

Image of the Warrior

The School Board passed a resolution on Nov. 9, designating the Native American head as a "heritage image" for the district. Pressed several times to explain the term, Board president Tricia Biles said, "It is honoring the fact that the Warrior symbol is part of our identity and part of our pride...to make clear that we are not promoting cancel culture and...that this is an understood piece of pride and identity for our community."

The resolution says, "The designation does not cancel anything or require any immediate changes, opens the discussion, allowing for community inquiry and education.

A board member added, "The board is handing that discussion to the people of the district. That is our intent."

Another said, "The designation protects and respects our identity and creates space for an educational opportunity, seeking a common language

Board president Mrs. Biles said, "Folks have been hesitant to talk about it. As a heritage image, the Native American head is part of Lake George now, a symbol of pride. We have an important educational responsibility to talk about it, to understand the nuances of that and what is actually done with it."

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion

Separately, the School Board's Policy Committee chair Maryanne MacKenzie said the district is in the early stages of Please turn to page 19



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Dana Hogan: Opt out for now on marijuana in Kingsbury; eye later referendum

"I'm leaning towards opting out only in the sense that I think it gives us more future flexibility," Kingsbury Town Supervisor Dana Hogan told The Chronicle regarding the state marijuana opt-out deadline coming up on Dec. 31.

"If we don't opt out by December 31, 2021, we no longer as a community have the option to opt out in the future," Mr. Hogan said. "But you may opt out prior to 12/31, and then ultimately opt back in."

He said the Kingsbury town board is looking to offer it up as a referendum to the community. Otherwise, "you're essentially allowing five council members to make a decision that's going to impact this community for the rest of days."

"I would prefer to give us some time and flexibility to let the community weigh in on it," Mr. Hogan said.

The New York State Office of Cannabis Management says "to opt-out of allowing adult-use cannabis retail dispensaries or on-site consumption licenses, a municipality must pass a local law by December 31, 2021..."

"Municipalities cannot opt-out of adultuse legalization," the state office adds. Cannabis possession and use by adults over age 21 is legal in New York State.

Moreau town board open to marijuana sale, balks at its use on-site at bars, etc.

Chronicle staff writer Zander Frost reports: "No decision has been made" on whether to authorize or forbid marijuana dispensaries in Moreau, Town Supervisor Todd Kusnierz told The Chronicle.

He expects it to be discussed at the Town Board meeting, Dec. 14 at 7 p.m.

Dec. 31 is the deadline set by New York State to opt out of allowing sales. Otherwise it's allowed permanently. Towns can opt in later if they opt out initially.
Participating municipalities receive tax

revenue from marijuana sales.

The majority of the board is receptive to allowing it, Chronicle interviews indicate. "It's legal, I don't have a problem with it," said Councilman John Donohue.

"One thing I don't like is they're going to have bars or...consumption stations. I'm not a big fan of that. But as far as legal sales, I don't have a problem with it."

Mr. Donohue said, "People with substance abuse problems — that isn't the substance that's the problem. I know. I'm a recovering alcoholic. Alcohol is not the problem. JD [John Donohue himself] is."

Councilman Kyle Noonan said, "I would support dispensaries in the town of Moreau...I would not support on site consumption."

He said he has no personal affinity for cannabis. "Most people laugh at me when I tell them this: I've never smoked weed in my entire life. A lot of people are like, 'Ha! You sound like Bill Clinton!"

Mr. Noonan said, "But I do not want to pass up on an opportunity that most of our neighboring towns that we share bor-

ders with are going to take advantage of." On the issue, "It's 50/50 what I hear from residents," Mr. Noonan said.

He added, "I hate the smell in public,

I absolutely abhor it. I don't think it's

right."

Councilman Alan Van Tassel said, "I'm not going to be in support of opting out. I don't believe that's the direction we're

headed." He said, "I need to do a whole lot more study, analysis of on-site consumption, specifically around other communities around the country that have done that and what the positive or negative impacts of that."


Incoming Councilman Mark Stewart, who takes office Jan. 1, told *The Chronicle* he plans to look into it further "before the first of the year here."

Cerrone eyes Moreau industrial park for growing marijuana

Cerrone Builders initially planned a commercial marijuana growing facility on Route 9 in the Town of Moreau, Supervisor Todd Kusnierz tells The Chronicle, but "our zoning administrator determined that it did not meet code." Now, he said, Cerrone is considering purchasing a lot in the Moreau Industrial park for their marijuana plant. Mr. Kusnierz said it "is permitted in the industrial park, and I think that's an ideal location for that type of facility. And I'm supportive of their application should it get before the planning board.'

of lying around lately,


really misses big sister.

like lasagna, chicken marsala and pastas plus house specialties such as Country Style Rigatoni (\$19.95) with sausage, broccoli, onions, garlic and cannel-lini beans in light broth with parmesan cheese, and Zesty Zucca Rustica (\$16.95) Spaghetti Squash tossed with sausage, tomatoes, peppers, onion, garlic and cheese in a rustic tomato sauce.

Kevin says of the menu, "There's some stuff on there that probably 30%, 40% of it that you will not see in other places."

Theresa calls Kevin's Chicken Parme-



san (\$18.95) "out of this world. It's not from a patty, he hand breads it, hand trims the chicken."

She also touts the Chicken Scarpiello (\$21.95), a "spicy chicken dish with a white sauce. And we've had a great response to our Seafood Fra Diavlo" (\$23.95), Shrimp and Scallops in a "zesty red sauce" over linguini, says the menu,

The extensive bar has 10 beers on tap, "from pilsners to stouts," says Theresa, including several craft locals, plus Downeast hard cider and Truly seltzer. "The Downeast is unbelievable. We use it to make a caramel apple drink," she says.

The changing dessert menu offered in its first week included tiramisu cake, Italian lemon cream cake and a Chocolate Brandied Amaretto Mousse.

Generations in the restaurant biz

Kevin's restaurant roots run generations. "My father owned like six different places," he said. "Sandpiper in Watervliet. Otto's on Latham Circle was my grandfather, Otto...The Rusty Nail in Clifton Park, and the Study and Lounge.

Theresa adds, "His dad actually built


the Rusty Nail, built the building."
"I'm originally from Latham," Kevin says. "But I've been living up in this area since the early 80's.'

Theresa says, "I met Kevin when I was 18 at his family, his dad's restaurant," Peabody's on Lake George.

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

for the late Mr. Harwood, a teacher who created the vast, fondly remembered Log Village Grist Mill Museum.

Theresa's brother Mark Harwood operates The Bog Tavern, also in Washington County, in Cambridge.

Kevin said, "We don't have a ton of fried food. We're making pizzas. Some unusual ones." The 12-inch pizzas include the familiar — cheese, \$14.95, and margherita or meatlovers, \$15.95 — but also Spinach and Artichoke (\$17.95) and The Figaro (\$18.95), that Theresa says is a Fig Pizza with Bacon that is "sweet but salty. People love that pizza."

"Řevin's gotten really good at the crusts," she adds.

Kevin says the rigatoni with sausage and broccoli is "a country peasant...dish" whose recipe comes from a "famous restaurant" in New York City now closed.

Theresa elaborates, it's "a little broccoli with a light sauce, not a creamy sauce, a really light sauce. With cannellini beans." The signature spaghetti squash dish —

"it's almost like a twice baked potato but it's got vegetables and tomato sauce and sausage," Theresa said.

She says, "I'm one of these foodies — I'll go to one place, because I want that. And

we're going to try to do some of that here." Kevin said, "We know from experience that we would travel to someplace even out in the boonies....'

"To have one thing that we liked on the

menu," Theresa completed the thought.

DeNatale's is situated at the rear of its building, on its northeast corner. Do they have qualms about being in the back of instead of the front? "Nope, not even one. There's a new parking lot it's got 102, 101 spaces over there, free municipal parking lot. Is it harder to be seen? Maybe a little, but we're hoping that our food will people will talk."

Theresa said they see the whole Hudson Falls block as "a destination. We'll have this, the Strand, we'll have Mullen's," referring to the former Maxwell's Pub, next-door to the south of the Strand.

"We want to rock the block," Theresa said. "I grew up in East Hartford and I remember when Salutos was — we did all of our family gatherings there because the prime rib was really good and the pasta was really good.

"We're tickled about Triad's [music store] moving in. It's gotten to be kind of music and artsy on this corner of Hudson Falls and I'm excited about it.

"It seems like there's a lot of traffic, Jonathan [Newell] is doing a great, great job with The Strand, and Scott [Boucher] is doing a great job with his food [at Mullen's]. We'll serve different stuff than he does. So I think it will complement each

door, "we saw the potential." "The bar wasn't here. The ceilings were out..." Theresa said. "It was in pretty rough shape. The floors weren't there...


the front of the bar [they've built and that Kevin designed] is repurposed out of the ceiling.' Covid set them way back. "We had

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

A telling example of a constitutional exercise of this authority is found in no less a lawless place and time than the old "wild west." There and then, for example, when Wyatt Earp and Bat Masterson wanted to stop the cowboys from shooting up Dodge City, they took the cowboys' guns away.

Any challenge to such a constitutional exercise of authority was met, not with an appeal to the Supreme Court, but with the butt, if not the barrel, of the marshal's gun.

Security is not just the privilege of the rich, like Donald Trump, who professes his love of the Second Amendment and all things NRA while at the same time denying visitors to his private golf clubs or the attendees at his rallies the right to bear and bring their AR-15s or Glock 9mms. Security is the privilege of all members of a free State, in their homes,

in their schools, in their marketplaces, and places of employment and worship, and especially in those public places where their opinions are to be heard in free and open debate.

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
Werner Feibes, 92, \$10 million **Hyde art donor**

Chronicle Managing Editor Cathy DeDe writes: Werner Feibes, the Schenectady architect who with his husband James Schmitt donated their extensive modern art collection to the Hyde Collection, passed away from Alzheimer's disease on September 16, in Louisville, Kentucky.

On Nov. 21, several Hyde members attended the graveside service in Schenectady, director Norman Dascher tells The Chronicle. He and curator Jonathan Canning were among those who spoke.

Mr. Feibes was predeceased by Mr. Schmitt, his partner in life, art collecting, and in their architectural firm.

In addition to the art collection, valued at the time around \$9 million, Mr. Feibes donated \$1 million to the Hyde for creation of the Feibes-Schmitt Gallery that is dedicated to Modern and Contempo-



rary art. The \$10 million gift was hailed as "transformative."

"He was remarkably kind and generous and ahead of his time as a collector," Mr. Dascher said. With the Hyde gift, "He planted the seed and we are growing it."




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Dr. Kathleen Braico: So many diseases halted by vaccines; says, get vaccinated so Covid stops too

No? You don't? — Then you may well have been born after the 1940's when vaccines became available to stop the three killer diseases of tetanus, diphtheria (which choked off the airway) and whooping cough (pertussis).

How about those long, hot summers when you languished at home, not allowed to go to the community pool to swim with your friends? Not allowed to go to day camp or parties because your parents were terrified that you would become paralyzed by polio?

- Then you were probably born after 1955 when Jonas Salk's polio vaccine first became available and grateful parents rushed to get their children vaccinated. Due to the vaccine, polio went from paralyzing tens of thousands of people a year, to being eliminated from the U.S. by 1979.

Do you remember when you spent weeks of your childhood in bed, isolated from your friends and missing school because you had measles, then mumps, then German measles (rubella), then chicken pox? If you don't, you were probably born after 1960's when the MMR could protect you from the odds of getting the first 3, or after 1995, when the vaccine became available for chicken

How about when your little cousin was hospitalized or perhaps even died of meningitis — or was it pneumonia? It could have been the germs HIB or meningococcus or pneumococcus that

No, it didn't happen? —Then they were probably born after 1985 for HIB, or 2005 for meningococcus or 2010 for pneumococcus, because that's when those vaccines hugely reduced those killer diseases in children.

Surely you remember your kids getting hepatitis A or maybe rotavirus diarrhea? Remember those sleepless nights with the febrile vomiting toddler w massive diarrhea? No? Then thank your doctor and their armament of vaccines.

How about cancer? Wouldn't you like to protect your kids against it? The HPV vaccine can prevent throat cancer, as

well as cervical, vaginal, penile, anal, and vulvar cancers, and the Hepatitis B vaccine can prevent liver cancer as well as hepatitis.

Did you know that the technology used to develop the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines was already being studied for 10 years in an attempt to make other vaccines against cancers? That is why

the companies were able to pivot so quickly to use it to create the COVID vaccine.

Even the less effective flu vaccine has been estimated to save over 5700 lives a year in the U.S. In fact, if you receive the right vaccines today, you can travel to remote areas of the world without fear of getting Ebola, cholera, typhoid or Japanese encephalitis because you can

be vaccinated against those diseases. There are now 29 diseases that can be prevented by vaccines in humans, and another 11 protecting animals.

In 1900, 165 out of every 1000 infants died before they were one year old, and more than 200 out of 1000 died before

they were 5. Now that rate has dropped nearly 24 fold to 7 out of 1000.

Public health measures caused this reduction in deaths, and one of the most important tools was and remains vaccination against communicable diseases.

Doctors in the U.S. today have likely never seen a case of smallpox, diphtheria, polio, measles, rubella or even bacterial meningitis due to these diseases being nearly eliminated in the U.S. through immunization.

It is quite likely that you are here because you, your parents and maybe even your grandparents received immunizations, or at least lived in a community that was so well immunized (>90-95% of the population immune) that there was no chance of coming in contact with these diseases.

With a history of vaccine successes like that, why would you not want to be vaccinated against the COVID virus that has already killed nearly three quarters of a million Americans and close to 5 million people world-wide?

Realizing the huge role that herd immunity plays in ending this pandemic, why would you not want to play your part in protecting not only yourself but also those you love and everyone else in your community?

In spite of the widespread availability of the vaccine, some people will remain vulnerable. By getting vaccinated yourself, you can help that woman stocking shelves in the grocery store who is on chemotherapy for breast cancer whose immune system is compromised, the child with a chronic illness who is too young to be vaccinated, the essential worker that is exposed to the virus on a daily basis, and more.

If you plan on trusting those doctors

and nurses at the hospital who will be taking care of you when you are injured or sick, managing your ventilator when you can't breathe, your dialysis because your kidneys failed and your fluid and oxygen requirements when you get your heart attack, why wouldn't you trust them when they ask you to please, please get vaccinated against COVID?

Why would you sentence them to the agony of watching yet another patient die a needless death, from a disease that could have been prevented?

Contrary to popular opinion, vaccines are not just an individual choice. They are at their most effective when they can protect an entire population through that famous "herd immunity."

Get vaccinated against COVID! Then you can tell your grandchildren about when you survived the pandemic, and when you helped the rest of the world survive it as well. Be a vaccine hero!

forming a large ad hoc committee to address DEI, as charged by the state Board of Regents. She said the first step is working with CASDA, the Capital District School District Association, "to develop common language and terminology."

Interim Superintendent Douglas Huntley, in an e-mail conversation with The Chronicle, quoted a regional schools statement: "The goal of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion efforts is to create a positive learning environment for all students and eliminate barriers that limit a student's chance to be successful."

At Lake George, he said, "This work does not include changes to the curriculum or how it is taught.

The committee is expected to include about 40 community members, with the only qualification "being a stakeholder in Lake George schools." The goal: "To review sample policies, and receive community input and feedback," beginning as soon as December.

Several community members at the meeting asked or were invited to join the committee as well. Those who spoke were by and large wary — concerned that the district may already be phasing out the Native American head in its logos, school rings, apparel, and - in many cases combining the issues — concerned that DEI is a couched way to introduce Critical Race Theory into the school curriculum.

At the board meeting, one woman said, "I just don't want our school to become political...Once you start placing race on our people, that becomes a problem. I just don't want that being forced on their heads just because the rest of the world around our tiny Lake George town is hopping on the 'woke' train."

Rod Cornelius told the school board, "In my experience, this community has been welcoming to everyone, of every color, creed and religion." Paraphrasing Critical Race Theory, he said, "From what I hear it would be tragic to teach children that they are oppressed or an oppressor, or that because of the color of their skin they're privileged or they're not."

Several speakers asked why the board is taking up either of these issues at this moment, particularly while the district is without a permanent Superintendent.

Addressed Warren County Board

Lake George residents Linda Clark and Lisa Doster addressed both the School Board and the Warren County Board, and, at The Chronicle's request, provided their written texts.

"Who is driving this?" Ms. Doster wrote. Her concern, echoing many who spoke at the School Board meeting, is that "the symbol of the Indian Warrior head is being phased out in a way hoping no one will notice.

She added, "CRT or what is now being marketed to our teachers and our school as Diversity, Equity and Inclusion...is now becoming part of our local community, in our local schools, right here in our own backyard...When we create labels we are actually pushing further restrictions and division in individuals."

Ms. Clark said, "This is a public school and parents should have a say in what children are taught...When issues and policies are created that run deep into our government, such as the CRT and DEI, both promoted and founded by a political party and a left agenda, the political party on the right has a moral, ethical and societal obligation to balance and/or right what is happening."
