# **GF Hospital busy: Covid** surge; more

Twenty months on, Glens Falls Hospital's Covid hospitalizations equal or surpass the highest of the pandemic. Tuesday's count was 44 admissions, seven in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU).

Most chilling, "just between November 10 and 16," Glens **Falls Hospital had four** Covid fatalities, reports Hillary Alycon, the hospital's Director of Infection Prevention. "That's consistent, every week." Beyond Covid, hospitaliza-

tions are up in general, while staffing is down (more about that later in this story).

"The ER [Emergency Room] is busier than a year ago," said Ray Agnew, Vice President of Community Engagement.

"Behavioral health [and] we're seeing more people admitted with respiratory illnesses such as pneumonia." Even: "More babies are being born." "Just in raw numbers," Mr. Agnew said Tuesday, "today we Please turn to page 14

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# **HF School went** virtual for 2 days due to bus staff shortage; parents transporting now

Hudson Falls Central School District had to shift all its in-person classes to virtual, first on Friday, Nov. 12, and then also on Monday, Nov. 15.

On Monday, the district said it would reopen for in-person school on Tuesday, but not be able to provide transportation.

"We're dealing with some staffing shortages that are making it so we can't get our kids in for in-person learning," Superintendent Dan Ward told The Chronicle Friday. "The main obstacle right now is transportation staff.'

The Chronicle asked Friday if parents will need to drive their children to school.

"A lot of our families are doing that now," Mr. Ward said. "Certainly, we're looking at having to ask more families to drive their children or walk their children if they're close by if possible, but we're not there yet."

Unfortunately, by Monday, the school



reached that point. Parents were asked to transport students to school. Those who couldn't get to school went back to doing school virtually on the Internet.

Staff shortfalls is an ongoing problem, Mr. Ward said. "Every day a substitute shortage....we have an overall staffing shortage, just some positions that we have not been able to fill. They aren't causing us to be closed...but certainly it's an overall shortage.

"And it's, I would say, not unique to Hudson Falls. I think that's all schools in our region."

What's causing the shortage? "I don't have any hard data. I want to say it that way," Mr. Ward said. "But I do know that many schools operate on retired folks for some of these positions that are con-sidered part-time. And when COVID hit some folks decided that they were going to leave the workforce, and some of them haven't come back yet."

"So many schools in our region are living on the edge," Mr. Ward said.

'Every single day we're a couple employees, in many cases, from making the difference between being able to have all of our kids in person or having to do different models where kids are not in person...

"Our staff...across all positions, top to bottom, and our district, people are working really hard to help us get kids in school to provide the best education we can, despite all the challenge.'

Mr. Ward said, "Cases are on the rise in our region, and certainly in Washing-ton County. And anything that families and community members can do to slow the spread. We would be very appreciative because that's gonna help us keep school open."

He said, "Between yesterday and today, 17 positive cases between students and staff. It's positive cases, as well as people being symptomatic. And people awaiting COVID testing."



### **Absentees flip Greenwich race**


Absentee votes tallied on Tuesday, Nov. 16, apparently flipped the result of the **Greenwich Town Supervisor's** race. Incumbent **Don Ward led James Nolan, 696-691,** on election night. But Mr. Nolan garnered 49 absentee votes to 29 for Mr. Ward, so UNOFFICIALLY **James Nolan wins, 740 to 725**.

**Greenwich town council** races were close but absentees didn't change the result. **Thomas Graves** (717+55 absentees = 772) **and James Mumby** (686+49 absentees = 735) **led** on election night **and won after absentees**, UNOFFICIALLY, **over Julie Sipperly** (678+23 absentees = 701) **and Liv Thygesen** (672+27 absentees = 699).

In **Glens Falls**, absentees tightened the margin but **Dan Bruno apparently still defeated John Reilly** by nine votes, 148-139, **to retain the Ward 4 seat** for Warren County Supervisor.

For **Queensbury's Ward 2** town council race, **Har**rison Freer's 63 absentee votes to Dave Deeb's 49 widened Mr. Freer's victory margin to 728-695. In Lake Luzerne's race for Town Supervisor,

In Lake Luzerne's race for Town Supervisor, where incumbent Gene Merlino waged a write-in effort against Republican nominee Dan Waterhouse, Warren County election officials said Tuesday they will hand count the write-in ballots Friday, Nov. 19, but Mr. Merlino told *The Chronicle* previously there aren't enough to overcome Mr. Waterhouse's lead.

# **County tax sale** nets just \$18,000 for Mullen site but other parcels bring \$980,000

Warren County's annual property auction was disappointing as to proceeds on sale of a high-profile parcel on Bay Road, but "very good" overall, nearing \$1 million on 24 general properties that were offered, says Lexie Delurey, director of the County's Real Property Tax Services.

The bid on 275 Bay Road where the dilapidated Mullen Iron Works long stood — between the County Bikeway and the Becton Dickinson medical device plant came in at \$18,000.

That is far short of the \$344,000 owed in back taxes and the approximately \$141,000 the County spent to demolish the building and do some environmental cleanup on the site, Ms. Delurey said.

It's short even of the \$68,700 the Board hoped to realize, members of the Environmental Concerns & Real Property Tax Services Committee said at their meeting

Still the committee voted to accept the bid. The full board will consider the resolution at its meeting on Friday, Nov. 19.

Some members balked at the low return, but Dennis Dickinson, committee chair and Lake George Supervisor, said, The property went out to the public and came back with \$18,000. To me, that says that the \$68,700 is not a valid figure."

"We didn't get what we wanted but let's move on," said Queensbury At-Large supervisor Brad Magowan.

Claudia Braymer, Glens Falls Ward 3 county supervisor, agreed. "I am disappointed that the bid was not higher. You all know I am all for parks and trails," she said but added that the Mullen property belongs "back on the tax rolls."

Queensbury Supervisor John Strough had pushed for the county to use the parcel as a parking and visitor center for the bike trail but gained little traction.

Glens Falls Ward 2 Supervisor Peter McDevitt said, "This seems like a very low amount of money for a property that sits at the crossroads of our two largest communities. What will go there?"

it, having already purchased the former Glens Falls Tennis & Swim Club for a proposed park and aiming to buy the 333 Glen Street green space for a park, too.

The **high bidder** at close on October 30 was **Hina Asad of Niskayuna**, identified on the auction record as "nyinvest." Mr. Asad did not return a phone call by press time. A Web search shows affiliation with

Broadway Realty in New York City. Presuming the sale is approved, the Town of Queensbury Zoning and Planning Boards would have approval of future use of the site, Ms. Delurey notes.

One supervisor expressed hope "a young entrepreneur could do something good with the property."

Taxes hadn't been paid since 1995 on the Mullen property, said Ms. Delurey, noting that she inherited the issue when she came on as director in 2012.

"Prior to that it sat there and nobody did anything," she said. It was owned by J. David Mullen, who passed away in 2013, and then by his estate.

Last spring the Iron Works building was demolished and the Department of Environmental Conservation signed off that "no further remediation was needed," Ms. Delurey added.

Separately, 24 of 25 parcels sold at the county tax auction on October 16, netting nearly \$393,000 in outstanding taxes. "This was definitely a good auction," Ms. Delurey says. She said the number of sales was "the normal flow." What was "good," she said, was total sales of \$928,100.

After defraying back taxes, and satisfying liens such as funds owed to Medicare, nursing homes and such, Ms. Delurey said, 25 percent of the remainder goes to a Reserve Testing Fund the county created to help pay for remediations not covered by the prior owner — such as in the case of the Mullen property. "It's a great tool to have," Ms. Delurey

said. "People would like to see us go after the owners, but a lot of times that won't get anywhere. We set it up for this reason, to help county taxpayers not have to foot the biÎl.'

In the autumn, our eyes always go as money to a stand of bright orange-gold trees maker for on a hillside entering downtown Camhospital, bridge.

to find out.

I turned right on to county Route 59, and looked for a safe spot to pull over to take a photo of the trees. A little driveway presented itself and I pulled in.

I took the photo you see here. As I returned to my car, I spotted a man in his yard at the house maybe 40 yards away that the driveway circled around to.

He turned out to be a man named Beaver Ross and we had a nice conversation. He didn't know specifically the species of tree, but he knew who could tell me.

"Call Art Center," he said. Friday I called Mr. Center.

The trees turned out to be Japanese Larch — and they're the result of a community effort.

Back when Cambridge had its own hospital - the now shuttered Mary Mc-Clellan, Mr. Center said supporters wanting to raise money for the hospital came up with a tree planting project on this land the hospital owned. Mr. Center said, "We had John Ray

mond, a forester, take a look at that 10 acres. He said it should be cleared off. He recommended planting trees which are used for plywood.

"We got volunteers to clear the land. It didn't cost the hospital anything.

"We hand-planted the trees." When was this?, The Chronicle asked. "Gosh, Mark," said Mr. Center, "it must have been 20 years ago.

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# Larry Elmen the new Warren Co. Attorney

The Warren County Board of Supervisors voted on Nov. 5 to hire Larry Elmen of Glens Falls as the County Attorney. He was to begin his tenure Monday, Nov. 8.

"I am honored and humbled by the trust placed in me by the Warren County

Board of Supervisors," Mr. Elmen was quoted in the county press release.

Rachel Seeber, Chairwoman of the Warren County Board of Supervisors, was quoted: "Larry Elmen brings a wealth



of experience and comprehensive knowledge at all levels of government. This experience along with his time in private practice makes Mr. Elmen an ideal selection for our County Attorney, perhaps the most challenging position in our county."

The county press release explained that the Warren County Attorney is the legal advisor for the Board of Supervisors and county officials and is responsible for representing Warren County in all civil lawsuits and administrative hearings in which the county is a party.

It said Mr. Elmen is entering his 27th year practicing law. His career began in the public sector as a captain and trial at-torney for the U.S. Army's 82nd Airborne Division, He was a prosecutor for the Manhattan District Attorney's Office, and was an Assistant Attorney General with the New York Attorney General's Office.

He is returning to the public sector following 15 years in private practice where he was a partner in a local law firm before opening and operating his own law firm during the past five years.

Mr. Elmen replaces Mary Kissane, who left the county attorney position in April

for a position in private practice. "I am grateful to be joining the great team already in place at the Warren County Attorney's Office and look forward to supporting them in providing the highest quality legal advice to the Board of Supervisors and our County Depart-ment leadership team," Mr. Elmen was quoted. He was the Republican nominee for the part-time City of Glens Falls Judgeship to which Nikki Moreschi was re-elected earlier this month.

ticipated time-frame.

"After 10 years," said Mr. Center, "we'd take out every third tree. Five years later take half of what's left. Then, all the biggest trees after 20 years."

He said Mr. Raymond estimated, in all, "it would bring the hospital \$200,000."

Unfortunately, destiny intervened. In 2003, the hospital — in operation since 1919 — closed. Its properties have been sold off, though efforts to reuse the hospital building have failed.

The trees still stand.

At first Mr. Center didn't recall the species, but as we conversed, the name came to him: Japanese Larch.

He said he remembers because when the project was announced "two or three people called saying 'What are the Japa-

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nese doing here?"

A quick Google search turned up this overview of the tree from The Morton Arboretum in Lisle, Illinois.

"Japanese larch is a sun-loving deciduous conifer native to Japan," it said. "The 70-foot high pyramidal trees has slender, pendulous branches, and clusters of

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
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bright green needles that turn a golden vellow in the fall before dropping. Mature bark is a scaly reddish brown.

The American Conifer Society writes, "Japanese larch is an important tree in forestry plantations, being grown throughout central and northern Japan (north to Hokkaido), and also widely in northern Europe, particularly Ireland and Britain. The wood is tough and durable, used for general construction work. Small larch poles are widely used for fencing."

Mr. Center said of their planting of the Japanese larches in Cambridge two decades ago, "We did it for two reasons - for the money for the hospital and to keep erosion from happening" on the hillside.

have 198 total in house and last year on this date we had 130." Assuming 40 Covid patients, that's still 28 more patients in-house this year, "about a 20 percent increase," he said.

Based on prior years, the hospital "budgeted" or planned for, say, 130 patients in the surgical unit.

Monday they had about 150. In the ER, they budgeted for 112 and saw between 120 and 130 patients. (The Cancer Center number of patients is one area where patient count holds is steady.)

That's only part of the big surge in hospital admissions

Why the overall

surge isn't clear. Most likely, Mr. Agnew said, "People postponed taking care of themselves, they waited too long and now they have to be admitted."

Mr. Agnew says, "If you look at the numbers, Warren and Washington Counties are a hot spot in the Capital Region.

"We need to encourage people to not go to work sick. It's great that sports are happening, but then there's a lot more travel. All combined: Larger events, letting our guard down. We want to get the message out: Continue to be vigilant. Social distance, masks, get vaccinated."

"We're at the highest we've ever been, with more inpatients than in the initial days and the second surge December to January 2020-2021," said Ms. Alycon, who is a clinical epidemiologist.

Glens Falls Hospital has the second highest number of Covid inpatients in the region, behind only St. Peter's in Albany, Mr. Agnew said.

"Beds are not a concern," said Mr. Agnew, noting they're certified for upwards of some 390 beds and they consider 200 a high census.

'We've modified a couple of wings" to accommodate additional ICU patients as needed." They've added units to isolate

Covid patients from other populations.

"We have capacity," Mr. Agnew says. "The issue is staffing." He said that **even** before vaccination mandates — all staff must be vaxed or lose their positions — "we had shortages of clinical staff and nursing staff. Combine that with high acuity - very sick people, and not all even Covid, though Covid numbers are high now. At one point we had 200 people in the hospital, including 20 Covid cases." He laments, "It's the perfect storm."

Mr. Agnew said Ĝlens Falls Hospital has 38 unvaccinated staff members on unpaid administrative leave. The hospital is "on the bubble" with **another** 48 who sought religious exemptions. Courts have denied them, "so there's a good shot we'll lose some more folks."

The losses, he said, come "across the board," from nursing to environmental services to the cafeteria.

With about 2,500 employees, Mr. Agnew says. "Every last one is important. We don't want to lose a single one. But we do support the vaccination mandate, **so — we continue to recruit**, and we are using agency nurses where we need to.'

The hospital's Nov. 1 job fair yielded **25 new hires**, Mr. Agnew said — but they

#### **Changes seen in how Covid presents itself**

"With each successive wave, Covid has been presenting differently," Hillary Alycon, Glens Falls Hospital's Director of Infection Prevention, tells The Chronicle

Initially, it looked like stroke or a heart attack. Then in spring, it presented as a respiratory illness.

"Last summer, people were coming in with **altered mental states**. **Now** we see people who are hypoxic, short of breath, lowered oxygen levels."

That's the serious cases who are hospitalized, she notes.

In the community, Ms. Alycyon says breakthrough cases might look like a bad cold or allergies.

Get tested, she advises. "Leave no stone unturned when it comes to this thing, because it's so contagious.'

Ms. Alycon says with Covid, one sick person generally impacts seven others. "You need to isolate sooner than later," she said. -Cathy DeDe



### Who's hospitalized with Covid?

Who's in Glens Falls Hospital for Covid during the ongoing surge?

About 60 to 68 percent of the 40+ daily inpatients are unvaccinated, hospital officials told The Chronicle.

The most seriously ill have generally been people who were not vaccinated, and those who are highly at risk with other comorbidities (negative health factors)

**Hospitalized Covid patients range** from 24 to 97 years old, "a 70-year spread," said Hillary Alycon, the hospital's Director of Infection Prevention.

Ray Agnew, the hospital's Vice President of Community Engagement, says, "We've had the stories of a couple of young folks who succumbed. Both were not vaccinated. That should be a warning for folks."

He added, "As more people are vaccinated, there are more breakthrough cases, but they are less severe and they are survivable." -Cathy DeDe

have 200 openings, "across disciplines."

What's the impact of the staffing shortage? "So far we have not cancelled services like we did last spring," Mr. Agnew said. "On some occasions, when we have a high census of 200 or more patients, we have had to delay or postpone a procedure that would require an overnight stay."

Mr. Agnew says: "The uptick in Covid cases, in addition to high volumes of inpatients, high acuity and staffing issues have made it difficult, but Glens Falls Hospital continues to stay open and provide services...We are open for business.

"If you are not feeling well, don't hesitate to come to the ER or call your physician. We are here for you.'

Mr. Alycon sees Covid fatigue as a factor. "A lot of individuals, they're just done with it," she said. "We're seeing that as some of the spread. They're waiting five, eight, nine days to get tested. The sheer volume is very real.'

"There are two universes," she says. "One is the health care people, We're seeing it's not done. But in the community, we want our lives back to normal. If vou don't live and breathe it every day..." you're likely less vigilant.

Ms. Alycon says that from an epidemiological perspective, she expected the pandemic to last two years. "But it's really

#### Is more patients good for business? It's trickv

Is more patients good for the hospital's bottom line? It's a tricky subject, even to ask aloud.

"It's good for us to have a regular influx of patients," acknowledges Ray Agnew, Glens Falls Hospital's Vice President of Community Engagement.

But it's complicated because "the high acuity and high census, with staffing shortages," results in the hosital's "needing to hire agency nurses."

Mr. Agnew said, "We are cautiously optimistic on volume, but it's expensive to care for people, and hire agency staff. so it can be somewhat of a wash. -Cathy DeDe about human behavior now. It's not biology or the pathology of disease.'

Ms. Alycon urges: "If you're eligible for the booster, get it. If you can be vaccinated, do it. If you're sick, stay home. In public spaces, mask."

A new ad campaign jointly created by Warren and Washington Counties' Public Health departments, Behan Communications, Hudson Headwaters Health Network and Glens Falls Hospital urges Covid precautions and especially getting vaccinated. "It's absolutely" because of the spiking numbers, Mr. Agnew says. A few months back, the numbers of Co-

vid patients admitted to Glens Falls Hospital were typically in the teens, with one or two at a time in ICU, Mr. Agnew said.

"Our high point has been about 12 at any point," he said. "Now we're over 40, with 7 in the ICU. Considering there are 16 ICU beds, that's busy.
