

who trusted us. Plus, he sent a message to the world that will surely invite enemies to test and attack us.

He had months, even years to prepare. People warned him. What's the exit strategy? How are you at least going to en-

able good people to escape?

"I've been asking the administration for a refugee evacuation plan for months," **Congressman Seth Moulton, Democrat** of Massachusetts and a former captain in the Marine Corps, was quoted in Monday's *New York Times*.

"I was very explicit: **'We need a plan. We need someone in charge.'** Honestly, we still haven't really seen the plan. They had weeks of opportunity. They had an amazing coalition of liberal and conservative lawmakers who were willing to support the administration in this effort. In my mind this was not just a national security mistake, but a political mistake too."

There were Biden and company, just days and hours ago, assuring us they had the situation well in hand.

Then every city and the Afghan capital Kabul quickly fell. Clueless, incompetent. Ideologues living in a bubble. How many more things are they ignorant about? They green-lighted Russia finishing its Nord Stream

2 gas pipeline to Germany. It makes this essential ally dependent on Putin and puts the screws to Ukraine, too.

Even as the Biden Administration tries to thwart our own fuel industry, it pleads with OPEC to pump more oil. The Biden Administration revives Obama's folly seek-

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Charter small boat tours are booming on Lake George; **LGPC:** Safer than rentals

mote is when you come out with a captained vessel, you're going out with somebody safe. When you go rent your own these are the people that run into the rocks because they don't know Lake George."

Mr. Wick does cite one source of tension. "With the proliferation of a lot of the charter...tour boat operations...they started picking up a lot of people at the town docks, up in Bolton, down here in the village. And so, we're getting some calls from the supervisors, the Mayor, saying, 'Hey, this isn't okay. These people are taking up dock space waiting to pick up customers."

Mr. Wick said, "We met with all the tour boat operators on Lake George, I guess maybe three years ago, and said any existing charter that can show they've been in business for a few years, we'll just get them an operating permit."

Hearing from some of the LG tour operators

The Chronicle spoke with several charter tour boat operators.

"All our cruises are private and custom, so there's no preset route. There's no prescribed narration or anything. It's more of

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a cruise and a boat ride, a historic tour by any means," said **Ron Miller**, who is in his ninth season as owner/operator of Love is on Lake George cruises.

"I am a little niche market. Classic lake cruiser with doesn't do water sports."

Mr. Miller said, "When I started, there were fishing charters. And a couple of resorts had a boat. So they would have a PV [public vessel] as a resort. There weren't that many, just a handful of people doing what we're doing now. Which is just offering yourself up for boat rides and tours on the lake. It's really exploded."

Don Daley owns Lake George Island Boat Tours. "Well, last year was a record year. And this year we're actually a little bit above last year," he says. "I wish I had 10 boats." He has two, plus a backup.

From Mechanicville, Mr. Daley said he started his tour business three years after retiring. "I have a house on the lake. And I started this back in 2016 when I said, You know, I like history. I like being on the water...let me turn this into a little business. So my kids kind of set me up with the website, and one thing led to another and it is now booming."

"We customize our trip. Yes, they can bring whatever they want to eat drink on the boat, as long as they're of age. They can drink alcohol, but we don't provide any of that. We have coolers on the boat.'

Carol Mcintosh is Vice President of ADK Boat Tours. It's in its third year and operates three boats. "We have a 2021 28-foot Sea Ray. We have a 2020 22-foot Mastercraft. And we have a 2012 25-foot Mastercraft," said Mrs. Mcintosh.

"My son is a captain and he does the tours. And then we have a couple of other captains that we hire ... "

"A lot of people like it," she says. "They like to go out and enjoy themselves and not have the stress of driving a boat, or being able to have a drink and not worry."

Concerns: Unlicensed operators, crowding; declining dock space

The three charter operators The Chronicle spoke with all brought up concerns about unlicensed tours.

Mrs. Mcintosh at ADK Boat Tours said, "The Park Commission has been incredible with trying to cut down on the amount of people that we always refer to as 'poachers.' In August, I'm taking probably 60 calls a day. And you can't fill all the spots you know, we get booked. And so people are out there just looking any way they can to get on a boat.

"So they don't know that the person coming to pick them up hasn't been inspected through the Park Commission or doesn't have a PV license or the insurance."

Mr. Daley at Lake George Island Boat Tours makes the same point.

"There's a lot of — I don't know what the term would be — illegals. What happens is there's people who are not public vessels that have boats. And they're out there. And they're either getting it from referrals, or from the people who rent boats are saying, 'Well, here's the captain, go ahead and call.' But you can't do that.

"It's a big issue this year because their boats aren't public vessel certified like ours. And so they may not have the proper lifejackets, the proper equipment, fire extinguishers, you know, they may not be prepared, or their captains may not be certified. And so we're finding we're running into that, we're seeing them out there."

A rising concern? Declining dock space. Mrs. Mcintosh said, "It just is really hard because you have to get a permit, so you need a Grade A marina, and then you have to have a PV permit at that marina, and there's very few and so with some of the smaller places closing down, some of the other companies have had to — they don't have a business because there's not a PV permit. It's pretty difficult."

She said, "I'm hoping that Lake George realizes that and is thinking of other ways around it as other motels and things close, and we're losing more and more dock spots."

Mr. Miller said, "For Lake George, the more people that can come here and visit and get out on the water and enjoy being out on the water is good."

"If rental boats get them on the water, okay. If PV operations get them on the lake. Okay. So that's all good. I just think either one of those can become saturated or overwhelming at some of the popular sites."

"I've been in Paradise Bay and counted seven PV boats. And they all have swimmers in the water. And it's just a saturation. And West Dollar Island can be worse.'

Stec: No pension for impeached

State Senator Dan Stec said he is pursuing a change to New York State's constitution that would prohibit public officials from receiving a state pension if convicted on an impeachment charge.

He said it would apply retroactively, so it could revoke Governor Cuomo's pension, if impeachment conviction occurred.

they have big plans for renovations.

The 6,500 square-foot building was listed at \$319,000, but the closing, expected this week, hadn't happened so a final sale price wasn't available as of press time.

Mr. Levack also brokered this sale, which was listed by Berkshire Hathaway.

"It's more development in downtown Glens Falls, Mr. Levack says. "They are fanning the flames of progress."

Mr. Elliott, 56, said that "in my past life" he was an agent for professional golfers.

He and Mr. Kunzle, best friends since ninth grade, co-own Linksters Paddy Wagon, a chain of 35 bars in Sarasota and along Florida's Gulf Coast whose main brand is the Paddy Wagon Irish Pub.


Both sons of contractors, "we have a background in design and construction properties."

Born, raised and a lifelong resident of Sarasota, Mr. Elliott said he long has summered at Bolton Landing.

"It was 20 years ago. We went on vacation with the kids, and I was watching the U.S. Open at Tavern on the Pond in Bolton when I learned the bar was for sale because of an owners' dispute," he recalls.

Next thing, "I'd bought the building, but I didn't operate it as a bar for very long." The Lake George Land Conservancy ap-

proached him and purchased the building for their offices. He said he has since purchased a couple of houses in Bolton, including a cabin they rent through Airbnb.

Mr. Elliott says he, his ex-wife and their four children ages 8 to 20 still summer there. "Bolton's cool," he says, "but I found myself coming down to Glens Falls more and more. I don't dig the tourist scene."

He, his girlfriend and the kids spent the first part of the summer in the two-floor apartment at 12 Warren. "We had a blast remodeling it," he says of the brick and exposed beam loft space. They just returned to Florida, and are renting the space via Airbnb through agent Susan Siplon.

Mr. Elliott says, "We're doing super-great with booking for 12 Warren. We expect to rent year-round."

As to the new purchase, "I'm excited for 170 Glen," Mr. Elliott says. He's looking to rent out the first floor retail space, in talks potentially with a hair salon.

"The bones are good," he says. "We'll immediately re-do the facade," currently deep burgundy and green. "Those Christmas colors are maybe a little tired," he says.

The bigger plan: "To do two really cool apartments on the second and third floors."

One will be two stories and four bedrooms using part of the second floor and the whole third floor, showcasing the large windows that look out on Glen Street. He plans an enclosed porch and outdoor patio over the roof at the back of the building. "It'll be a real badass unit," Mr. Elliott says.

The other apartment will be smaller, at the back of the second floor.

Mr. Elliott says they expect to invest under a million dollars in the renovation. Ethan Hall of Glens Falls is the architect.

They'll rent the apartments via Airbnb. "Airbnb is super cool right now. I don't know how long it will be sustainable, but it will definitely have legs for a while. There's such an audience for it," says Mr. Elliott.

"We love what's happening in Glens Falls. It's a great spot between Lake George and Saratoga, with more and more happening right here.

"Living in downtown, you can walk out the door every day and there's always something," citing Take a Bite, Food Truck Corrals at the Shirt Factory, Adirondack Theatre Festival, outdoor concerts and movies in City Park, restaurants such as Morgan and Co., [farmacy], and Mikado. night."

Mr. Elliott also collects classic vehicles. His 1963 Ford F-100, finished in a unique raw green and linen yellow patina, was a staple on Warren Street this summer.

"I dig Glens Falls," says Mr. Elliott. "I see an opportunity for growth that's affordable now. It's possible to do deals that are prohibitive in other markets."

Expressing admiration for Glens Falls developer Peter Hoffman, Mr. Elliott says, "I love these old buildings. I consider it a matter of stewardship, preserving the history of a building built in the 1800s.

"It's frustrating to see old buildings not being cared for, when the ownership trips over dollars to make up nickels, rather than make the initial investment to draw the people and set the bar higher."

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He said \$4 million American Rescue Act funding to hire a new "Director of Social and Emotional Learning" - social worker Raychel Marcil, who will start later this month.

Breese says. Argyle Cheese Farmer, Hicks Orchard and others will participate.

Mrs. Breese said she is excited for Fairgoers to gain a greater understanding of where their food comes from. "This is a great opportunity," she said.

Also new: **Daily Food Truck Corrals.** Last summer the Fairgrounds introduced weekly Food Truck Corrals and did them this spring as a way to engage the public. Last year's Corrals also provided vendors a chance to make some sales when events they would otherwise attend were shut down due to Covid, Mrs. Breese said.

On Thursday, Aug. 26, the Fair will **join Saratoga National Cemetery to honor Vietnam War veterans**. All Vietnam War veterans are invited "for a long-overdue ceremony to thank them for their service."

Thursday is also **Military Appreciation Day,** with discounted \$6 admission for Veterans. Admission is alway free to active military with ID.

Health guidelines

Fairgoers do not need to be vaccinated to attend, Mrs. Breese said. Nonvaccinated attendees must wear a face covering. "We are following CDC guidelines and asking our guests to exercise personal responsibility," reads the Fair website.

Fairgoers are **encouraged to buy tickets in advance** online, to avoid crowds and lines at the entrance. Daily admission is \$12. Weeklong passes are \$36. Advance ride ticket sheets cost \$10.

Vendors, booths and other attractions will be spaced farther apart in an effort to prevent crowding. "Your fan favorites will still be here, but they'll be more spread out," assured Mrs. Breese.

Hand sanitizer stations and free standing sinks will be available for public use throughout the grounds. Cleaning procedures will be "enhanced" in "high traffic areas, bleachers, picnic tables, restrooms and more," said the Fair website.

Social distancing will be encouraged but not actively enforced in the grandstands.

Becoming a 'year-round facility'

Financial strain caused by the pandemic is forcing the Fair board to develop the property into "more of a year-round facility," Mrs. Breese says.

Besides Food Truck Fridays, the fair introduced "Movies in the Pumpkin Patch" last fall. Mrs. Breese says more events are planned, including the **Monster Truck**









Racing League coming on Saturday, Sept. 11.

"This is something that we owe to the community," Mrs. Breese said. "It's been a very emotional year. I'd like to thank the community for all of their support over the past year. We're very excited to welcome them back."

Ward Lumber, "the 130-year-old lumber products and hardware store in northern New York State, has become the largest worker-owned cooperative in the region," said a press release from the Adirondack North Country Association (ANCA).

The transaction marks the first employee ownership transition of its kind in the North Country region of New York State."

"The lumber products and hardware store, which has locations in Jay and Malone, N.Y. and employs over 50 local people, has been in Jay Ward's family for four generations. ward...will continue his leader ship role as the company's chief executive officer.' Mr. Ward was quoted "Every business is going to go through a transition, whether that is by design or default. Rather than choose liquidation or selling to some other business that would change the culture, I wanted to look at employee ownership. "Employee ownership vests the control of the company in the hands of the people that work it every day, who live in the communities that we serve, and have that vested interest in ownership " The release said, "Ward Lumber has been a business pillar in the community since 1890, providing local jobs, supporting the region's farm and construction industries, and having direct and indirect economic impacts on area businesses and communities. 'Ward Pine Mill, the manufacturing division of the Ward Lumber family enterprise, is operated by Jay's brother Jeff Ward. Ward Pine Mill became an independent business in 2017 and is not included in the employee ownership transaction." Jay Ward was quoted: "The main thing that's changing is I'll be reporting to a board of directors of our employee team."



visitors as possible, we see value in having property more in the heart of the Adirondacks," ADK executive director Michael Barrett told The Chronicle.

They have their eye on Cascade Cross-Country Ski Center on Route 73, in the corridor between Lake Placid and Keene Valley, which is up for sale and where the club once leased space.

We listed our property on the chance that we would be able to successfully purchase that building up north," says Mr. Barrett.

'Ten to 12 million people are coming to the Adirondacks every year. If they even come by Lake George, anecdotally, they are mostly driving right past Exit 21.

It may not work out, but we decided to put the property on the market in case it does. If it doesn't, we can stay and embrace some strategies to get people to come off the Northway and visit us.'

The Lake George property, listed for sale for \$990,000, has a log building designed in 1984 as a printing shop, says listing agent Mark Levack. It has offices on two stories, a large showroom and warehouse space, loading dock and detached garage with apartment, as well as unique features such as ground source geothermal heating and a permeable parking lot, he said.

Zoning is residential-commercial high density and medium density. It "can accommodate a wide array of commercial uses," Mr. Levack said, adding it's been on the market for just two weeks.

ADK aims for now to sell just the building and surrounding property — about two acres — retaining another approximate two acres of the property.

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hold onto" the additional acreage "or not," said Mr. Barrett. "So we're not leading with that." But it would be available if a buyer wanted it.

Mr. Barrett says that when ADK bought the property, they thought hikers would use it as an information center.

"I don't think that ever really panned out," he says. "We don't get the foot traffic. People driving up early in the morning to hike aren't going to stop in Lake George.' Mr. Barrett said ADK has applied for a

\$500,000 grant through the Environmental Protection Fund to help with the pos-

sible purchase, and "we're in talks with the family" that owns Cascade Ski Center.

In July, ADK went before the Town of North Elba, to enlist its support on the acquisition. It would involve public easement on the property, Mr. Barrett said. There are extensive ski trails.

The Adirondack Almanac reported that ADK aims to "open up the privately owned cross-country ski trails to the public through a public easement, and perhaps even update the trails for use year-round."

Mr. Barrett was quoted, "My immediate thought was...it would be terrible for the community if this would be sold for private interests.

Mr. Barrett tells The Chronicle the Cascade site also offers enhanced programming space for workshops and launching guided hikes, beyond what the club currently offers at its Adirondak Loj in Keene. 'We want to grow and reach more peo-

ple but we haven't had the space," he says. "Our programs are sold out every time, as soon as we post them."

The Cascade has office space, but that's not really needed, says Mr. Barrett. With Covid, he said, "We are realizing many of our staff don't really have to be in person in the office. They can work remotely."

He said ADK is also thinking to maintain a presence in the southern Adirondacks, likely in a downtown city setting, "either Glens Falls or Saratoga."



LG's Halfway **Island: After fire,** camping ended; day use of it too

Editor's note: This is the 25th anniversary of when the late Frank Leonbruno began writing — and The Chronicle began publishing - the series of articles that became his classic book Lake George Reflections: Island History and Lore. HALFWAY ISLAND is a small, stateowned island located, as its name implies, about halfway up the lake. The island is at the center of a semicircle created by a mountain which rises, amphitheater-like,

Five years later, in 2003, Mr. Rominger wrote, "So far, we have sold more than 7000 copies." It was Purple Mountain Press's third biggest seller.



mer that a fire ravaged the island. This was my second year of employment with the state and my first major island fire. When I arrived on the scene, the fire was confined to a large tent platform on the island, near the dock.

Two factors made fighting the fire extremely difficult: The intense heat from the fire prevented us from coming in too close, and the wind whipping down the lake that day fueled the flames and dissipated the spray from our water pump. However, we did manage to get the fire under control by the time the Bolton Fire Department arrived.

At least half of the trees were burned or scorched, scarring the island's beauty. The fire was probably caused by the carelessness of a group of picnickers. After the disaster, the state immediately prohibited both camping and day use on the island, a prohibition which has remained in effect to this day.




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
