


Chapman's great show: History of movies in Glens Falls!

Kingsbury's gun rights fight

Councilwoman Jane Havens has resigned from the Kingsbury Town Board effective November 30, because she says a town law — Chapter 136 banning guns on town property conflicts with her personal protection and infringes the public's constitutional rights.

"I refuse to give up my right


to carry" a gun, **Mrs. Havens** told *The Chronicle.* "I took an oath to defend the Constitution."

Haessly sought repeal of the law, but lost in a 3-2 vote. Town Supervisor Dana Hogan and councilmen Rick Doyle and Dan Washburn were the majority.

GF: Festival of Trees returns! Yes, truncated & also upbeat

The 30th annual North Country Festival of Trees to benefit the Prospect Center returns — for three days — **Friday to Sunday**. Nov. 26 to 28, **at the Queens-bury Hotel** in downtown Glens Falls.

On display: More than 120 decorated Christmas trees, wreaths, centerpieces, kissing balls and other items, and a Holiday Boutique of hand-crafted items by nearly 30 artisans and vendors.

Hours are Friday and Saturday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Admission is free.

There's also an online raffle and donation opportunities at **www.cfdsny.org**, for those who are unable to attend.

Shop only, no events

As last year, the Festival focus is a holiday shop, where visitors may view and purchase items on the spot — rather than a walk-through weekend-long spectacle.

No visits or breakfasts with Santa, children's activities, live music, or gala none of the Festival's traditional interactive events, again due to Covid concerns, said organizer Anne Costigan of the Center for Disability Services in Albany, parent organization of Prospect Center.

She said the number of displays and of participating boutique artisans is up from last year, and "not far behind" years pre-Covid.

pre-Covid. "This is a signature event for Prospect Center and the Center for Disability Services overall," Ms. Costigan said.

"Last year's Festival was a true testament to the incredible community support for Prospect Center and the individuals with disabilities and families we serve....The Festival was held on Friday and Saturday only, with a steady flow of shoppers throughout the two days. All items were purchased by 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, with the boutique continuing to have shoppers until closing."

Ms. Costigan said, "So many attendees were so happy that we held the Festival, thanking the Prospect Center staff and our tremendous volunteers for keeping the tradition alive even with the 'boutique experience' format. It was very heartfelt.

"All at Prospect Center are truly thankful to the community for ensuring the success of the Festival of Trees event during a pandemic with a retooled format."

Aims to raise \$35,000

She said last year's festival raised \$27,500. This year's goal is \$35,000.

"The funds raised stay in the community to support the innovative programs offered at Prospect Center," Ms. Costigan said. "We are most grateful to the Queensbury Hotel for their continued hospitality. We're hoping for another successful and festive event this year."



A second Open House is planned on Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 11-12.



Warren County Health Services suggests using home COVID-19 testing kits before attending an "indoor residential event" such as Thanksgiving dinner or a holiday party.

"Home testing can help find asymptomatic or mild infections that might not be initially evident," it said.

"These home testing kits are available at many local pharmacies, are relatively inexpensive (\$25 or so for two tests in a kit) and minimally intrusive, using a nasal swab to get a sample that will yield test results in minutes."

The current law allows some "exceptions" including one for "a Town official or Town employee specifically authorized by the Town Board to possess a firearm on Town property" subject "to any and all restrictions or limitations which the Town Board may place.'

Mrs. Havens rejects the exception. "I cannot support an elite class that has a privilege that my friends and neighbors don't. I wanted to rescind it. The general public has done nothing to warrant it."

"People think that there are not concealed firearms all around them," but there are, says Mrs. Havens . "That's how responsible people are about it.'

Mrs. Havens said the focus should be on actual crime. She said Falls Farm & Garden, the business that she and her husband operate on Dix Avenue "was robbed" and chainsaws were stolen.

She said two men are "now in jail because of our case." She mentions a related shooting incident and said, "Law enforcement told us we could be in danger."

She operates a gun shop - Calamity Jane's Firearms and Fine Shoes - across the road from Falls Farm & Garden.

But Mrs. Havens says that because of the town prohibition on guns, any time she goes into the town hall, she first goes home and secures her firearm, which she says she is prohibited by federal rules from doing in her store.

"What good is a lawmaker that doesn't follow the law," she asks rhetorically. She said she wouldn't accept a "don't ask, don't tell" option.

Mr. Haessly said, "In the north country there are a lot of people who hunt" and they may keep a firearm in their vehicle to go hunt after work."

He said if a Highway Department employee does that and parks on town property, it's in violation of the law. Likewise, if a hunter does that while going into town hall to buy a license.

Moreover, Mr. Haessly said, "There's no posting that it's illegal."

Mr. Haessly told The Chronicle, "I was hoping for a compromise" in which a person could keep a firearm "locked and secured" in their vehicle on town property

But Mrs. Havens said that option is

prohibited. "The gun is supposed to be in your care and control at all times so it's not a compromise to say you're requiring them to secure it in the car," she said.

As to repercussions of the prohibition of guns on town property, Mrs. Havens raises the scenario of people grooming snowmobile trails that run through town property. "They may do that work at night [and] carry a firearm for coyotes — they're breaking the law. We're making criminals of people.

Mrs. Havens said they spent more than a year seeking action on changing the gun law. "Councilman Haessly wrote up an amended law back in June-July 2020 public hearing but nothing happened with it." She said it mentioned the New York Safe Act "and that's a really bad piece of legislation," she said.

Asked why, Mrs. Havens said, "It doesn't do anything to lessen gun crime. I didn't want to lend credence to it."

Mrs. Havens is about halfway through a four-year term ending Dec. 31, 2023.

Asked how business is in her Calamity Jane's Firearms & Fine Shoes store, Mrs. Havens said it's gratifying to see more people buying guns this year for hunting, whereas last year, she said, purchases were more frequently for home protection. She said, "12 million new gun owners entered the market in 2020.

Opposes gun presence at demonstrations

Editor's note: The following letter was submitted before the jury reached its verdict in the Kyle Rittenhouse case.

Dear Mark:

I think carrying guns to a demonstration is an interesting topic to discuss as was done in the article

of Dr. Palmer published in The Chronicle Nov. 4, 2021. She has done re-

search which shows

that there is a chilling effect on free speech when guns are carried at demonstrations.

I believe in our right to bear arms per the Constitution but I believe we need to further discuss if carrying guns in this scenario is judicious.

Mr. Chiarello in his letter on November 11, 2021 believes carrying guns to demonstrations is a good thing. His letter tries to support his position but instead makes a good argument for controlling the show of arms at a demonstration.

He says it all when he states, "My experience is that people tend to be more circumspect in their speech and behavior when aware that others might be armed." Clearly, his intent is to stifle free speech with the show of arms.

I also believe many people bearing arms at a demonstration are really using a show of force to impose their views on others.

We also need to take a lesson from the shootings at Kenosha, Wisconsin. Mr. Rittenhouse allegedly came to the demonstration to protect property and help people while carrying an AR-15 rifle.

If a person loots a building (which we all agree is criminal) is Mr. Rittenhouse going to shoot and kill him/her? How does he plan to protect the property?

In New York State, you can't generally use deadly force merely to defend property. I suggest calling 911. I certainly don't want my streets filled with vigilantes carrying AR-15 rifles.

When carrying a weapon, you should be aware that a possible consequence is that you use the weapon and kill someone or die by someone else's weapon.

Mr. Grosskreutz is an example of this. He pulled his concealed handgun and almost lost his life when shot by Mr. Rittenhouse. Mr. Rittenhouse killed two people and wounded a third.

Now it's the duty of the jury to decide if he killed in self-defense. There are four elements to self-defense

1) unprovoked attack

- 2) necessity
- 3) proportionality and

4) reasonable belief.

Demonstrations can be very tense,

hostile and filled with aggressive rhetoric. What's dangerous about people being armed is that the demonstrator never knows what the armed person believes is necessary force. People don't know what the armed person believes is reasonable. And the armed person can misconstrue the demonstrator's intent. Thus, confusion over intent of all parties can lead to people dying when guns are present.

These ballots lifted Mr. Merlino to an unofficial lead of 459 to Republican nominee/councilman Dan Waterhouse's 451.

Initial results, after absentees, showed Mr. Waterhouse leading by a margin of less than 20 votes, which triggered an automatic recount.

The Chronicle asked Mr. Merlino if he


thinks the election dispute is over. "No," Mr. Merlino said. "They'll file a thing with the Supreme Court. They accused us of stuffing the ballot boxes and finding votes after. They just don't know what they're talking about."

He added, "It's a simple explanation... We didn't find them laying in a bag around the side of the street. They were still in the machine."

"When we counted the absentees, and we counted the write-ins. I was five votes short. Now the state law says you're five votes short, anything under 20 votes short, complete re-audit of every vote," he said.

"I'm disheartened," Mr. Waterhouse told The Chronicle Monday evening but "I'm not going to concede." But he seemed to indicate a legal challenge was unlikely, citing difficulty in finding an elections attorney to take the case and the cost.

Mr. Waterhouse said the result "stinks" and he suggests wrongdoing by Republican "good old boys" aiding Mr. Merlino.

"If the story hadn't changed so many times...First of all, it's a convenient glitch. Then they're stuck in the machine, I heard, and then the writing was too light, that they didn't register properly... These were rumors I was hearing from the County all day long from a real good source at the County," he said.

Mr. Waterhouse claimed he was not notified when the recount would take place until he called County Board of Elections Republican Commissioner Bill VanNess. "And I only knew because I heard Gene say it in the board meeting," he added.

The Election Commissioner Mr. Van-Ness insists that a letter was sent, and also emailed, to all Lake Luzerne candidates including Mr. Waterhouse on Nov. 16, informing them of the Nov. 19 recount.

"Also, because of the fear that it would not be received by the candidates in time, each candidate was called via telephone with Deputy Commissioner Ross, Colin and Commissioner VanNess present," Mr.

VanNess said in email to The Chronicle.

Mr. Waterhouse said he spoke to an elections official elsewhere who he says deemed the late change in the result "either incompetence or fraud, but if that's the case Bill [VanNess] should be removed," Mr. Waterhouse said. He accused Mr. VanNess of "lack of assistance with me through the whole process... and me being the endorsed Republican.'

'When they say it's hard to beat city hall, I learned it is. It was not lined up in my favor," said Mr. Waterhouse. "If I do run again in two years I'll know what to do in advance. I'll have an attorney."

Mr. Waterhouse said, "I objected to 15 of Gene's votes when we were in the recount, because they just said last names and that's not the law. It's very clear. It has first and last name."

"If you vote for Waterhouse, there could be 10 different Waterhouses," he said.

Mr. Waterhouse and Mr. Merlino have had a contentious race.

Mr. Merlino initially said he would not run for reelection. He was accused of many and serious financial improprieties by the other members of the Town Council, including Mr. Waterhouse. They asked the State Comptroller to come investigate.

Mr. Merlino denied wrongdoing, and the allegations prompted him to mount a write-in campaign to retain his post.

"I love my job. I think I've done it to the best of my ability. And everything they threw at me all these allegations, they

have not one proven yet. Anything," Mr. Merlino said.

"It's seven months now that the state's investigating me, and they have yet to call me and say, 'Look, we want to talk to you about a, b and c,' you know, nothing."

Although Mr. Merlino appears to have won, his aligned write-in candidates running for town council all lost, continuing his isolation on the Luzerne Town Board.

"I got a board that votes against me no matter what I do. If I say yes, they say no, if I say no, they say yes," Mr. Merlino said.

Mr. Waterhouse seemed to confirm this assessment, saying, "I have four board members who will make Gene's life hard." He also used the word "miserable."


Mr. Waterhouse said, "If he does get the felony counts that I think he will get, I'm sure the board would appoint me," to the supervisor's seat if it's vacated. "And believe it or not," Mr. Waterhouse

added, "you know I had 450 votes, you got 450 pissed off people that think it was rigged. And he's getting called out in town already for it."

Mr. Merlino, 77, says, "I don't know how long I can put up with it for my own health. My blood pressure can't go up and I can't get frustrated and depressed over it. I can't. I'll do the best I can...If it wasn't that I respect highly all the people — 459 of them had to spend the time to write my name at the bottom of that ballot - Iwould basically tell them to stick it."

"My wife's upset very much because she was actually hoping I'd lose," he chuckled.

Election officials: Our numbers were on the mark

Warren County Board of Election Commissioners Bill VanNess and Beth McLaughlin told *The Chronicle* no ballots were "found" to put incumbent Gene Merlino's write-in campaign for Lake Luerne Town Supervisor over the top against endorsed Republican Dan Waterhouse.

"Our numbers were right on the mark," Mr. VanNess said. What was off, he said, is that those 14 ballots with write-in votes had been recorded as "blank, or no vote," when the machine did not direct them properly.

Mr. VanNess, two deputy commissioners, Mr. Waterhouse, Mr. Merlino and several others were present for the recount, Mr. VanNess and Ms. McLaughlin said.

Early during the recount, "We all almost simultaneously found a write-in from the general bin," Mr. VanNess said. They stopped and called the state, who advised them to continue the manual recount.

Mr. VanNess said he was told the state reported similar issues with voting machines elsewhere.

"Dan Waterhouse got upset and started making allegations and statements, that 'I want this stopped now," Mr. VanNess said. "I informed him the count is going forward and he walked out the door."





5-hour Warren County meeting: Mullen no-deal, budget, sewer

The Warren County Board of Supervisors voted not to accept the \$18,000 high bid on the Mullen Iron Works property as offered in the County's online public auction that ended Oct. 30.

The Mullen vote was one among several points of interest during the Board's Friday, Nov. 19, monthly meeting. The meeting lasted about five hours, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., with one 10-minute recess at 11:30.

The board did not entertain Queensbury Town Supervisor John Strough's resolution from the floor to retain the Mullen property as a Warren County Bikeway Amenity. The less than one-acre parcel sits adjacent to the bike path on Bay Road, near the Queensbury-Glens Falls border.

Board members Claudia Braymer and Dan Bruno of Glens Falls; Brad Magowan, Doug Beaty and Rachel Seeber of Queensbury; and Frank Thomas of Stony Creek were in the minority who voted to accept the \$18,000 bid.

Among the majority of supervisors who voted not to accept it was Dennis Dickinson — although he chairs the Environmental Concerns and Real Property Tax Services committee that generated the resolution in the first place.

Why the change? Mr. Dickinson told *The Chronicle*, "The night before the Board meeting, I received three phone calls from fellow supervisors, including John Strough, asking to not sell it and let the county look at it as a possible asset to the bike trail."

Mr. Dickinson said he was persuaded, "If we're only going to get \$18,000 for it, that's such a token amount. If people on the board want to explore retaining and using it for the county, we should do that."

He said he was told also, "There is quite a bit of money available in grants for bicycling," to potentially develop the property.

Why wasn't this raised at the committee meeting? "To be honest, I don't know," Mr. Dickinson said. He said he expects the discussion will now continue at the committee level, with input from the County Planning Board on possible grant options as well.

Divisions remain, however, between board members who said they see adding an amenity to the bikeway at this location as foresightful, and those who believe "another parking lot" is unnecessary, that the property should return to the tax rolls. Supervisor Beaty said, "This reminds me of the boondoggle at the airport, but smaller, a sort of mini boondoggle" — a reference to the county's since-abandoned effort to expand the **Please turn to next page**

Public mixed re: Septic law Friday's board meeting opened with a public hearing on the County's proposed Septic Inspection at Transfer Law. Fourteen people spoke for just over an hour, from several perspectives. Many urged passing the law, some saying the proposal, which covers shoreline properties on Lake George and seven other water bodies, doesn't do enough but is "a good start." Those in opposition argued that the wording might allow inspectors to go on private property without notice, that individual communities or lake associations should oversee the effort rather than the county, and that the law over-

burdens private property owners. Following public comment, the board voted to table a resolution adopting the proposed law. The special Septic Inspection at Transfer committee, headed by Glens Falls Ward 3 Supervisor Claudia Braymer, is scheduled to meet again on

December 2. Among other topics:

• Budget and weighted votes: The

Board approved the 2022 Warren County budget of \$173.3 million, including a tax levy of \$4.1 million. This marks a decrease in the tax rate "by two cents, to \$3.899 per \$1.000 in assessed value." the County said in a news release on the budget. The board also passed a resolution to reapportion the weighted votes of its 20 members, following the 2020 U.S. Census results.

• Concession to Glens Falls? Regarding a planned arrangement with the City of Glens Falls for the County to temporarily provide GIS (Geographic Information Systems) mapping services while the City fills a vacancy, Glens Falls supervisors Jack Diamond and Claudia Braymer requested the County waive its proposed \$50 hourly fee. They said the City supports County GIS services even while it typically has its own staff. The discussion was tabled, to be sent back to committee.

• Tourism's \$1.2 million: Board members questioned the Tourism Department's proposed 2022 media con-





Dan: Thankful for Thanksgiving Day hunts

Like most mornings, I was awake well before my alarm clock ever went off. As I laid there listening to sleet peck away at the tin roof of my home, part of me wanted to just sleep in. My body was tired and worn from two solid weeks of pounding the Adirondack hills and I could sure use a day off.

But my buck tag was still unfilled and it was the last day of that two-week vacation. On top of that, it was Thanksgiving Day, a traditional hunting day that I have never missed since I began chasing whitetails now over 40 years ago.

There were six of us that morning. Four of the guys were Iron Sight Gang regulars, another joined us occasionally and the other was my wife Adrienne's nephew, mainly a Southern Zone guy who was visiting for the holiday. Typically, we hunt a half-day before spending the rest of Thanksgiving day with our families. After setting the watchers out for the

After setting the watchers out for the second drive, I looked for a spot where I could cover part of two watches and found two fresh rubs near where I decided to take a stand. Less than an hour later, as I anticipated the end of the drive, I suddenly heard the unmistakable sound of a deer running through the woods.

Soon, I saw brown and when the deer burst out of the brush about 50 yards away I spotted a good set of antlers.

The Winchester Model 94 Trapper .30-30 instantly came to my shoulder and three shots later the fine 8-pointer hit the ground. Happy Thanksgiving to me.

It was a great day. Back at home, we were hosting over a dozen members of my wife's family, one of the last big Thanksgiving dinners we'd have before her mother passed away. Everyone, including my 88-year-old mother-in-law, had to check out the nice buck hanging in my garage. Going back to work on Black Friday wasn't so bad after all.

As I'm sure is the case with many hunting families, the Thanksgiving Day deer hunt is a long-standing tradition. Ours extends from my father's side of the family, which is the foundation of today's hunting crew. I well remember many of the hunts — all of them, actually.

Fifty years ago, in 1971, our family moved to Fort Ann, in Washington County, where I still make my home. That year a huge snowstorm hit the region on Thanksgiving Day. My father and uncles left that morning for the half-day hunt, but returned minutes later as they were unable to make it up the big hill just up the road, despite having four-wheel-drive Jeeps and pick-ups. On Thanksgiving Day in 1978, a year before I began seriously hunting, my Uncle Jim Ladd shot a big 10-pointer that is likely one of the biggest bucks ever taken by our crew. They didn't weigh their deer back then the way we do now, but the buck was so big its tail and hind quarters were touching the floor in my Uncle Duff's garage, which was unusual.

testament to Uncle Jim who was not only a great deer hunter, but a great person.

Thanksgiving was a huge deal throughout my high school and college years because it was a block of time where I simply was able to focus on hunting. And once I entered the working world it was an extra day off, always partially spent in the woods.

One thing I've noted from my hunting journals is several cold Thanksgiving mornings. One was in 1993, an uneventful Thanksgiving from a deer hunting perspective, but notable otherwise for me. The woods and waters have always been a place where I've been able to think with a clear mind and make decisions. As a writer, this is extremely beneficial, and continues to be to this day.

But on that cold holiday morning hunt nearly 30 years ago now, I made a decision that would affect the rest of my life.

On a chilly morning watch, in single digit temperatures, I pondered what to get Adrienne, who at the time was my girlfriend, for Christmas that year. The answer suddenly became clear and a few days later I was shopping for a diamond ring. We got married in 1995.

What I also remember about that same morning was stopping to pick up my dad, who decided not to go hunting because it was too cold. Dad did not hunt again that season. About a week earlier, on my birthday, we spent the afternoon in the woods together, which turned out to be his last deer hunt as he passed away in the summer of 1994.

For a number years that followed, the Thanksgiving Day hunts were hit and miss. I remember several where I hunted alone, or there were just a few of us.

In the years that followed the hunt I shared at the beginning of this column, Thanksgiving participation picked up, which coincided with the size of our hunting party growing, overall. There have been a few years when we may have had too many hunters along, but this is family and very close friends, so we just put safety first, figure it out and enjoy each

other's company.

We've also had some luck in recent

years. My cousin Kyle walked up on a buck one cold Thanksgiving morning. Another year, with a big crew, we got two bucks on Thanksgiving Day, one taken by my cousin Ed and the other by Jack, one of our veteran hunters, as I like to call them.

Which leads me to this year. Unfortunately, Ed was killed this past summer in a motocross accident down in Unadilla. Ed, Kyle and I grew up together, and much of that growing up took place in the deer woods. So, this year's Thanksgiving hunt, and all of our hunts for that matter, just aren't the same.

Jack, on the other hand, is approaching his 80th birthday and continues to have a strong passion for deer hunting. Amazingly, he can still go through the woods of the Adirondacks in a manner that many hunters much younger than him can not.

Finally, Thanksgiving is about being thankful for what you have and what you've had. When it comes to deer hunting I've always been thankful for my hunting partners — family and friends — as without them, much of my hunting success would not be.

More importantly, I'm grateful for the time we've had to hunt together and the many memories we've made. As the life, and death, of Ed and of my father have reminded us, this is something that can't be taken for granted.

be taken for granted. I'm truly thankful that I have a wife of 26 years who intentionally hosts Thanksgiving dinner later in the day so that I have plenty of time to spend in the woods. She really is the best.

Go afield this year on Thanksgiving Day, and every day for that matter, appreciating everything about it. Sometimes the world seems like an ugly, complicated place, but the simplicity of hunting and those we share it with is sure something to be thankful for.

Garnet Lake seeks funds to fix dam

The Garnet Lake Conservation Association has launched a fund-raising campaign to reconstruct or update the dam "that enables the lake to exist," the group said in a press release this week.

"The dam...originally constructed in the mid 1850s and reconstructed around 1950 does not currently meet...safety standards for high-water flow during periods of rain and runoff," said info. "The dam needs to be reconstructed or altered to meet these standards."

Association President Anne Bernat said in a press message that the state Department of Environmental Conservation awarded an \$80,000 grant to help with the cost of developing engineering plans to update the dam.

The Conservation Association owns the dam. The group includes "only" about 40 seasonal and permanent homes around the lake.

"The cost of rebuilding the dam greatly exceeds the financial means of the homeowner families. Therefore, the associa-



tion decided to start the 'Save the Lake' fund-raising campaign.

"GLCA has been complying with DEC requirements using volunteer labor and monetary contributions from its members," said the release.

"The homeowners have been the 'stewards of the lake' for over 65 years."

"Over 75% of the land surrounding this pristine Southern Adirondack lake is owned by New York State," said the group. It includes public campsites, trails and a public boat launch. "The lake itself is 313 acres with 8.5 miles of beautiful shoreline."

The Town of Johnsburg owns the bridge and road that run over the dam.

The campaign is expected to last two or more years.

"We would welcome all donations, and hope that as the campaign final goal becomes clearer, many donors will choose to contribute again and again to help us reach the goal and save the pristine Garnet Lake."
