Brayden Dock, 15, qualifies for Augusta again: Drive, chip, putt National Finals


Brayden Dock, 15, is headed back to Augusta.

Next April 3, for the second straight year, the 10th grader at Glens Falls High School will compete in the Drive, Chip and Putt National Finals at Augusta National Golf Club, home of The Masters.

"I feel very honored to be able to even hit a golf ball at Augusta knowing that the best players in

the world once hit there, and played there, and spent their time there," Brayden told The Chronicle.

Brayden qualified in the Boys 14-15 year old division by winning the TPC River Highlands regional qualifier in Connecticut. His father, Glens Falls High School teacher Jeffrey Dock, said



Brayden said it's "going to be a little easier to prepare now that I know what it's like this year."

In April, Brayden said, "I came second. And I won the putting portion. I made the 15 footer. So I'll see if I can do that again." The first time he qualified, Covid dis-





rupted things. He had to wait from September 2019 "all the way to the beginning of April this year. So it was a long wait." But, he said. "That extra year gave me

time to adapt and feel a little more comfortable with my swing and my putting stroke...I also got a little bigger, I was able to hit a little

further.' Before competing this past April, he trained at Anders Mattson's indoors golf facility in Saratoga Springs. Is the com-



petition intense? "It's a little stressful. The nerves are a-going," said Braden.

"I just try to breathe, more than anything. I just take deep breaths and just try to do my best, I guess. I just try to think of it as another shot as if no one was watching."

Braden had plenty of practice in a jam packed summer. "Basically every week," he said. "I just packed a suitcase, I'd have my tournament, I'd come home for two days, pack another suitcase head out for another tournament.

"August was just packed with tournaments, all four weekends and into the week," he added. But now, "I don't have any other events that I know of unless I go down to Florida this winter."


Brayden said his favorite golfer is "Justin Thomas," though he adds, "I think I've had a different answer for ev-Please turn to next page

Virginia changes national politics; McDevitt loses in Qby.; some close races, surprises By Mark Frost

"All politics is local," Tip O'Neill famously said, but Republican Glenn Youngkin's victory Tuesday for governor

of Virginia — and other strong GOP showings (including the still too- close-to-call New Jersey governor's race

- will penetrate into political nooks and crannies here and everywhere.

Meanwhile, here are some local results — all unofficial, and incomplete, especially where write-in votes are key.

In **Queensbury**, the four Republican **incumbent at-large county supervisors won re-election** decisively, over Democratic challenger Brent McDevitt.

Mike Wild (REP, CON) - 3,478 - (22.25%) Doug Beaty (REP, TQP) - 3,402 - (21.77%) Brad Magowan (REP, TQP) - 3,389 - (21.68%) Rachel Seeber (REP, TQP) - 3,240 - (20.73%) Brent McDevitt (DEM, CON) - 2,030 - (12.99%)

For **Queensbury Town Board**, incumbent Republican Ward 1 Councilman **Anthony Metivier** (1,266 votes, 80.03%) **overwhelmed John Kassebaum** (312, 19.72%), but **Ward 2** incumbent Democrat **Harrison Freer** (665 votes, 50.72%) only **narrowly leads** Republican **Dave Deeb** (646, 49.28%).

In Glens Falls, where most candidates including Mayor-elect Bill Collins ran unopposed, Republican Robert Landry (362 votes, 53.95%) led Democrat Robin Barkenhagen (308, 45.90%)

erybody. At this point now, it's probably covered every golfer."

Brayden said when Thomas was young, "he was a shorter hitter and he'd always have to hit woods into greens on par fours and I was just the same way... and **he also came up to me and congratulated me** when we were there last year, so that was pretty cool."

What's next for Brayden's golf career? "I hope to perform well this upcoming summer [2022] in some bigger events like AJGA stuff and then from there hopefully get into a pretty good college, D1. And then potentially go pro, but we'll have to see. I've just got to keep on putting the work in and I'll see results."

His greatest accomplishment? "Before, I would say the Drive, Chip and Putt. But this year I did go undefeated in all of high school golf [for Glens Falls], which was pretty cool. And I guess it hasn't happened at my school before so I guess I broke a record for that. And I broke lowest average scoring record which was pretty cool.

"But it's kind of hard now because I just made it back to Augusta again," he added.

Brayden says he likes golf because, "each time you play it's different. You can go to the same course and every single time you play the same course, the same

tees, it's always going to be different."

"You've always got to make par a different way, you're always going to make a birdie a different way. It's never the same."

Brayden already sounds like a pro, adding, "I've just got to thank the Drive, Chip, Putt organization and the Masters organization just to be able to put this event on for kids at a such a young age too, just to be able to experience what it's like to be on national television and play at the best level of golf. I think it's very, very cool that they're able to do this."





Williams Store in Dorset: Amazing

H.N. Williams Store in Dorset was so low-key that we drove by it for years not realizing how extraordinary it is. A modernizing expansion, complete with gas pumps, has raised its profile. Founded by William Williams in 1836, the store is now in the sixth and seventh generation of Williams family ownership. I wish we had a store like this in Glens Falls. It has so much - from shirts, pants, hats, coats and boots to knives, hardware, animal feed and garden needs, to sandwiches, wine and cheese, to tons of Vermont-made goods - from Johnson woolen pants to Wilcox ice cream to goat leather gloves "made in Vermont since 1920." Astounding all the stuff they stock. It's a modern-day old-fashioned store, not a facade. Go see it. Tell them you read about it in The Chronicle.



Tried out The Luxury Box: Virtual golf, sports, more

The Luxury Box, a sports simulator and mobile entertainment business, is now open on Route 9 in Queensbury. The Chronicle tried it out.

What looks like a long building is actually a series of steel structures, each with a sports simulator setup inside a large projector screen, sports simulator and equipment, plus recliner chairs.

Owner David Brindle said, "You can play golf, you can play baseball ... hockey, you've got soccer, football, disc golf, bowling, and dodgeball." He said you can also watch TV, sporting events and movies.

Mr. Brindle estimated the investment in a standard unit to be about \$80,000, before furniture.

It's located across from The Fun Spot, south of The Great Escape.

"It was just a wooded lot," Mr. Brindle said. "We cleared the lot. And we own a steel company. So we're the ones that manufactured the structures."

His company, Dean Lally LLC, manufactures FireTrol Columns described as "prefabricated fire proof steel columns... utilized in educational facilities, hospitals, condominiums, parking garages, exhibition halls and community buildings.'

Mr. Brindle is from Rhode Island originally, then moved to Long Island, where

his wife is from, before they moved to Queensbury.

The steel structures containing the sports simulators are "all portable," said Mr. Brindle. "It sits on a trailer frame...it all just folds up. It's eight and a half feet wide. This one would be 35 feet long. You just hook it up to your truck and you're going to pull it out.

The simulators track whatever sport you're playing. You actually hit/kick/ throw the ball directly towards the screen, which projects the results, simulated on a course or field. Afterwards, you retrieve whatever ball you launched and take your next turn.

Golf is the big selling point, said Mr. Brindle. **"The golf is phenomenal.** There's nowhere around here that you're going to get a better experience with golf. I mean, literally, we've got thousands of courses. We've got different games that you can play" in the self-contained units.

He said they have software that "allows anybody in the world to design courses... That's why there's so many courses."

He said "you can't use Augusta because of proprietary licensing reasons. But they have Augusta in here.

The Chronicle's group played golf first,





on the Augusta knock off - which is called "Firethorn National."

We had a bit of a learning curve for a group of admittedly mediocre golfers. It's disorienting to pull out a driver and blast it into a screen in front of you — it feels unnatural at first.

We spent a few rounds in the water, but everyone had fun and we began to get the hang of it after a few holes.

We used the Luxury Box's clubs, but they say the norm is for guests to bring their own.

The simulator has an optional "autoputt" feature — at a certain distance from the hole, the shot counts regardless. It was useful to keep the pace up and avoid frustration.

Our highlight? Frisbee golf. We found it light and fun, and the tracking of tosses to be very accurate.

Soccer penalty kicks were a hit, too. Afterwards, someone in our group texted, "A big plus is the variety of games that can be played. Most simulators like that are designed to be good at one thing.

A standard room rents for \$40 an hour, regardless of how many people use it. The larger "luxury" suite, which has an extra room with real-life games like pool, foosball and darts, rents for \$90 an hour.

It's touted for parties or a fantasy football draft.

Mr. Brindle said the recliners in the back of the room are ideal for watching movies, sports or TV on the big screen. A \$199 monthly membership allots

10 hours rental time each month, usable 24 hours a day. Otherwise they're open from 9 a.m.-9 p.m., seven days a week.

Mr. Brindle said they have an in-depth simulator, specifically designed for golf Please turn to next page



The article subhead says, "Firearms are having a documented chilling effect on free speech."

"What most people do not realize is that the Second Amendment has become, in recent years, a threat to the First Amendment. People cannot freely exercise their speech rights when they fear for their lives," the article says.

Dr. Palmer told The Chronicle, "I'm not taking a position on firearms, or the Second Amendment" — the right to bear Please turn to next page

teaching professionals. "You've got 3D visions of the person there, you could go all the way around, turn the person upside down — not that you would want to do that, but you can do it."

Mr. Brindle showed it off — after he drove the ball, the screen immediately showed an animated silhouette of him swinging, coupled with statistics about the swing, like ball velocity and angle.

He said they're planning an open house for golf pros to test out the equipment.

One of the rooms is an indoor putting green with overhead sensors that project onto the ground where you should hit the ball — or where you shouldn't have.

For example, as your ball is rolling, a line will follow it, showing its path. It will also replay your swing, so you can see exactly how you hit the ball.

The putting green also has games like tic tac toe and beer pong. The "cups" are projected on the ground, and you try to putt the ball in. If the projector detects you hit a cup, it takes one away.

Mr. Brindle said the room is still being configured, so there were some technical difficulties.

He said the idea for The Luxury Box "was hatched back in 2004. I'm a big sports person. I saw that there were golf simulators. I was like, Oh, that's pretty neat. So I did some research into them.

"And then I just talked to some of the manufacturers and they all said, Oh, if we had a structure, or if the people had a bigger room, then we could sell more of these things. Like oh, well, there's a problem. So let's solve it."



arms. "My research was specifically on the impact of knowing guns would be present in a situation of protest in a constitutional democracy."

She says, "I had read a lot of articles Chronicle on the topic of armed protest. Many reference the idea of guns having a chilling effect, but it was more a theory, without data. I was surprised nobody had conducted research on the subject.

Her co-author, Timothy Zick, is a William & Mary Law School professor, with a forthcoming book called Managed Dissent: The Law of Public Protest.

He had explicitly written about the lack of empirical data on the subject.

Dr. Palmer said she reached out to him

with her research findings, resulting in this article, "which we thought would add value to the discussion."

Her dissertation was called "Fired Up or Shut Down: The Chilling Effect of Open Carry on First Amendment Expression at Public Protests."

Her findings were that respondents were less inclined to attend a public protest for a cause they felt strongly about if they knew guns could be present.

"The thing I think is really notable," Dr. Palmer says, "is this wasn't something found along partisan lines." She said the "chilling effect" held for "Republicans, Democrats, all sides of the spectrum and political views, even among gun owners, and from all areas of the country.'

She surveyed more than 1,200 people across the country, including several open-ended questions to gauge responses.

The Atlantic article explains: "Participants were asked about their willingness to participate in protests in two groups. In the control group, firearms were not mentioned....In the experimental group, they were....The participants in the experimental group were much less willing to participate in expressive activities than participants in the control group to whom firearms were not mentioned."

The article concludes: "Across the board, people don't think it's a good idea to have guns at protests."

Dr. Palmer said, where political points of view did show up was in reasons people gave for their hesitance — fearing Antifa. and Black Lives Matter or the Proud Boys or Trump supporters, for example.

"There is still polarization, but the chilling effect goes across party lines," Dr. Palmer says.

"It's not just about the danger that people might get hurt. It's an important point to bring to the forefront of the conversation over guns in public, that there is a risk to people participating in democracy, by losing their voices.

Dr. Palmer notes that there the U.S. Supreme Court was poised to hear case on November 3. on how the Sec-Amendment ond applies to carrying guns in public.

Mr. Zick was interviewed on MS-NBC after the article came out. Dr. Palmer said she was in a virtual "green room." but not called upon to speak. "But most of what he talked about was my rebecause

search, that's the part that's new.'

She said she hopes her research — and more like it — is seen as relevant in such instances as the Supreme Court case.

Dr. Palmer is a marriage and family therapist at True North in Glens Falls. She ran unopposed on Nov. 2 for a second four-year term on the Common Council.





for Mr. Collins's former Ward 2 Common Council seat. For the vacant **Ward 4 Council seat, Democrat Ben Lapham** (146 votes, 55.51%) **defeated** Republican **Hank Pelton** (117 votes, 44.49%).

For **Ward 4's seat on the** Warren County **Board of Supervisors**, incumbent Republican **Dan Bruno** (137 votes, 52.29%) saw a **close race with** Democrat **John Reilly** (125 votes, 47.71%).

Warrensburg: Incumbent Republican Supervisor Kevin Geraghty (436 votes, 49.04%) won the three-way race handily over former Republican Sheriff Bud York (276, 31.05%) and Democratic councilman Rich Larkin (177 votes, 19.91%).

Lake Luzerne: Supervisor Gene Merlino appeared to fall short in his writein effort for re-election vs. Councilman Dan Waterhouse. Mr. Waterhouse got 430 votes (50.35%). There were 424 write-in votes (49.65%). Mr. Merlino presumably got most but perhaps not all of those.

Johnsburg: incumbent Democratic Supervisor Andrea Hogan (409 votes, 60.95%) swamped Republican Thomas Zauner (262, 39.05%).

Thurman: incumbent supervisor Susan Shepler (52 votes, 15.07%), running as an independent, was overwhelmed by Republican Debra Runyon (287, 83.19%).

In **Moreau**, incumbent Republican council members Kyle C. Noonan, Mark Stewart and Alan VanTassel all won, as did incumbent Highway Superintendent Paul Joseph.

In **Kingsbury**, incumbent Republicans Daniel W. Washburn (839 votes) and William H. Haessly (746) retained their seats over Democrat Jeffrey Zappieri (320).

In **Argyle**, Stacy Davis (334 votes) appeared to win the town justice post over Michael Stern (258).

In **Greenwich**, incumbent Republican Supervisor Don Ward narrowly led Democrat James Nolan, 696-691. Council races were close too.



ents, and I think I may be putting some years back on my life. I own four e-bikes, three of them Class or Type 3 models, yes, capable of helping the rider along up to speeds of 28 MPH, which some are suggesting should not be legal on a BIKE-way.

I live in the hill country of Washington County. I also own a Type 2 e-bike, capable of helping up to 20 MPH. Contrary



to popular assumption, the e-bike rider does not just press a button, lace fingers behind the head and kick the feet up on the handlebars and cruise. You have to work hard, but in pedaling you get more miles for your workout. There is a difference when coming into these hills between the Type 2s and 3s; the fun is in gauging how to take the incline, working between shifting down and powering up each of the four levels, powering down again as you crest and shut off the motor on the downhill side.

I agree with Supervisor Dickinson's position that our speed isn't an issue. I have a son who puts 50+ miles a day on his regular racing bike who can blow past his old man on his ebike. The proposal for the outright banning of Type 3s is inordinate and stupid. This isn't New York City, and the cohort purchasing and riding this type is not going to ramp it up and run down pedestrians (go out and try pricing a Type 3, if you can even find one now).

To the business owner who wants to use the Bikeway for his rental market, who recommends Type 3s be outlawed-I'll suggest you don't rent Type 3s to your potential customers, if that is a real concern. Don't go after me, the user who spends a TON of money in Warren County and tons more to New York State.




