After contacting the APA & DEC, I find that no agency has jurisdiction regarding this. New York State has regulations on everything we do, yet there are no guidelines regulating personal ice eaters/bubbler systems on our lakes?

Bubblers for residential docks are opening up spaces up to 200 feet out into the lake and 200 to 300 feet along the shore. An area this large is not needed to "protect" a dock or boathouse. I live in a boathouse, have

Castelli: Rep. Elise Stefanik has ‘treasonous spirit’ of ‘traitor Benedict Arnold’

Speaking in Crandall Park on the Jan. 6 one-year anniversary of what he called the “insurrection” at the Capitol in Washington, D.C. that he called the “greatest threat to our democracy since the Civil War,” Democrat Matt Castelli said “Congresswoman Elise Stefanik violated her oath to the Constitution that day, and has continued to do so since.”

On 1-year anniversary of Jan. 6, seeks to defeat her in November, backs law to disqualify ‘insurrectionists’

“Her actions remind me of another individual with ties to the North Country, an individual whose success in battle at Fort Ticonderoga, Valcour Island and Saratoga inspired hope in the future of this military officer’s role in the new republic, not unlike the hope we once had for Elise Stefanik.

“But those hopes were dashed when his lust for power and recognition led him to betray America. I’m talking about the traitor Benedict Arnold, and his treasonous spirit is alive and well in Congresswoman Stefanik.”

Speaking of the events of Jan. 6, 2021, Mr. Castelli said Rep. Elise Stefanik violated her oath to the Constitution that day, and has continued to do so since.

“She defied the Constitution and the will of the American people by refusing to certify the Electoral College count.

“She promoted the same Big Lie falsehoods that she was fed by the former president’s inner circle to keep Donald Trump in power, despite him losing a free and fair election.

“And since that day, she has tried to thwart attempts to investigate what happened on January 6 at every turn.

“She voted against a bipartisan independent investigation of the attack. She led the effort to oust Liz Cheney, and on the same day that police officers testified about the brutality that they endured.”

Stefanik: Castelli was part of ‘coup’ attempt to ‘overthrow’ Trump

In response to a Chronicle query about Matt Castelli’s likening Rep. Elise Stefanik to Benedict Arnold, Alex DeGrasse, “Team Stefanik” Executive Director, replied, in part:

“Downstate Far-Left Democrat Matt Castelli launched his campaign by disgracefully comparing January 6th to 9/11 during the week of the 20th anniversary of the terrorist attacks.

“He obviously knows Benedict Arnold well as Castelli is widely known to have been involved in the illegal coup as a member of Obama’s national security staff under Susan Rice who stayed for the transition to attempt to overthrow President Trump.”

GF Hospital limits visitors again: Covid

Glens Falls Hospital again reduced visitation effective Wednesday, Jan. 12, citing high community spread of COVID-19.

Inpatients may have **one unique visitor per day** during visiting hours every day from 4-8 p.m. Visitors may not leave and return, and must be at least age 18.

They should enter through the West Entrance, and bring and wear their own mask at all times.

Patients in imminent end-of-life and compassionate exceptions are unchanged.

Exceptions include on day of discharge, a visitor can accompany an inpatient outside of visiting hours.

At the Snuggery, up to two support people are allowed, and at the Special Care Nursery, a birth parent and a significant other are allowed.

For same day surgeries and outpatient procedures, one visitor can accompany the patient during admission and wait for them in the waiting area or Au Bon Pain.

\$16-million Hudson Headwaters facility approved for GF

The City of Glens Falls approved the site plan for a \$16 million Hudson Headwaters Health Network facility between 30 Larose St. and 29 South Western Ave., just north of Gateway Dermatology, the *Albany Business Review* reported.

It will include 17,442 square feet for primary care services, and 14,363 more for the federally funded PACE Center for elderly care, the *Business Review* said.

The primary care portion will replace Hudson Headwaters' Broad Street facility, in use since the 1990s. That location will then be used mostly for urgent care.

Rare experience: Relaxation!

I'm thrilled to report that this year I relaxed during our annual one-week break from publishing. That doesn't come easily to me. My rubber band stays pretty taut. I think about this newspaper & issues most of my waking hours and many of my sleeping ones.

This time, though, I actually unwound. It helped that we took our break in the first week of January instead of between Christmas and New Year's.

4. Sunday, Jan. 2, home again, I spent the whole day watching NFL football after not watching even a whole game this season. I love gunslinger quarterbacks like Patrick Mahomes. Today it was Josh Allen priming for the playoffs with the Bills, cocky Joe Burrow coming of age with Cincinnati and, at night, Aaron Rodgers offering yet another clinic (and kept his State Farm gig too).

I can't say I was eager to resume full tilt responsibility this week, but my mind and spirit bounce back pretty quickly now that my rubber band loosened up.

To save democracy, let Washington overrule the voters?

Chronicle editor Mark Frost writes: Democrats now have two separate strategies to vanquish Rep. Elise Stefanik and others they deem insurrectionists.

One, beat her on Election Day, Nov. 8. They're pursuing that prospect with a vengeance and ferocity akin to what Rep. Stefanik brings to battle herself. That's politics, 2022 style. No mercy, no prisoners.

Defeating her is a tall order. She's a four-term incumbent who wins mightily. But Rep. Stefanik hasn't faced voters since that dark day on Jan. 6, 2021.

Maybe they've turned. Maybe they now see her as Benedict Arnold, as Matt Castelli depicts her. I know some people who say they previously voted for Elise who say they won't do so anymore. Maybe she loses.

But what if she wins? That brings us to strategy number-two. Mr. Castelli and Democrats nationally are pushing for a new law that will give four people in Washington, D.C. the power to override the voters' decision.

The law would empower the U.S. Attorney General to bring a civil action to interpret and enforce Section 3 of the 14th Amendment of the Constitution that says anyone who engages in insurrection is not eligible to serve in office. Then, said Mr. Castelli, "a three-judge panel from the U.S. District Court for D.C." will decide the case "using a clear and convincing standard of evidence," less than "beyond a reasonable doubt."

Proponents of the law are certain Rep. Stefanik is guilty, but for now that is merely their opinion.

Some others' opinion is that they believe in her. How will Stefanik supporters — and the general public — see giving four appointees in D.C. authority to determine who their Congress member is or isn't? Power to the people or power taken from them?

Marijuana: Who’s in, who opted out of sale, on-site use

Use of cannabis has been legalized now throughout New York, but local municipalities could choose whether to allow businesses within their borders to sell it and offer on-premises consumption. Local governments had until Dec. 31, 2021 to opt out. If they didn’t opt out, cannabis sales and on-premises consumption automatically are allowed. In the City of Glens Falls, Town of Queensbury and Village of Hudson Falls, for instance, cannabis dispensaries and consumption sites will now be allowed. Lake George Village and Town opted not to allow them. They can opt in later, but once in, a municipality can’t opt out.

Kevin Geraghty elected Warren County Board Chairman

Warrensburg Town Supervisor Kevin Geraghty was elected Chairman of the Warren County Board of Supervisors at the Board's annual organizational meeting on Thursday morning, Jan. 6.

Mr. Geraghty defeated Queensbury At-Large Supervisor Brad Magowan by a weighted vote of 578-424.

"A majority of the Supervisors voted for me, two from the City, two from Queensbury, a good cross section of the whole county, so that's a plus," Mr. Geraghty told *The Chronicle*. "Up-county and down, that's a monicker people like to use but it's not how I see it."

Citing perceptions of strife among board members, Mr. Geraghty said, "I'm going to listen to everyone. I'm not going to be obstructionist. Hopefully my colleagues won't be either."

Last year's leadership — Chair Rachel Seeber and Doug Beaty and Claudia Brayer whom Ms. Seeber appointed Majority and Minority Leader — all supported Mr. Magowan.

Ms. Seeber chose not to seek a second year as chair. She told *The Chronicle* later, in large part because the position is time consuming and she aims to complete her PhD. — currently on hold — this year.

The vote fell along what has come to be more or less expected lines.

Ms. Braymer nominated her fellow Democrat Jack Diamond for board chair, but he declined, citing "the pain and anguish" experienced by prior board chairwoman Ms. Seeber last year.

Geraghty's thoughts

Mr. Geraghty told *The Chronicle* he planned this week to research several issues raised regarding "Rules of the Board" during the meeting, and to begin to decide on committee assignments.

He said he does not expect to appoint a Majority or Minority leader, positions that

Ms. Seeber introduced last year.

Tabled to be referred to committee: Ms. Seeber moved that the full board vote on a Vice Chair. She nominated Mr. Magowan for the position.

That position has been held by the chair of the Finance Committee, appointed by the Board chair, since 1968. It led to a lengthy discussion that was finally tabled, sent to committee.

Also tabled: Ms. Braymer suggested the Board meet twice a month, potentially offering more opportunity for more issues to be discussed by the full board.

Meanwhile, the Board did decide to eliminate its \$6,000 stipends for the positions of Majority and Minority Leader.

However, they changed the original resolution presented by the Personnel Committee, reinstating a \$20,000 stipend for the Board Chair.

The stipend vote went the same as the Board Chairmanship vote. Supervisors who backed Mr. Geraghty voted *not* to eliminate the \$20,000 stipend.

There was a briefly heated moment, when Mr. Dickinson reacted angrily to Mr. Magowan's suggestion that Town Supervisors, paid both by the County and their towns, have a financial advantage over At-Large Supervisors who only receive county pay.

"That's the stupidest thing I ever heard," Mr. Dickinson said, amending his comment to, "I strongly disagree," after a Point of Order was called.

Sagamore Ice Bar: ‘Exclusive’ now by design

The Sagamore's Glacier Ice Bar — which launched the region's winter-season craze — is back for the ninth year. It'll run on two separate weekends: Fridays and Saturdays, **Jan. 21-22 and Jan. 28-29**, at the Bolton Landing resort.

This year's event is "exclusive" by design Sagamore General Manager Tom Guay tells *The Chronicle*.

Last year, because of Covid, the Sagamore limited attendance to guests staying overnight and only opened 200 of its rooms, "a far cry from the 400 we have," Mr. Guay said.

He said that even with guests required to wear masks, socially distance and not dance, "It was a much better event."

"It was more exclusive to the people who did come," said Mr. Guay, and the Sagamore opted to retain that feel.

They plan to hold reservations to 225 rooms, a little more than half-capacity. Given the expected demand, winter discounts won't apply on Ice Bar weekends.

To attend, most guests will have to purchase a room — for a minimum two nights — at about \$700 a night.

Some day passes are also available for \$25. The price includes parking.

"Rooms are still available both weekends, but we do anticipate selling out," Mr. Guay said.

Day passes are still available too. "We're not at the point of limiting it yet," he said. "There are plenty for both weekends." He does suggest, don't wait to buy.

Some history, from this writer's perspective: When the Sagamore's Glacier Ice Bar launched, it was decidedly upscale. Patrons dressed to impress, winter-style, in fur or faux fur and fancy boots, suavely braving the cold.

Then, to be frank, success generated a party vibe, crowds crammed throughout the resort. It was tough even to get to the ice bar, or enjoy the spectacle.

"We want it to be an exclusive, nice event that our guests are going to enjoy," Mr. Guay said. "We don't want the huge numbers anymore. I still think there's a value there, for guests to really have an elevated experience."

He said this year, the music and dancing are back, with DJ Andy Pratt at the helm.

The Ice Bar returns to the main terrace overlooking Lake George and Dome Island. In prior, busier years it had moved to the Shelving Rock Terrace, less visible beneath a tent and behind the full crowd.

Again this year, the Ice Bar will be carved from about 18,000 pounds of ice.

There will also be interactive ice carvings, themed food and cocktails, a free s'mores bar, and options for outdoor dining in heated igloos.

Dining reservations are highly recommended, especially in the igloos.

Stefanik statement on Jan. 6

On Jan. 6, 2022, “Congresswoman Elise Stefanik today released the following statement:

“On January 6, 2021, I strongly and clearly condemned the violence and destruction that occurred at the U.S. Capitol — just as I strongly condemned the entire year of violence and lawlessness that raged across our nation throughout 2020. Our nation owes a debt of gratitude to the U.S. Capitol Police for their bravery and heroism on that day and to those who sacrifice and serve in law enforcement every day across the country.

“It is unacceptable that one year later the American people still do not have answers as to why the Capitol was left so vulnerable and how to ensure it never happens again.

“Rather than focusing on improving the security of the Capitol and adopting all the recommendations from the U.S. Capitol Police, Nancy Pelosi and House Democrats are instead using their illegitimate partisan sham of a committee to shred Constitutional precedent and punish their political opponents. It is unprecedented, and it is dangerous.

“The American people deserve to know that the ONLY office that is off limits to this investigation is the Speaker’s office. The Speaker of the House oversees the Sergeant at Arms who, at her direction, has refused to turn over documents and communications related to January 6th. The fact is that Nancy Pelosi bears responsibility as Speaker of the House for leaving the Capitol so vulnerable despite multiple warnings and requests, and now she is responsible for the cover-up of that

empower this three-judge panel to issue penalties that include removing individuals from office, disqualifying them from future office and stripping them of government benefits such as a pension.”

Mr. Castelli said, “This legislation reaffirms that eligibility for federal office depends on an allegiance to the United States, and that those who abandon their oath to the Constitution should be removed from and disqualified from office, and that we will not allow for continued insurrection from these individuals, when the will of the people doesn’t go their way.”

“I take this personally,” said Mr. Castelli. “I understand the weight of the oath because it’s the oath that I took 16 years ago when I first joined the CIA. And it’s the same oath that each member of Congress takes that those who serve in our military take, to support and defend the Constitution against all enemies, foreign and domestic. That oath binds our allegiance to the United States, not to a political party, not to a president, but to the Constitution that establishes our government of by and for the people.

Bridie Farrell: ‘We must listen to each other more’

Bridie Farrell, who is **vying with Matt Castelli and Matthew Putorti** for the Democratic nomination to **run against Congresswoman Elise Stefanik**, spoke on Jan. 6 at a “prayer vigil with the community of Serenac, NY...on the anniversary of the January 6th insurrection at the U.S. Capitol,” said a press release.

Ms. Farrell said in part, “the January 6th insurrectionists didn’t protest. They rioted, became violent, and threatened all of our freedoms. This is something we cannot forget but it is also something we should and must learn from.”

Ms. Farrell said, “We must listen to each other more, listen to our neighbors and friends but also those with whom we disagree because civil disagreements and civic discourse is at the basis of our freedoms. We need to move past cynicism and dissent and toward a common set of values...”

“As I stated on the House Floor as the Representative for New York’s 21st Congressional District, I believe that the most precious foundation and the most sacred covenant of our Republic is the right to vote and the faith in the security of our nation’s free and fair elections.

I am committed to working to strengthen our elections and rebuild that faith, so that our elections are free, fair, secure, safe, and most importantly, that they are according to the United States Constitution.”


The release quoted at length from Ms. Stefanik’s remarks last year on Jan. 6.

“The Representatives of the American people in this House are standing up for three fundamental American beliefs: the right to vote is sacred, that a representative has a duty to represent his or her constituents, and that the rule of law is a hallmark of our nation.”

“And in the spirit of healing, those are not my words, those are the words of you, Madam Speaker. From this very same Chamber, when some of my colleagues and friends across the aisle objected to the 2005 electoral college certification.

“In fact, there were objections on this Floor to the certification of nearly every Republican President in my lifetime — in 1989, in 2001, in 2005, and in 2017.

“So history is our guide that the People’s sacred House is the appropriate venue for a peaceful debate. And this peaceful debate serves as a powerful condemnation of the violence that perpetrated our Capitol Grounds today. The violence that was truly un-American.”

Our worlds intersect in art museums, where we’ve spent countless hours together — including on one of our very first dates, when we first began to realize we’d each found our forever person.

Here are a few ways we did it, many of which can be creatively adapted to other mutual interests.

Venue: The Hyde

• **I’ve loved The Hyde Collection since I was a child**, so we were honored when they agreed to go out on a limb and allow us to use their beautiful space to host a full wedding reception, especially during a pandemic when rules kept changing — and we had to post-pone the big day from the original date in 2020 to 2021.

The venue you choose really does set the tone. Giving our guests — especially the out-of-towners — a chance to explore this upstate gem and all its offerings made the whole event feel uniquely artsy, relaxed and unmistakably “us.”

Artist-made invitations

• **For our invitations**, we opted for a modern, hand-painted design created by independent artist Ashley Austin of Fine Day Press. We found her on Etsy. She was even able to match the colors to the Hyde logo, and she made us coordinating day-of signs to post at the reception, helping

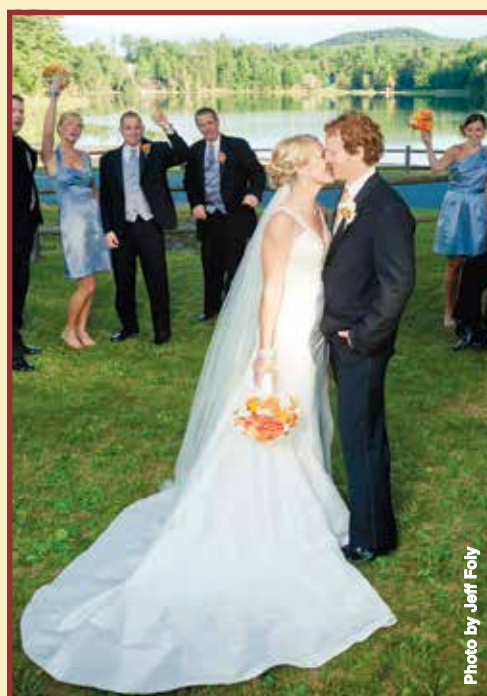

to pull everything together.

Beyond china: Your gift registry

- **When it comes to gift registries**, more couples are thinking outside the “fine china” box. Including donations to charitable causes, options related to personal hobbies and experience-based gifts are becoming increasingly popular.

In addition to traditional household items, we registered for memberships to support a few beloved cultural institutions. We also created an Art Fund, which we’ll be using to fill our home with classic prints and unique local finds.

Ceremony & readings

- **During our ceremony**, we had a close friend read Frank O’Hara’s “Having a Coke With You.” A longtime favorite poem of ours, it is an ode to art, to New York City (where we lived for seven years), and to finding the exact right person.

Ceremony readings are a good place to infuse personality — even humor — into the proceedings.

Tables: Not just a number

- **Table names are a popular way** to bring a creative spin to your reception, and for good reason. Naming tables after significant locations, movies, books — or in our case, artists — makes for appealing centerpieces, provides a window into the couple’s life, and avoids the fraught process of numbering tables. (Who’s Number 2? Who’s 15th?)

We chose 16 special-to-us artists, placed a painting by one on each table

and designated place cards by artist.

The place cards included miniature stickers that Michael made through a vendor he found online. Each sticker was a detail from the guest’s designated table painting.

Collecting vintage-style frames for those table paintings during the course of our wedding planning also enabled another hobby: Scouring vintage shops, thrift stores and the Internet for “finds.”

Although all this required extra effort, it was one of my favorite parts of planning, elevating a wedding task into an enjoyable team endeavor.

Other fun ‘bits’

- **As long as we were already framing little art prints**, we continued the motif for the rest of the decor and tables.

On our bar, we placed Édouard Manet’s “A Bar at the Folies-Bergère.”

In the restroom, guests were treated (cheekily) to Dada artist Marcel Duchamp’s “Fountain.”

A Roy Lichtenstein cherry pie graced our dessert table — itself covered in a deluge of homemade pies provided in lieu of wedding cake by our friends, family members, and Auntie Mame’s Pies (delicious!).

As a bonus, we now have many of the

art prints from the wedding displayed in our home. Several of the frames, we were able to reuse as we gifted wedding pictures to our loved ones.

A real, live artist!

- **When my mom first floated the idea to have a live plein-air artist** painting the scene at the reception, I was skeptical. Would it be too cheesy? Over-the-top? Intrusive?

Trusting her gut and the talent of local artist Corey Pitkin was one the best decisions we made. Seeing Corey at work was a delight, and the one-of-a-kind painting he created has made a cherished memory into a family heirloom — another treat for our guests that, in the end, is a treasure for us.

Other forever pieces

- **As with that painting**, we wanted more than great memories from our Big Day, incorporating our commitment to one another and our love for our community in other distinctive ways.

For our Ketubah — the traditional Jewish wedding contract, often a keepsake item — we commissioned a piece from a talented Ketubah artist, in the style of Jewish artist Mark Rothko.

Our Chuppah (Jewish ceremony canopy) was hand-felted by Glens Falls fiber

artist and close family friend Joy Muller-McCoola.

Rather than the usual guest book, we asked everyone to sign the pages of a coffeetable book of modern art that Michael gave me more than a decade ago.

Now that book is filled with the well-wishes of our loved ones, alongside Michael’s original birthday inscription that reminds me of how far we’ve come, and how much more we get to do together.

A final thought

All weddings are unique, as each couple’s love story is theirs alone. **To add creative oomph** and make for a memorable guest experience, find ways to incorporate the things you and your partner love throughout the celebration. Our art-filled wedding was truly one of the best days of my life.

Wedding advice from event firm on prioritizing & saving money

Chronicle editor Mark Frost writes: The following release arrived by email at *The Chronicle* on behalf of a firm called **Vanessa Events, Production & Hospitality** (www.vanessaevents.com) led by Vanessa Ohayon.

1) Choosing your venue is where you want to start your savings — as it usually is the largest portion of the budget. For better pricing, choose off-season or mid-week to celebrate, and the venue is also more likely to throw in some free upgrades to sweeten the deal. Look out for what is included, but more specifically what IS NOT included, so later, you are not hit up with any surprise charges.

2) If choosing between a DJ and band, go with a DJ and add some live-on instrumental acts — like a saxophone, violin, or drummer. Bonus points if that musician can play a variety of instruments or even better, hire multiple musicians to play separately and simultaneously. It is a game-changer to adding elements of surprise, and highlighting peaks in the evening.

3) With respect to the menu, there is the ongoing joke that people always complain about the food at a wedding. So, in that case, let them! Give consideration to the way a menu is designed, executed, and served to your guests, as you can save some coin in this area as well. Instead of having guests stand in line at a buffet, as opposed to the costly service option of paying for additional waiters to provide guests individually plated selections, choose family style and shared plates served to the center of the table for most of the courses.

4) Lighting is such an important element to any event, and is often overlooked, as people don't understand the magnitude of the impact it makes on the night. For outdoor events, string lighting is a favorite. It always adds that magical touch, without breaking the bank, while also feeling super authentic, and please make sure to get them on a dimmer! Of course, natural light in all its forms, daytime sunlight, and evening candlelight!

5) Before deciding to do a backyard wedding, investigate the extra costs that you might incur that would otherwise be included with a venue. As much as I love a backyard whimsical wedding, I also know they can add unexpected expenses. Think rentals for tables and chairs, and glassware, silverware and plates too. Consider sound systems and lighting for the evening and the potential need for a generator — not to mention all the things you will feel you need to fix up now that everyone will be in your home :)

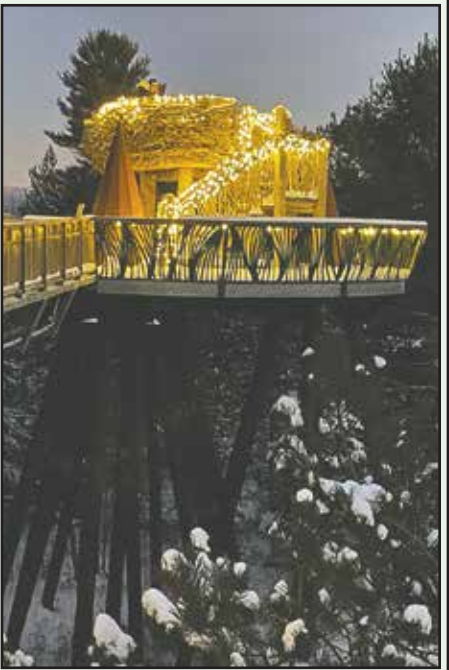
Walk on the 'Wild' side: What a Wow!

her to what had happened. Now Mrs. Dutra calls it the “Best Christmas present ever.”

Ms. Ray featured the Rachel’s Spice product again on Monday — “except this time,” says Mrs. Dutra, “she literally held the bottle in her hand and was like, ‘I’m going to be lazy about this because I really want to give a good shout-out to this product. Rachel’s Spice Company.’”

That triggered a new wave of orders. “I think we did 45 orders from the first episode...And this last one I think we beat that. They’re still rolling in right now,” says Mrs. Dutra.

She said she rarely gets online orders. “For the past two years, I was just trying to keep the cafe afloat, which has taken all of my energy.”

Now they’re shipping across the country and internationally to Edmonton, Canada.

All 3 are Lake George grads

Rachael Ray graduated from Lake George High School in 1986, Mr. Dutra in 1987 and Mrs. Dutra (maiden name Heym) in 2000.

Mrs. Dutra says, “She’s just a girl from Lake George just like me. And she worked for it. And she got there. And she shared that with me. And that to me is just amazing. It feels like we all live here.”

Mrs. Dutra says her “loaded salt and pepper” is “an amazing product. But it’s not a glamorous product. It’s literally salt, onion, garlic, and white pepper, so [it’s a] workhorse. It’s one you put on your table and you put it on everything and you don’t really think about it.”

“It was really cool for her to pick something like that...It’s not my fancy burger seasoning. It was like a legit ‘somebody’s going to use this every day.’”

Mrs. Dutra says Ms. Ray “said on the show this past Monday she’d received it as a gift. I don’t know what’s cooler. The fact that Rachael Ray actually used my seasoning on her show, or somebody thought my seasoning was worthy to give legit a celebrity.”

The boost comes after a difficult few

years. “I don’t even know if I can verbalize what it did for me,” Mrs. Dutra said.

“We had only been open for just over a year when everything went down [due to Covid]...We did not shut down. We just kept reinventing the wheel and it’s been an exhausting, draining, depressing two years.”

Mrs. Dutra said they were “at a crossroads” as to the future of the business. “We talked a lot about where are we going to go...Is this what we should be doing?”

But she says that being touted on Rachael Ray “was literally new inspiration. It was a breath of fresh air. It was like, oh my goodness, everything that I’ve been working so hard for and everything that I’ve been doing, somebody actually noticed with a little pull. The universe was telling me, Rachel, keep doing what you’re doing.”

Now she has restocked her spices and is looking forward. She hopes to eventually have a stand-alone spice and tea shop, and she’s planning a Youtube show.

Stec introduces bill to pool Adk. EMS services

State Senator Dan Stec said he has introduced legislation that would allow municipalities in the Adirondacks to pool resources to more efficiently deliver EMS coverage to residents and visitors.

“Due to its size and the difficulties in traveling, county emergency services for the Adirondacks face lengthier response times and more challenges providing essential services than in other parts of the state,” Mr. Stec said in a press release.

“By allowing Adirondack municipalities to create their own multi-town EMS districts, emergency medical services will be able to be delivered more reliably and rapidly. Permitting collaboration between our towns, counties and villages just makes sense.”

Mr. Stec said the change would help volunteer crews recruit, and cover a wider swath of terrain more quickly.

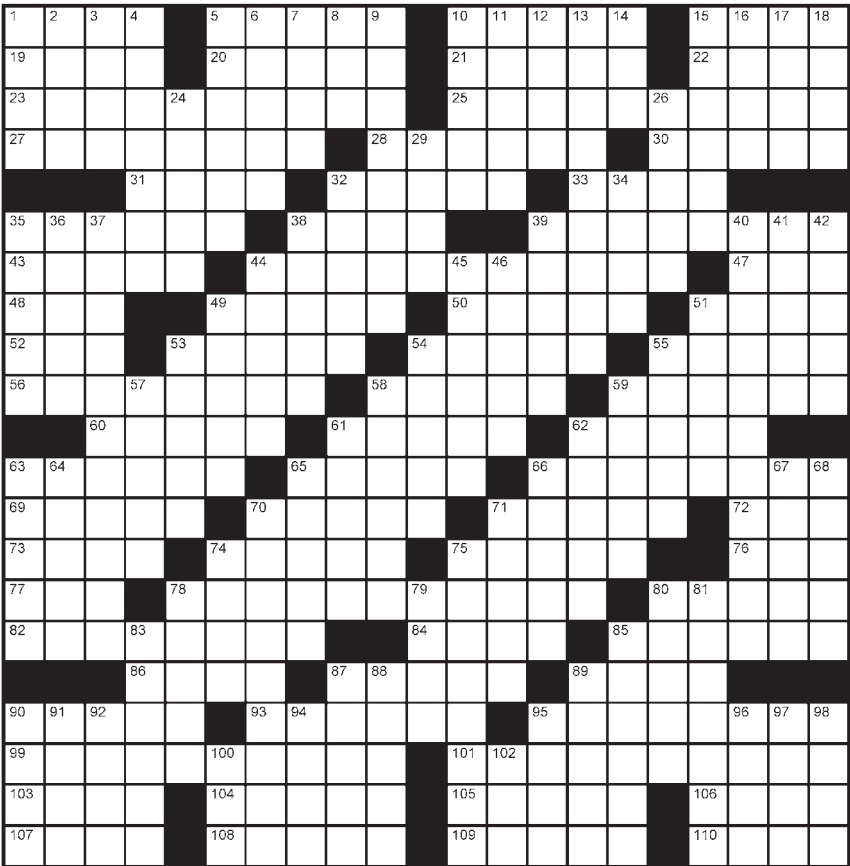

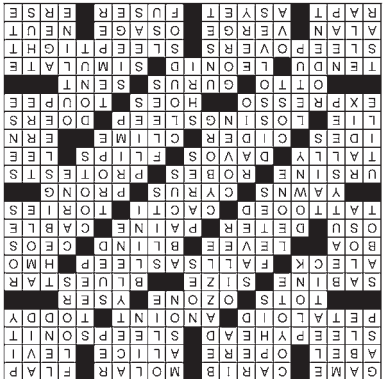

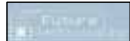

never run a bubbler in 40+ years and there is minimal wear and tear on my foundation.

There are regulations regarding stairways, beaches and rock walls along a shoreline; on how far out we can put our docks, moorings and swim rafts; but a property owner can open up a swath of water the size of a football field?

How many deer carcasses have we found, or other wildlife have drowned in these death traps that no one ever sees?

Does 12 months of sunlight entering our lake through these slaughter holes have an effect on the growth of the invasive aquatics taking over our lake?

Is it going to take the death of a child, a snowmobiler or cross country skier to enact some "rules" regarding this?

Is a homeowner liable for these open waters?

Instead of paying hundreds of dollars for these machines and the electricity

it takes to run them, pay a local to take your dock in and out each year, especially if you only have one or two aluminum docks at your personal residence.

At the very least, be conscious of the size of open water you are creating, consider the possible consequences of these death traps and imagine what dying under the ice in the frigid waters of an Adirondack lake must be like.

I will be writing to my NYS representatives to request some sort of legislation to monitor and regulate both bubblers and ice eaters on public waterways.

There is strength in numbers so the more letters, phone calls, e-mails, etc. they receive, the more they will pay attention to our requests. A list of our representatives can be found at warren-countyny.gov/gov/representatives.

I'll be sending a petition to local elected officials. The link to sign the petition is actionnetwork.org/petitions/regulations-for-winter-ice-eaters-bubblers-on-our-waterways.

Some guidelines for people to follow now. They should be aware that they may be liable if death or injury occur because of the open water they have created in front of their residence:

- **Place and angle** your devices with care to keep the impacted area as localized as possible;

- **Talk to your neighbors** to avoid doubling up in an area. It is possible that one bubbler will do the trick.
- **Equip your system** with a thermostat or timer control. Running 24/7 creates oversized openings.
- **Place clear signs** near the bubbling area, visible from all directions noting "Danger Open Water."
- **Run an amber light** to mark the hazard at night and during storms. Do not use a red light, as this can be mistaken for the brake lights of a snowmo-

bile and draw people towards the risk, rather than turn them away.

- **Monitor your property.** If you cannot be present, have someone check regularly to ensure the system is operating, the affected area is appropriate in size, and that the warning lights and markers remain in place.
- **Where possible,** a knowledgeable and experienced contractor should be used to configure the system.

Fred was a shy giant, champion for

our community, and irreplaceable, as was mentioned by Betty Little, Mark Behan, Mark Frost, and so many others in their tributes to this fine man.

Fred Monroe's devastating loss to his family, friends and associates is truly heartbreaking for us all. Rest In Peace, brother, you did good in your tenure as one of God's loving messengers .
