The pace and intensity of news right now is almost too much to absorb. Two more huge things came in the past week:

Sunday, New York Governor Kathy Hochul ended, as of Wednesday, March 2, the mask mandate in schools. Individuals can



still choose to mask, but no one will be forced to.

Russia invaded Ukraine, launching a war to try and take over its democratic former satellite country.

Characteristically for our times, both stories are limitlessly complicated.

The unmasking of the

schools pleases many but is not a triumph for anybody.

Mask defenders see it as a reckless step during a Covid ebb they expect to turn at any time. A superintendent told our Zander Frost that, yes, he hears from parents wanting the masks off, but he also hears from parents who want them on. He suggested he might hear from more of them if the mask mandate ended, as it now has.

Foes of forced masking argue Gov. Hochul's move is way late.

"For too long, our officials have been making COVID-related decisions based on political science, instead of the actual

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
