Was Wing Fest too successful?

At first glance, Wing Fest seemed to be a big hit Saturday; a massive turnout, live music, and a beautiful day.

But in reality, the event may have been a victim of too much success.

Lines were long, wings ran out, and people bought tickets they couldn't use. I was there for over an hour, most of it in line, and didn't eat a single wing.

I met friends there — we all arrived late because when we each searched the event the preview within Google incorrectly said "4-7 p.m.," instead of 12-3 p.m. My friends arrived at around 1 p.m.,

My friends arrived at around 1 p.m., and got in line for vegan "wings" at Birch Bark Eatery. They gave the food a positive review! But they couldn't get any more wings for the rest of the day.

I arrived after them, and they warned me not to buy tickets. "We already have way more than we'll be able to spend."

We joined a long line to Gourmet Cafe.

It was moving at a snail's pace and it was hot, so I walked back to my apartment, changed my shirt and grabbed sparkling waters for my group.

When I returned 10 minutes later I expected us to be maybe 15-20 minutes from the booth. Instead, my group was walking towards me. "They ran out."

We gave up and left the event.
Saturday proved that there is a signifi-

Saturday proved that there is a significant appetite for WingFest. People want to be out! And it was a beautiful day! But any event in Glens Falls needs to be prepared to handle a crowd.

Nancy Turner, Glens Falls Collaborative Wing Fest committee co-chair said, "I'm hoping the long lines this year are not going to scare people away for next year, because we're growing, the city is growing, the Collaborative is growing. And we're going through growing pains."

She said, "I think it was a very successful event, given the fact that there were so many long lines, so many people showed up. We just had more than we ever could imagine coming to Wing Fest...probably about double our average attendance."

Why the big numbers? First, she said, the tribute to the late deejay Mike Du-Bray. "Mike had friends everywhere...

"Then people were coming because it's an outdoor event, and we're coming off two years of a pandemic. And then it ended up being such a beautiful day."

The Chronicle asked about attendees' frustrations.

"Our hands were kind of tied, there was nothing we could we could do about it," Mrs. Turner said. "There was enough product. But the problem was waiting in the lines. And people were getting tired of it. And I don't blame them."

She said they refunded close to 1,000 tickets, and the Bullpen and Davidson Brothers will accept 10 tickets for an order of wings through the weekend.

"Somewhere around 20,000 tickets" were sold at \$1 a piece.

Mrs. Turner said the committee plans to discuss how to improve next year's Wing Fest. "We have to have more restaurants involved. We were turned down by probably a good eight restaurants because they just didn't have the staff."

"Maybe we could do cash instead of tickets," she suggested.

"We're trying to figure out how to do things better."

The Lake George Association is "coming out with inaccurate and some might describe it as blatant misinformation in an attempt to cause concern and alarm" about the Lake George Park Commission's decision to approve use of the herbicide ProcellaCOR EC against the invasive milfoil at two locations on Lake George.

That's what Dave Wick, executive director of the LGPC, tells The Chronicle.

He adamantly defends the plan to use the herbicide, which the Park Commission approved 6-2 and which also has Adirondack Park Agency and Department of Environmental Conservation approval.

He said of the LGA, "There's different media articles that have picked up largely their talking points, which just are not based in the reality of what the product has gone through for scientific and regulatory review.'

His criticism includes coverage in last week's Chronicle, which had "quite a bit of deference given to the LGA's concerns, which are entirely unfounded in fact."

Last week, The Chronicle printed a list of concerns the LGA said it wanted studied. Mr. Wick responded point by point.

The LGA cited "possible negative impacts to human health."

Mr. Wick asked, "Have they identified what those health impacts are? Because there aren't any. There has been no identified health impacts that have been identified with any science the Park Commission has seen.'

Mr. Wick said Jeanine Broughel, "the Product Registration Chief for DEC" told the LGPC that if there were concerns for human health, the product would not have been approved.

Mr. Wick said while ProcellaCOR use started recently, it has been studied for years. "It was developed in 2010. And then spent years being studied and reviewed until everybody signed off on it... was approved in 2018 federally, approved 2019 in New York State.'

The LGA cited "a lack of adequate peer reviewed scientific data regarding potentially adverse impacts to native plants, and organisms that are specific to Lake


Mr. Wick said the reaction of plants, like milfoil, to ProcellaCOR in other states is absolutely relevant to those same plants in Lake George. He said to say otherwise is "such an offensive statement to say about science." He said, "We know what the plant populations are in Lake George, we have done extensive plant surveys as required by DEC and the Adirondack Park Agency.

Mr. Wick said the only plant that came up as a concern was native milfoil, but the LGPC found only one plant in the two areas it plans to treat.

Mr. Wick said native milfoil is "ubiquitous throughout Lake George, that's been documented for years by the Darrin Freshwater Institute...If you treat and you kill that one native milfoil plant, is it going to be jeopardizing anything in the lake? And the answer was no."

The LGA cited "Concern that intense, rapid and concentrated nutrient loading from herbicide- treated and decomposing milfoil would cause significant algal growth and increase the risk of harmful algal blooms.

That's one of my favorites, because

that's knowingly wrong. And they know that's wrong," Mr. Wick said. He said not using ProcellaCOR leads to far more nutrients being released into the lake.

He said one plant in Blair's Bay grows to eight feet tall and three acres in size and then dies, releasing its nutrients into the water column every year.

He said the Park Commission will treat it with ProcellaCOR, and it will die and not return for at least three years.

"Over three years, you have three acres of eight foot high plants dying year after year after year. Or we can do one treatment, have it die back, let's say it's 20% of the height" and not return, Mr. Wick said.

"What do you think is going to release

more nutrients into the water?" he said.

The LGA cited "the likely spread of the herbicide miles from the proposed testing sites due to the Lake's strong currents."

Mr. Wick said, "I said the other one was my favorite." The LGPC said a DEC dilution model "estimates no detection within a very small fraction of the 'miles' noted in the LGA statement. This is backed up by dozens of ProcellaCOR treatments and subsequent modeling, including Lake Winnipesau-kee, which is a public drinking water sup-

ply."

The LGA cites "concerns about how long the chemical will remain in the Lake, and the fact that it eventually breaks down into chemicals that are as toxic as the parent."

"Absolutely false and inaccurate," Mr. Wick said. He said ProcellaCOR breaks down into much less toxic components.

The LGPC said EPA found "the relative toxicity of the transformation products on SAVs: florpyrauxifen-acid was 30x less

toxic, benzyl-hydroxy was 1,700x less toxic, hydroxy-acid was 11,400x less tox-

Mr. Wick said, "It is a plant growth hormone that I guess you can call toxic. It's toxic to the plant, but not to human

He also emphasized that the amount of chemical used is small. "The seven parts per billion equates to one drop in a backyard swimming pool. Take an eyedropper and put one drop into it. That is the dosage rate of ProcellaCOR in Lake George."

"Remember that 97.5% percent of that one drop is inert ingredients. It's only 2.5% of that drop is active ingredients."

The LGA cited "the likelihood that the herbicide's projected effectiveness will be reduced by the Lake's strong currents since the manufacturer clearly states its product performs best in 'slow moving/quiescent waters with little or no continuous

Mr. Wick said any aquatic herbicide in

New York State requires a dilution model.

"We had to go out and do all the underwater topography and figure out the volume. And then the way the applicator has to judge the dosage is based on the volume of water.

They say, okay, based on this area, it's going to be two foot deep here, it's going to be 20 feet deep here, follow this exact, very specific protocol. And that is DEC's conservative estimate of where the product may be diluted out to a point of zero.

"It shows nothing, nothing whatsoever, like what the LGA is saying, and the [Adirondack] Council and everybody else now that has hopped on the bandwagon. It doesn't reflect reality by any stretch

Mr. Wick said ProcellaCOR use on Glen Lake, Saratoga Lake and Minerva Lake confirm "that the state's dilution modeling is representative and accurate because outside of those zones, they can find 0.0 parts per billion of that product."



The torrent of big stories

The story I'd prefer to focus on this week is that our Managing Editor Cathy DeDe's Lake George **Prom video** that she posted on our Facebook page went viral! Tuesday evening at 9:40 p.m., as I write this column, it has 145,000 views and 410,440 people reached! Way to go, Ms. DeDe!

But a bevy of colossal stories broke this week, any one of which would have dominated a news cycle.

 Someone leaked the draft of a decision under which the U.S. Supreme Court would reverse Roe v. Wade,



This was a bombshell on two counts:

1. Abortion is the #1 issue for many people — on both sides — those who see it as "my body, my choice," and those who see it as killing babies. It's incendiary.

2. The leaking of an internal Supreme Court draft, which Chief Justice John Roberts confirmed as authentic, is a breach of such proportion that it's one more indication that no holds are barred; more proof it's war.

If Democrats needed an issue to rev up a dispirited base and drive them to the polls, here it is. But there's an opposite energy, too. Does it change November?

The Biden Administration is establishing a "Disinformation Governance Board" in The Depart ment of Homeland Security. When government dictates what is and isn't Truth, it's a direct threat to the freedoms our nation is founded on. Is the American public okay with this?

• Governor Hochul named Congressman Antonio Delgado her new Lieutenant Governor, after Brian Benjamin was indicted for corruption and resigned. The Democratic Legislature changed the law so Gov.

• New York's Court of Appeals narrowly (4-3) struck down the Democrat-drawn Congressional redistricting as partisan and unconstitutional.

Now a court appointee will draw the lines instead. Will Glens Falls, Queensbury, Moreau rejoin Rep. Stefanik's district? An upshot is that the June 28 primary is postponed until August for the Congressional nominations — and for the State Senate, too.

Now there's an effort to postpone the primary for Governor into August too. Would that facilitate Andrew Cuomo's trying to reclaim the job? Albany's Times-Union ran an article speculating it might.

 Upstate New York leads the nation in Covid cases, and Saratoga County has it worst. Few deaths, limited surge in hospitalizations. Reaction depends on one's predisposition. No big deal or batten the hatches.

give it your location when you install it, so it knows what birds are likely to be there. And it can ID more than one bird's song at a time. With each recording, you get a list of the bird(s) it recognized that time, and links to info about each species and Cornell's recordings of their songs and calls. And it works offline, all self-contained in your phone.

Not sure when I last saw one [Carolina wren], but my Merlin recordings include it on 4/23, 4/22, and farther back. I don't do the sound ID all the time, just when I hear something singing and the phone is nearby.

Doing the Cornell FeederWatch weekly bird count, I reported seeing one or two almost every week from November to March. Doing that project, you note and report everything you see over a 2 day period each week — species and maximum number seen at one time in you yard. https://feederwatch.org/about/ project-overview/

Birds she sees in Fort Ann; touts May **14 Global bird count**

Hi Mark!

Loved your scoop about the Carolina Wren! Pretty bird, and your description of his call is wonderful! I hope you get to hear, and maybe see him again as he travels around. We watch the birds here in Fort Ann all the time, and have seen a large number of different species over the years and seasons. I, too, am "hooked" on a few of our birds and watch for them to return as the seasons change.

Some we've come to know are signs when spring (or winter) is on the way. Contrary to what many think — Robins aren't a sign of spring — they're here all year! We had a flock of about 20 of them during the winter in the snow!

Our spring sign is the Red-Winged Blackbird. When we spot them, we know the seasons have shifted!

My favorite bird is the Indigo Bunting a gorgeous blue bird that we've seen the past two late spring and summers. He hangs out with the goldfinches, and is usually alone, but we have seen his mate as well. He's been sort of my guardian angel bird during these challenging couple of years, and we hope to see him again this year.

A new one we just spotted this past week is the Eastern Towhee. He was here for about 3 days, and now gone. I'm guessing we were just a stopover on his way to his permanent summer residence.

I wanted to send along the information about the May 14 Global Big Day bird count: https://ebird.org/news/global-bigday-2022. It is a free worldwide event, run by Team eBird at the Cornell Lab, during which anyone can record birds seen in their area to help track migration and species found in different places.

People from around the world participate virtually, and it gives a picture of the many varieties of birds found around the world. Maybe your readers would be interested and might like to participate. It is easy — and free!

I've been recording bird counts daily on the Cornell Lab ebird site for a few years - fun to keep track and see how the bird environment changes. And I agree with you — I'm sure climate changes and environmental challenges do impact the birds that we see from year to year. Thanks for sharing your bird sighting! Take care and keep watching those birds!

fixed. I mean, it is the one area in our organization that we have to do better. I am not proud of the experience for patients there, particularly for that behavioral health population. We have to fix it....The quality of care is there. But the experience is not what we want it to be.

Mr. Scimeca detailed some of the challenges the Emergency Department faces.

"One of the biggest challenges that we're facing right now is the variability, the volatility of volume, which is something that we've never seen before...

"Hospitals used to be fairly predictable in terms of their volume."

Now, though, "there could be a day in the ED that has 90 patients and the next day has 150. And...because most of the admissions come through the ED, the same thing happens with our inpatient volume — we can swing 40, 50 patients in 48 hours. That is new. And that's not unique to us. A lot of hospitals are seeing that volatility.'

Mr. Scimeca said, "I think some of it has to do with delayed care. I think some of it has to do with people trying to manage things in other settings before coming to the hospital. So it is delayed.

"And I will tell you, the patients who are here today, they are very sick. Not COVID, but they're very ill, the acuity is very high. So yeah, we've had moments and occasions in the ED where the experience is not what we want it to be."

On April 15, the day The Chronicle interviewed Mr. Scimeca, he said the hospital had 205 patients in beds, "where we budget to be around 140-ish."

He said, "People are sick...People say, 'Oh, my gosh, you have so much COVID in the hospital.' It's not -10 of those were COVID. We had a little baby boom, you know, the Snuggery was busy. Behavioral Health was very busy. Med surg [surgery]





was very busy. It was busy all throughout the house.

"And when we get into those surges... people will work extra, they will take on shifts. And our staff is just extraordinarily resilient to rise to the occasion when things get busy."

In the Emergency Department, Mr. Scimeca said, "we see a significant number of behavioral health patients....

"And one of the things that has happened over the last couple of years is many organizations have chosen to limit the number of behavioral health patients that they see. This is particularly true for, for example, adolescent and pediatric inpatient facilities.

So we have a child who comes in and needs advanced inpatient care — we don't do inpatient Behavioral Health here for adolescents and pediatrics. If we need to find them a bed, that's a challenge...

"We just had a patient here for two full

'Glens Falls needs an acute care hospital'; sees Albany Med link being validated

'I will tell you that personally, as the leader of the organization, I am optimistic about the future" of Glens Falls Hospital, says its interim CEO Paul Scimeca.

One of the things that was again, reinforced by the last couple of years, is that there needs to be an acute care hospital here in Glens Falls...

Today, we have 195 patients. Where are they going to go?...We know that there's not 195 beds available elsewhere in the Capital District, we see that data every single day, it is tight. This past January, when things were really, really tight, we were gridlocked in the Capital District.

We had three patients one day — I'll never forget — we had three patients, we needed to find a bed for, a higher level of care. And the only place that had beds was up in Burlington.

"And we talked to the three patients and their families. One agreed to go. The other two said, I'm not going up to Burlington, I'll take my chances here or I'll wait for a bed to open up either here or in Albany.

"And for me, that was a reinforcement that our decision to affiliate with Albany Med was the right decision, because that's where we relate to, that's where people go to when they need a higher level of care.

"And so what's the long game? The long game is being part of a system. Independent hospitals, there are very few these days who are able to exist independent and certainly not one that is in a rural area.

"So, our long game is continue to develop and work in partnership with a system, to look at services, to look at our configurations, to figure out long term strategies for success with workforce, to grow our own, to recruit our

"It's going to be a combination of a lot of things, but the long game is, as being part of the system, how do we really take best advantage of that for all of us collectively involved, so we can be assured that when patients in this region need care, it's here for them."

weeks before we could find them a bed. That's two weeks in the ED — because we're not able to admit them, and we can't send them out."

"We also, not this week, but the week before, we started off Monday morning with 19 behavioral health patients in the ED. That's with our adult unit full — 19. So that creates challenges in the ED."

(Last week Ellis Hospital in Schenectady announced the temporary closure of its inpatient adolescent mental health unit due to the severe shortages of children's mental health workers.)

Mr. Scimeca said Glens Falls Hospital's Emergency Department also struggles because "it was built in the 70s...It is not built to accommodate the kind of care that has to happen now."

On the upside, he said that "in retrospect...,the best thing that happened is that we didn't renovate the ED three or four years ago, because we would have had to change a lot of that on the fly for COVID, because the way people were building ED's was not going to work during a pandemic. So now we know that....

"One of the things that I have tasked our team here with is...we've got to fix the ED, because those experiences, some of them are just driven by the environment we're trying to operate in."

The Chronicle asked: Wasn't there state aid Glens Falls Hospital received several years ago to build a new emergency de partment at the hospital's west entry?

"We did," Mr. Scimeca replied. "We received about \$19 million in state funding to support a bunch of things. But at the end of the day, it was really to support building a new ED.

"And reality was, even with that \$19 million of support, we couldn't afford it.

"We were also pretty fortunate. We went to the state and said, Hey, this is the position we're in. Can we use it for something else? And the state was great to say yeah, you can actually use it for other capital expenses, and we're actual-

Says Covid shows 'nothing replaces care at the bedside'

"We've learned a lot in the last two years," says Glens Falls Hospital Interim CEO Paul Scimeca. "One thing that we've learned is nothing replaces the caregiver at the bedside."

He says, "Pre-COVID, there was definitely lots of discussions about, what really will the role of hospitals be going forward? Will a hospital really become just an ED [Emergency Department] with maybe an intensive care unit and an OR [Operating Room] attached?

"And I think one thing that we all discovered, or we knew, but was reinforced in the last two years, when there are challenges faced in our public health world, people turn to hospitals.

"They came here when they needed to get testing, they needed to get a vaccine, they needed monoclonal antibody treatment, they needed intensive care, they came to the hospital.

"That's what they knew. That's the safety net for the region. And when that happens, there's nothing that replaces care at the bedside."

Asked how Glens Falls Hospital is doing financially, CEO Paul Scimeca said, "This was a tough first couple of months of the year...driven by two things. One was volume, it is still a volume game. We're still, even though there's lots of discussion about paying for value, paying for quality, the majority of the work that we do, particularly since we're so dependent upon governmental payers, it is volume.

"January and February, when we were in the midst of that last wave of COVID, we saw our volumes were suppressed, both because we had, for example, surgery scheduled, the patient came in to do their pre surgical workup, they found out they had COVID... we had to cancel the procedure.

"Sometimes," he said, "we had providers who became ill, and we had to cancel procedures. So volume was tough in the first couple of months of

We also were experiencing extraordinarily high labor costs, because, one, with so many of our own staff being ill, under the state law, we were required to continue to pay them — it's the right thing to do.

"But it adds cost to the organization because we're also then backfilling that staff with very high cost, contract labor.

'So first couple of months were tough. March was a better month, we saw the volume start to pick up a little bit, expenses moderated.

"It's a month to month. We stay very close with a focus on our budget. I think that's one of the things that's unique about this organization...

"Our reality is that our patient population that we care for is largely Medicare, Medicaid; very little Medicaid actually, mostly Medicare.

"In fact, 82% of our in-patients are Medicare. That's hard when Medicare does not cover its costs...

"We've always been in a position where we've had to be very fiscally responsible...We've never known to be flush with money. That's not who we are in our region.

"We know how to be frugal. And that's continuing now. We continue to hover right above or below break-even. But we're okay. We're continuing to hold

"rebuilding" our downtown.

Jim walked with me over to the Elm Street parking lot behind Glens Falls National and we talked about the super parking lot that was being talked about back then. He asked me a simple question ... he asked if I knew why all the buildings around the Elm Street lot had such substantial, even pretty, rear entrances. I had to admit that I did not. It was quite obvious, though, once he

pointed it out.

He said, "This was most likely a 'piazza.' As in Italy, and much of the developed world, a piazza is a downtown park, a gathering place. Grass and trees grow. There are picnic tables, walking paths. People gather, ride their bikes, rest, play music, eat good food, play games. It isn't a paved-over car warehouse. It is a truly BEAUTIFUL place where people go to connect and bask and be happy!

He then said something made plain in many of his books on how America has destroyed so much beauty by building soullessly around our rampant car culture ... "People come to beautiful places because they are BEAUTIFUL ... not because it's easier to park their car."

Jim is right ... the parking garage developers we've allowed to pave over everything downtown are wrong. And it's truly just that simple. More parking garages are not an intelligent answer to making our once beautiful city more aesthetically pleasing. In fact, they are guaranteed to make it uglier and less inviting.

Art and beauty are how you create a downtown that people wish to be in. You can't pave over everything in our downtown core and expect people to still want to come here. It will be hideous and unwelcoming. Downtown is already becoming that. "New" is not necessarily synonymous with "beautiful."

Visitors could easily park at a megaparking garage (at the hospital) and then get out of their car and walk a few blocks to the theater, restaurant or shop they wish to visit, just as visitors do in every city I've ever been to in my entire life ... couldn't they?

Just a thought.

industry? Will it be good for the future, both near- and long-term?

As everyone has been learning lately, cars are becoming less industrial in nature and more amenable to computer solutions. Elon Musk, who started Pay-Pal and who is now leading the world in electric vehicles (Tesla), is doing remarkable things with both his car and rocket businesses (Space X).

Tesla vehicles are now self-driving and Space X is using computers to make soft landings possible for its rockets — and therefore cheaper to use.

Moreover, outside of Musk, long-haul truck transportation is confident enough in its self-driving technology that it is going to be using self-driving trucks almost immediately (according to a 60 Minutes report)

So what does this have to do with a transportation hub?

When I was on the Common Council a few years ago, Mayor Diamond and I looked at having parking lots on the outskirts of the City. The idea was that employees, but not customers, would be able to park in one of these parking lots, take a bus into the City to work, and in effect free up land for new businesses or for reduced parking congestion, particularly at the Elm Street parking lot.

This obviously never got off the ground, but with the seeming advent of self-driving cars such a scenario is now quite possible, at least in theory. Instead of taking a bus from a parking lot on the outskirts of the City, an employee or a customer could be dropped off where they want to go, and then have their car go park far from Downtown.

So how is this much different from what is being proposed? The answer is that parking lots take up a lot of space Downtown. If some or most of that space was turned over to developers who want to build residential apartments or retail businesses, the City will have a more productive inner core.

In addition, the City has already made a number of infrastructure investments for this kind of environment. For example, the Civic Center will help attract residents to a Downtown created to have variety of fun things to do, to some extent in the same way large cities have.

We certainly have to applaud the Mayor for his ambition. But he must keep in mind that solving the problems of the past only makes sense when you live in the past. Instead, we must remember that while the past never really goes away, it confuses us all by becoming intertwined in the future.

That seems dangerous.

Hopefully there can be continued conversations and thoughts on how the parking can be improved to better serve the businesses and services that are offered in the downtown area. I think it's obvious what we are doing now is not working.


