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Local effort to settle Afghan family here

"Led by Kathy and John Braico, a group of us has come together to form the Adirondack Welcome Circle with the intent of bringing an Afghan family to our area from where they are temporarily housed in an armed forces base," Richard Leach wrote The Chronicle.

The Braicos and Dr. Leach are retired local physicians. Dr. Leach said the "core group" as of late last week also includes:

Kate O'Keeffe, Jim Fuchs, Loren Baim, Carla Cumming, Chuck Cumming, Sandy Sherman, Christine McDonald, Gail Solomon, Joel Solomon, Joanne Swanson Maddocks, Linda Bush, Steve Bush, Terry Comeau, Ben Driscoll, Kim Meade, Mike Freebern, Dick Sipperly, Ruth Fish and Charles Meade

Dr. Leach says, "It is an enthusiastic and I dare say powerful group which I have no doubt will be able to do this despite lots of potential obstacles."

Of the fund-raising goal, Dr. Leach said, "We must shoot for \$2,275 per family member. The family will likely number either 4 or 5, so \$9,100 or \$11,375.

Elaborating on the effort, he said: "Partnering with an organization called Sponsor Circles and the U.S. government, who have vetted the family and are vetting us, we are generating an infrastructure within our community that will guarantee a family of 4 or 5 a very warm welcome, a comfortable home, and ongoing support as they re-establish their lives.

"We must ensure as much as we can that our guests come through the difficult transitions and adjustments their move here will make. Thinking about the trauma our family has endured, we are so happy to offer the hospitality and serenity of our hometown, and the healing beauty and peace of our Adirondacks.'

"Here's how you can help," said the Adirondack Welcome Circle.

"We must provide everything a family needs to start life in a new context, including such things as:

"A house or apartment, all furnishings, kitchen items, tableware, sheets and blankets, basic pantry items and an initially stocked refrigerator.

"Other basic necessities, including bathroom items, seasonably appropriate clothing and footwear.

Transportation services.

"Money to fund rent, utilities and internet, food, personal needs, initial pocket money and time-bound income support.

"Personal guides to help in changes of address, shopping, accessing postal services, applying for social security cards,

"Legal and medical resources.

"Access to local schools for children, and lessons in English as necessary.

"Help in obtaining working papers and in finding possibilities for work.

"A big welcome party!"

The solicitation says: "Any way or anything you can give will be most welcome! Please contact us if you have questions or possible contributions. Contributions can be sent to Adirondack Welcome Circle, PO Box 132, Glens Falls, NY 12801.'

The Adirondack Welcome Circle wrote, "Like most Americans, we watched in dismay the hasty airlift of some 120,000 folks from Kabul in August 2021, after the Taliban swept over the country and into the capital.

"The refugee Afghans were our staunch allies during the 20-year war and were at risk for beheading if they stayed in their country. Many have subsequently come to our country and are piled up in U.S. military bases, awaiting an invitation to re-settle in an American community.

"As this became clear to us, we felt first a mighty respect for the help they offered our war effort, then both a responsibility and an excitement to share what we can with these friends of ours whom we have not yet met, and now a deep sense of respect for their resilience, knowing something of what they have had to endure."

The City asks that small children be accompanied by adults, and "all skaters and spectators practice reasonable COV-ID-19 social distancing precautions and wear a mask."



He said the letter and headline erred in using that name for the business that now imprisoned child sex felon Peter Drutchal operated here in the 1980s.

John Stawicki, one of Mr. Drutchal's victims, who sent us the original letter, confirmed "I'm mistaken."

He said the name of the business that the abuser Mr. Drutchal ran here in the 1980s was W.I.L.D./

"The acronym," wrote Mr. Stawicki, "stood for 'Wilderness Institute for Leadership Development/Wilderness Adventures, Training, Education and River School'. But us kids called it the Outdoor Center because that came from his business in Wilmington, which he directly stole from the Nantahala Outdoor Center in NC."

We corrected the error last week on our website and on our front page post on Facebook and now do so here. The existing Wildwaters Outdoor Center is a dba [doing business as] of Adirondack Kayak Touring Company,

Glens Falls tries to get along

The local effort is almost certain to succeed to help settle a refugee family from Afghanistan in Glens Falls, because generous civic projects are Hometown, USA's bread and butter, pride and joy.

But the push for this particular project has done real damage to the community. It has nothing to do with the people from Afghanistan. It has everything to do with narrow-mindedness in the project's pursuit.

The Post-Star reported last week on the "Adirondack Welcome Circle" aiming to bring a refugee family here. The article expressed the concern:

"It may also be difficult for locals who may not

fully accept the new family into the area.

"I'm very concerned about that actually,' said Leach, 'to the point where we've actually asked a sheriff into our organization with that specific thing in mind. And we are already reaching out to the Jewish community, too, of course, who has a historical problem with Arabs. So we're kind of anticipating that that's going to hap-

The comment drew fire on the *Post-Star* website. One person wrote: "Pertaining to Dr. Leach's comment regarding community acceptance, he specifically mentioned the Jewish community, and 'the anticipation' of a problem with their acceptance of the Afghan families. Having been a Jewish resident of Glens Falls and member of the local synagogues for over 30 years, I have experienced and witnessed nothing but positive acceptance and welcoming of all minorities and cultures. His assumptions of anything less than that by the Jewish community, is offensive."

Another: "I am surprised at what I read in this article, in a bad way. The Glens Falls organization, I am sure, are doing this with all good intentions, but as they are quoted in the newspaper, some of their thoughts are a shock to me. First of all, Afghans are not Arabs. They are Afghans....To comment that Jews 'have problems with Arabs' is downright prejudicial, a generalization without merit...where does this doctor come up with data that shows here that the 'Jewish community needs to be spoken to'....as if they are not capable of interacting with decorum, civility, and friendliness, when meeting new neighbors. Bringing a sheriff on board, out of concern as to how local people will react? That is a condescending slap in the face to the people of the North Country, as if they do not know how to be welcoming...Disappointing and condescending.'

A friend emailed me: "It bugs me that I was going to write a check and now I just can't bring myself to do it and give money to 'those people" - meaning, he said, not the Afghans but the locals quoted in *The Post-Star*. He wrote, "They are so stupid. Not only did they indict the jewish community they indicted Glens Falls.

That's exactly the way that I see it.

Being Jewish myself, I saw the anti-Semitic implication and was chagrined. Anti-Semitism rages & it seeps.

But even more I share my friend's rage at the indictment of this community I am proud to be a part of, going back generations, and believe in with all my heart.

My grandparents were Jewish immigrants from Russia who barely spoke English when they landed in Hudson Falls. No doubt they encountered anti-Semitism; I know I have and sometimes still do.

Is there hatred here, as there is everywhere? You bet. Every place has perpetual work to do on tolerance. It starts with treating people as equals, not looking down your nose at them, presuming your own superiority.

We're lucky to live in a community where there's still a close-knit social fabric, the sense that we're in this together, that we're committed to getting along.

Hudson Falls embraced my grandparents and their Frost Department Store, on Main Street. A friend who grew up across the river in the neighborhood called Fenimore remembers my grandfather sending a car over the bridge to pick up the Italian ladies to come over and shop, back when cars were rare.

My grandparents sent their kids to college. My father practiced dentistry in Hudson Falls. I've built The Chronicle on the good will this community extended to a family that came from a distant place.

The Post-Star writes, "Leach said a lot has changed about the demographics of the area since he moved here in 1977 to set up his medical practice. 'There was very, very little diversity here,' Leach said. 'I don't remember anyone Black or even Brown on the streets in those

Dr. Leach is my friend, going back decades. He was my physician, too. Yes, we're a mostly white population, but perhaps he also should get out more.

The Ridge Terrace, one of the region's most successful restaurants, has long been operated by Raymond Rios, who came up from Mexico, took a bride from Glens Falls, and they raised a great family.

Black people? Roy Thomas was a pioneer here. At his 2018 funeral, I remember his daughter, the Rev. Sandra Riley, speaking. "My first time coming to Glens Falls," she said, was in the 1960s, "after the riots," mentioning Grand Rapids, Detroit and Chicago. "Then I came here and nobody is concerned with the color of my skin." She talked of "running in and out of each other's houses," on Darwin Avenue, where the family lived.

In 1955 when Glens Falls went to the Little League World Series, the manager was Royal VanVranken, a star player was Cal Tucker.

We're not perfect. There's always more to be done, but Dr. Leach sees himself as needing to educate and enlighten. Maybe he can learn something from us.

TU: North Creek Rail to Tahawus up for auction March 3

The story said that William Brandt, the trustee for the railroads' bankruptcy, "said there are three additional bidders so far. While he couldn't name them, he said one is a freight carrier, another is a large local landowner and the other is an environmental organization."


Jenny, Queensbury Class of 2004, is an artist — former Gallery Curator for LARAC, then former Curator of Eduction at the Hyde Collection, until she was furloughed by Covid.

Ben, Glens Falls Class of 2006, is "man

of all trades" at Apex Solar, and a nonstop tinkerer, woodworker and mechanic, Jenny laughs.

She'd previously had a studio at the Shirt Factory for 10 years — but a home studio made more sense.

The two-story barn, they believe, had been moved to the property from Granville, likely soon after the house was built. At 1,200 square feet, it has a larger

footprint than the house, at 900 square feet. Downstairs were three horse stalls.

Their research so far indicates it was long used as an ice house — O'Connor Ice, maybe. Later it was a mechanics garage, they believe, judging from the layout and gravel throughout the small

They met the prior owners through a mutual friend, playing darts — and struck a deal although the place wasn't even on the market. The house had been fully renovated, the barn was clean but untouched, and the owners had been thinking to sell but hadn't done it yet.

"Fate put us together," Jenny says.
That was 2019. Then, pandemic struck. With Jenny out of work, the couple decided she should leverage her skills and go out on her own as a museum and individual artist consultant, and private artist. All the more important to have a place that would accommodate the work, professional meetings, art showings.

Two-plus-year project

The short answer to what they did, Ben says: "Demolition, repair, insulation, Sheetrock, trim, furniture.'

They learned as they went, Ben says, citing "YouTube and friends. Our friends were great to us," counting a structural engineer, an architect, and "just people who had done projects before.

"Beer and pizza go a long way," Jenny

laughs. "People are very willing to come make a mess with you for a day.

Along the way, "About 30 percent of the work was cleaning up after we did something," Ben says.

"After we pulled off the ceiling, we took out 300 gallons of hay, hay dust, dirt and pieces of squirrel and bird," they laugh (now). "We had to evict multiple generations of live squirrels," Jenny adds.

They started with renovating the concrete floor. They discovered the sills around the foundation needed to be repaired — as did about three feet of the east-side wall, from the bottom-up.

They framed out about two-thirds of the downstairs space for Jenny's studio. The front portion remains more raw, currently housing a car under repair.

Removing the barn boards took care, as they planned to reuse the wood — for the massive, insulated double door that Ben built from scratch — and for what is now a focal point, a full-height barnboard wall on the south side in a carefully executed yet rough-hewn herringbone pattern.

The original cement floor was significantly pitched, for cleaning and watering the horses. Much time went to handshimming the supports to put in an artist-friendly laminate floor, they said.

They tried to use products as green

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Ben, installing the accent wall on the south wall. Windows were reclaimed, two from Moreau's Habitat for Humanity ReStore.

or chemical-free as possible — naturally hardening tung nut oil, for example, to finish the barn wood, which also results in a golden glow.

One goal: "Repurpose and reuse," Ben says. "It does take more time and work..."

"...But," Jenny adds, "you save things from going into a landfill, and everything has a story.'

They said, "One of the first things we bought was the windows" from Habitat for Humanity's ReStore in Moreau."

They've repurposed school furniture found locally or at auction, and fixtures collected by the prior owner, who worked at Glens Falls Hospital, they said.

The centerpiece is a massive flat file table acquired from auctioneer-wood-worker Martin Seelye. They sanded the metal, repainted, built a new laminate top, added coaster wheels and rejiggered the wood frame support to accommodate Jenny's specs.

During demo, they found the name "Jo-Ann" carved roughly into a piece of wood — they believe for the second-generation ice house owner. Jenny calls the barn "Joann" in her honor.

Their advice:

"Do your research. Have a plan, to some degree. It wasn't on paper, but I had a clear mental vision," Ben says.

"Don't be afraid to try. The information is out there, If you're willing to do it, it can be done.

Jenny adds, "Patience, with the work



and with each other. Have lots of easy meals," while you're spending nights and weekends on such a project.

Stec: 'End vax mandate for health care workers'

"I urge the governor to rescind the vaccine mandate on healthcare workers and allow for a testing option, as we are for several other professions," State Senator Dan Stec (R,C-Queensbury) said in a press release.

It quoted him: "Because of the Gover-nor's mandate on health care workers, we've lost 34,000 skilled workers.

"We had a shortage of healthcare workers before the pandemic — now is not the time to show those willing to work the door. It's caused our hospitals and providers to struggle, and it's put the wellbeing of our communities at risk."

"If we're going to finally put the pandemic to rest, we must ensure our medical professionals have all the staff and resources they need. Right now, that just isn't happening."



scale, until you go in.

Entry and exi \bar{t} are paths through tall ice walls, almost like walking through a crack in an ice canyon. Mr. Buehlhorn said the exit is designed to make a state-

Immediately after entry, Mr. Buehlhorn showed off a frozen courtyard, complete

with a water fountain display, and a walkable tunnel that will have live ice carvers working while the castle is open. They'll continuously add designs over the castle's life — perhaps into March.

More than

Darkness clearly

adds another level to the ice castle experience. Multicolored lights are frozen into the structures throughout. There's also an ice "pixel wall" with a moving light display.

Without the lights, everything is a pale blue. The easy comparison is Narnia.

The amenities made me wish I was about 20 years younger — the ice slides, paths, and crawling tunnels are a kid's dream.

Mr. Buehlhorn pointed out sprinklers that run at night, to continuously add and maintain layers of ice on the castle.

Each fountain is surrounded by a mushroom-like residual ice bubble. The only time they can't run is when it's below 0 degrees, as water can freeze before it reaches the surface.

Mr. Buehlhorn said they released 58,000 new tickets to the public Wednesday Jan. 19, and had sold 52,000 as of Jan. 24.

That is in addition to the 10,000 pre-

sale vouchers purchased in December. He said they plan to keep the castle open "as long as Mother Nature allows," through St. Patrick's day, if possible.

Ticket prices for weekdays are \$20 ages 12 and up, \$15 children 4 to 11; weekends, \$27 and \$22.

The website strongly encourages prepurchase. It says prices for on site purase — if available — might be high

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Tourism chief, on Castle

Joann Conley, Warren County Tourism Director, said the county does not receive a portion of ticket sales for the Ice Castle. Ice Castles rented the Festival Commons for a cost of \$50,000 "for the period October 2021 to March 2022, which includes early set-up and clean up at the end of the season.

Note that the attraction also received

\$50,000 in Occupancy Tax Funding from the county.

Ms. Conley said, "Ice Castles projected \$4 million in traveler spending, with an estimated 90,000 total attendance....

"I have heard anecdotally that hotels are booking up quickly. In past years, the end of January did well with Ice Bar season, then February weekends and Presidents week did well with Winter Carnival and skiing."

"Weekends are selling out first," for the Ice Castle. "They allow a specific number of people in for each 30 minute time slot, all approximate. Tickets may be available for walk-ups purchase, if the flow of people is moving through at a steady pace."

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
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Sembrich nears its 100th year: **Renews classic** light fixtures

The Sembrich Museum in Bolton Landing has just completed **restoration of 11** historic lighting fixtures that are original to the lakeside summer teaching studio of famed opera soprano Marcella Sembrich, now a museum.

The studio was built in 1923-24 by the Schermerhorn Construction Company,

based in Lake George Village. Madame Sembrich provided private instruction at the studio beginning in the

summer of 1925. She died in 1935 In preparation for the building's upcoming centennial, the Sembrich board decided to restore the roof and the electrical and HVAC systems, said Suzanna

Bernd, Sembrich's Executive Director. Inside, another goal was "to tenderly and carefully restore the lights that are the historical fixtures to make sure they are around for the next hundred years for

people to enjoy," she told *The Chronicle*. Ms. Bernd said the metal fixtures were "dark, rusty and bubbly," and some of the paint or enamel on the surface had chipped off. Painted gold decorative features had faded away.

There are wrought iron interior chandeliers and wall sconces, two tall wooden candle fixtures that are displayed on the mantel, and coated metal fixtures with glass, two of which were originally exterior porch fixtures but are now inside because the porches were enclosed.

Savage Metal Restoration of Austerlitz, N.Y. did the work. During the restoration, they determined that some of the dimen-

sional leaves on the chandeliers, which appeared black, were originally green.

The fixtures now reflect the original colors. Ms. Bernd says they "just look

Caleb Eick, the Sembrich's Director of Outreach, did research for the restoration. He said a contemporaneous newspaper report said some of the studio's furnishings were supplied through Wilmarth and Son, a Glens Falls furniture store. It is not clear whether the lighting fixtures were acquired there. (The Wilmarth store was located at 15-17 Ridge St., the current home of *The Chronicle*.)

The Sembrich is also updating all the studio lighting to LED.

Madame Sembrich, born in Poland, was an international opera star, principally at the Metropolitan Opera in New York and Royal Opera House in London.

The Sembrich Museum maintains the studio building and artifacts of Madame Sembrich, relates her story and presents a busy summer schedule of concerts, films, lectures and more. The property has a panoramic view of Lake George.

The Sembrich will reopen for the season on Memorial Day weekend, with a grand reopening planned for July.




What a night in **Hudson Falls!**

time left. Too much Mahomes."

I can't say I was crushed — I'm not fanatical enough a Bills fan for that. I was just totally deflated and let down. And I understood how and why the die-hard Buffalo fans, like our son Max and friend Tom, were demolished.

Both teams excelled, especially QB's Josh Allen and Mahomes, both virtually perfect. No interceptions. Three TD passes for Mahomes, four for Allen. Each rushed for more than 60 yards.

The pace was breathtaking, the excitement non-stop. Allen and Mahomes especially soared at every crucial moment.

Kansas City led in the fourth quarter 26-21. Now came the final two minutes.

Buffalo culminated a seven-minute drive with a touchdown and two-point conversion to lead 29-26, 1:54 remaining. With 1:02 left, Kansas City scored so

the Chiefs led, 33-29.

Then, in 49 seconds, Buffalo went 75 yards and scored to lead 36-33.

13 clicks left on the clock. KC had its time-outs. Touchback on the Bills' kickoff into the end zone. And so, starting at his own 25 yard line, in those 13 seconds Mahomes completed a pass to Tyreek Hill for a 19-yard gain, pass to Travis Kelce for a 25-yard gain, three seconds left for Harrison Butker to kick a 49-yard field goal. Tie game, 36-36.

On to overtime. Once Kansas City won the coin toss fate was inescapable. Mahomes TD pass to Kelce. Chiefs win.

If there's anything to cushion the de-

feat, it's knowing we watched one of the greatest games ever. And if you have to lose to anybody, let it be Mahomes. I love the guy, even his commercials.

But Josh and the Bills proved Sunday they can compete with the big boys.

The hope is now that they know they belong, they'll take the ultimate step and win the Super Bowl.

I do have some nagging concerns. Buffalo had advantages Sunday that they're unlikely to have next time.

One, the Chiefs were playing without star safety Tyrann Mathieu, who left with a concussion after the opening drive.

Two, kicker Butker missed a field goal and even an extra point. Don't bank on that happening again.

Three, Josh Allen takes terrible punishment. He's big and strong, and he's a powerful, surprisingly fast runner. He's a weapon. But how long before fierce tackles take their toll?

Mahomes ducks the big hits, slides down before the boom gets lowered.

There, I expressed the concerns floating in my brain. Now I can go back to fullthroated fanhood. Go, Bills!

Finally there was Coach Sean McDermott's decision with 13 seconds left to kick the ball all the way to the Chiefs' end zone, instead of trying a squib that might have used up precious seconds. That's what I was calling for.

They'll also analyze in Coach College forever McDermott's defensive strategy on that last drive. I'll stick with you, Sean. Let the setback be your launching pad.

Warren County's Ginelle Jones on Covid: 'Toward normalcy,' even

Chronicle Managing Editor Cathy DeDe writes: We asked Ginelle Jones, Director of Warren Couunty Public Heath, about the new State-run Covid tracking and reporting system.

She said, "We are happy that people are able to get isolation and quarantine orders online to make it more convenient for our residents.

Of self-reporting for in-home Covid tests, she said, "We have been getting 30 to 40 or so results a day, and we are happy to see that our residents have been receptive to using this system. We can't say for sure what percentage of people are reporting, however."

"There are tradeoffs with the new system," Ms. Jones said. "Thankfully our community is pretty well educated about Covid-19 at this point, so they are familiar with the steps they should take to protect themselves and others...

"From an information standpoint, we are unable to retrieve as much data for the public as we could before, particularly related to breakthrough cases and recoveries that our staff tracked."

Ms. Jones said hospitalizations remain "the major metric" to track Covid, as "concrete data that our staff is able to monitor in real time.

She said, "Our biggest concern has been to keep our medical providers, particularly hospitals, from overwhelmed by those seriously ill with Covid-19. Tracking local and regional hospitalizations to ensure that there is space for our residents to be treated if needed is vitally important."

She said, with the state stepping in, 'We are getting as much of our staff back to a normal workload as possible, offering programs in school, vaccination clinics and the other Public Health initiatives that we can pursue as denoted on our website at this time.'

She said "many" of the per diem public health assistants they hired for Covid continue at the County, "in various capacities, as we still get a lot of Covid-related phone calls and emails every day. They are helping with education, outreach and vaccination as needed."

Ms. Jones said, "We aren't out of this pandemic yet, and people still need to take precautions because we have high rates of community transmission around the state.

"But from an illness standpoint, we are headed toward normalcy, where this will be a disease that we will be dealing with for years to come. We know we have tools to lessen the impact thanks to vaccination and other mitigation efforts.

Shelving Rock deadly fall; Timothy Gillen, 55, founded 'Everett & Austin Project'

Timothy J. Gillen of Peekskill, died Thursday, Jan. 20, as the result of a fall at Shelving Rock Falls in Fort Ann.

The New York State Police reported responding at approximately 5:30 p.m. "to a report of a deceased male located at the bottom of a cliff...Passing hikers observed Gillen at the bottom of the cliff and contacted police. Preliminary investigation determined that Gillen had been hiking in the area and died as a result of a fall."

The case is under investigation, "however, no signs of foul play were observed."

Mr. Gillen founded the Everett and Austin Project, named for his two sons who died from Duchenne Muscula Dystrophy in 2012 and 2017, at ages 16 and 22, said a website for the Foundation. The organization aids children and families suffering from Duchenne, "and other rare diseases in Sub-Saharan Africa.'



one foot in the snow.

"I should do this fast," I thought to myself as I quickly changed from my wet paddling clothes into dry clothes for

It was January 17, 2021, and I was paddling the length of the Lake from Lake George Village to start of La Chute in Ticonderoga.

Getting a late start at 3 p.m., I arrived at Uncas Island in the dark. The temperature had dropped below 30 degrees Fahrenheit.

After changing my clothes, I wanted to set up my tent, but the hatch to my kayak was frozen shut. I pounded it with my cold hands, I tried prying it with a stick, finally I sat on it. Either it was the heat

from my bum or the weight from my body, but the hatch finally came free. Thirty minutes later, with tent up, and chocolate bar and cheese in my belly, I slid into my sleeping bag and covered my head.

A Barred Owl in the distance sang to me, "Who cooks for you?"

"No one!" I shouted from within my bag, "but you can stop by tomorrow morning and fry me an omelet!" No answer from the owl, but minutes later a family of coyotes on Tongue Mountain expressed their interest in an early breakfast.

In the morning I was greeted by a pair of loons who sang to me. My improvised response, sounding something akin to a laryngitic loon was not returned.

While the world reeled with the CO-VID pandemic, I, was self-isolating with owls, coyotes and loons. I performed my morning routine of coffee, Clif Bars and a quick trip to the outhouse; then tucked my camp gear into the kayak and slipped into the water. Black Mountain stood before me, snow-capped and sun-kissed while a strong wind at my back kindly nudged me forward.

"This," I imagined, "is how Lake George was hundreds of years ago". I drifted by many islands, some large with rock outcroppings rising sharply from their shores; others so small and vulnerable with a single tree or shrub desperately holding together the loosely stacked stones of their miniature continent.

All the docks had been pulled, allowing access only for small paddlecraft and the 'wildlife' they transported. Ice encrusted

the rock shores and hung like chandelier strands off the branches of juniper and cedar shrubs.

I drifted by Hatchet Island and let out a howl which echoed off the cliff bands above Five Mile Point.

At Slim Point, a narrow peninsula guarding Silver Bay from the south winds, I landed and climbed out of my kayak to stretch my legs before the final push pass the weather exposed stretch between Scotch Bonnet Island and the cozy huddle of the Waltonian Islands

The day is short in January and as I began my final sprint across the deep waters under the shadowed slopes of Anthony's Nose, I could feel the sunlight escaping below the horizon, and with it, left that small sun-dependent cheer that sustains me.

Arriving near the bridge crossing La Chute at twilight I pulled my kayak onto the dock of a new friend who allowed me to store my car in his driveway. A neighbor from across the narrow outlet asked how the paddling was, and we both agreed that in January the swimming is poor, but the paddling is possible. I pulled my kayak across the snow-covered lawn and loaded it onto my car.

With the car heater on, my shivering finally subsided. As I drove away, I contemplated my plan to paddle the lake every month this year. "Well," I thought, "I'm sure February will be warmer."


