



Denouncing it in one paragraph as a "farce that was perpetrated on the general public," the Lake George Association and others filed suit seeking to "annul" state approval to use a chemical herbicide for the first time in the lake against the invasive weed Eurasian milfoil.

Plaintiffs in the Article 78 lawsuit are the LGA, its Lake George Waterkeeper Chris Navitsky, the Town of Hague, and Helena G. Rice, a summer resident of Huletts Landing, whose property "is immediately adjacent to the ProcellaCOR treatment area" and "has three water intakes in the treatment area," says the lawsuit.

The suit is brought against the Lake George Park Commission, the Adirondack Park Agency and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, all of which approved the imminent, proposed use of the herbicide.

The lawsuit contends the approval was "fraught with collusion among all three respondents."

The LGA suit argues that the chemical's safe use is unproven for Lake George, that the state agencies failed to consider relevant science and ignored and in some cases failed to disclose public comments, including from experts. It also argues the APA approval is invalid because a DEC designee on the Agency board had a conflict of interest in casting what it says was the decisive vote on the herbicide use application.

Dave Wick, executive director of the Lake George Park Commission, strongly defended the science, safety and planned use of ProcellaCOR, in an interview published in The Chronicle two weeks ago.

10 die in shooting at TOPS in Buffalo

Ten people were shot to death Saturday afternoon at a TOPS Friendly Supermarket in Buffalo. Police arrested the alleged killer, Payton Gendron, 18, who lives near Binghamton.

Black people were nine of the 13 shooting victims, and police said the teen drove to Buffalo expressly to kill black people. He is said to have posted extensively on social media that he's a white supremacist and expressed vehemently racist and antisemitic views. Police said he broadcast the shooting live on the Internet using the app Twitch.


The Wall Street Journal reported the teen "was brought to a hospital by state police in June 2021 for a mental-health evaluation after expressing his desire to carry out a mass shooting, law-enforcement officials said Sunday.

TOPS Markets said Sunday, "The Tops family is heartbroken over the senseless violence that impacted our associates and customers at our store on Jefferson Avenue...Tops has been committed to this community and to the city of Buffalo for decades and this tragedy will not change that commitment."

It also said, "While the Tops location at Jefferson Avenue will remain closed until further notice...we have taken immediate



Ethan Allen boat that sank, killing 20, for sale: \$49,900

It's the Lake George tour boat that capsized and sank in 2005, killing 20 pas-

That is the boat that sank on Lake George...because the hard top was so heavy. That's what caused it to capsize," broker John Wickman, who listed the vessel, told The Chronicle.

He said it's currently in Kingston, New

He said the boat has been redone. "They took that hardtop off of it. It's got a new engine in it."

Despite being for sale for six months, Mr. Wickman said this is just the second inquiry he had received.

The Chronicle asked if he thought the boat's history might be the reason for the

lack of interest. 'It could be, but again, they changed the hardtop so it's seaworthy now. The problem was it had too heavy of a hard top on it that caused it to capsize," he

Mr. Wickman said the boat's owner is a "friend" who "buys and sells stuff, everything. That's just what he does."

The posting describes the boat as a 40 feet long 1964 Dyer Passenger, "Once Famous Vessel has been completely refitted, new engine, new hard top.

People I'm glad to remember

So many people I remember. Periodically I like to bring as many as I can back to life and fresh attention. Like Sally Millman (later Taft), my fifth- and sixthgrade teacher at Kensington Road School. Yes, I was lucky enough to have her two years in a row because she moved up a grade when we did.

Miss Millman was such a great teacher that I

remember in detail many things she did and said. She was way ahead of her time. She taught us to breathe in through the nose, and breathe out through the mouth. She explained a new counting system that used only one's and zero's - she



was clueing us in early to computer code.

She let Cliff Teutsch, Bill Loughrey and me do a Civil War history project as a dramatization on reel to reel tape. What became of that tape I have no idea, but I still have the autobiography she had us write — and my huge, hand-written (in cursive) epic report on Southeast Asia, before the Vietnam War. Incredibly, I wrote to and got responses — from the embassies of Thailand, Burma (now Myanmar), Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam. Amazing that Miss Millman prompted such ambitiousness in what was then elementary school! I think the paper could score a passing grade in many colleges.

At Junior High, Miss [Mabelle] McNulty set the course of my life. I had her for history, but more important she was the faculty advisor of Junior High*lights* that became my model in starting *The Chronicle*. Junior Highlights connected with and served its community so well. I signed on as a sportswriter, under sports editor Dave Collin, and then succeeded him as editor.

One day Miss McNulty told me, "The Glens Falls Times is looking for a student to cover things in the school. Would you be interested?" I jumped at it. I turned it primarily into a sports beat. They paid me 12 cents an inch. My first articles were 3 inches long. You do the math. That 36 cents was more than I made many weeks in The Chronicle's early going.

The Times was the afternoon sister paper of The Post-Star when they were based on the corner of Glen and Park Streets. I'd climb the stairs or ride the elevator to the newsroom on the second floor. Sometimes the publisher Arthur Irving greeted me and said, "You have some hot news for us there, Mark?" My career in journalism began there. That first job was 58 years ago.

Bill Peter lived two houses up from us on Coolidge Avenue. There were two Bills — my friend and high school classmate, and his father who loomed large for me and my parents too. Many Sunday mornings, Mr.

Peter and our next-door neighbor Ginny Reed convened at our house for bagels and banter.

The Yale-educated Mr. Peter was an incredibly successful medical supply salesman. "They don't buy the product, they buy you," he impressed upon me. As true now as it ever was. He also told me more than once, exasperated by my liberal arguments in the face of his conservatism, "Mark, you can't change human nature."

The company Bill worked for was always trying to coax or force him to move up to a bigger, more lucrative market, but he wasn't budging from the Adirondacks. He was either on a camping trip or planning a camping trip at all times.

That this Protestant native son of Seymour, Indiana, connected seamlessly with two children of Jewish immigrants — my mom Cynthia from Baltimore, my dad Alfred from Hudson Falls — delighted all three.

There was a Eureka! moment one day when either Bill or Al mentioned spiffing up as a young man for "tight shoe night." The other man exclaimed, "We said 'tight shoe night' too!" They were stunned that the same obscure idiom penetrated such different, distant cultures.

One time the Peters were coming to our house for Passover seder. My father said we'd need more Haggadahs — the text we'd read at the table. "I'll get them," Bill said immediately. "The sisters at Saint Peter's will have them." They did. The hospital was one of Bill's clients. He told me that he made one sales call on them a year. All the other visits, he said, were social.

Bill sometimes brought over a bucket of smelt that my mom would fry up and we'd devour. One time the fish Bill caught and brought was pike. That triggered the momentous episode when Bill, Al and Cynthia made from scratch the Jewish specialty gefilte fish.

John Corbett was our mailman on Coolidge Avenue. Many conversations developed with him, too.

Mr. Corbett read the Daily News, especially the sports columnist Dick Young. He showed me the mailbag column that Young periodically did, printing letters from readers and his replies. What Mr. Corbett relished was that if someone wrote, "Dear Mr. Young," he'd reply, "Dear Mr. Johnson." If they wrote, "Dear Dick," he replied, "Dear John." If they addressed him, "Hey Meathead," he'd retort, "Yo, Numbskull."

Mr. Corbett loved it and I came to love it, too. It's why we let people start their letters to The Chronicle as they choose. Many start with "Mark." Others are more formal: "Dear Editor" or "To the Editor." If there's no salutation at all, we add "To the Editor."

Jack McCall was another working man I got to know and came to deeply respect at my parents' house. He did wallpapering and interior painting for them. His day job was at the pigment plant, Hercules (later Ciba-Geigy). Very smart, unpretentious person. No college education but someone who worked with him told me it was Jack who made the pollution control system work.

Two years ago Rick White died at 64. Like all of us, I thought I'd grow old laughing with him. Irreplaceable.





I stopped by the Senior Center of Kingsbury-Fort Edward on Oak Street last Tuesday morning, May 10. I had received a tip that something pretty interesting was going on there.

Intrigued as to why I was sent on this assignment, and knowing I primarily report on the music scene, I immediately found the answer when I entered a downstairs room filled with musical instruments — and musicians.

The group was a little light on attendance that particular week. I was promised even more diversity the next time I see them.

The group's very well-known drummer - Terry McGeoch was one member I was sorry to have missed that day.

I asked group members Bob and Milly Gordon of Hudson Falls, what they liked about being part of the Tuesday morning

Mrs. Gordon had the only response that matters: "It really just brings joy to our hearts — and joy to others.'

I did get an answer to the question that both myself and my editor, Cathy DeDe, really wanted to know: Why the Ukulele?

Max smiled and said he wanted to share a quote from The Beatles' George Harrison with me: "Everyone should have and play a UKE — it's so simple to carry with you, and it's the one instrument you can't play and not laugh." Well said.

more extraordinary — they juggle jobs and families and still find the time to devote to their education with night classes, or whatever it takes.

"I married right out of high school," Ms. Rehm said, "and right away I had a family. I didn't apply myself like these people

Those who recall Ms. Rehm's high-profile local career might be surprised to hear her say, "I was always a little embarrassed that I didn't get my degree until I was 81 years old. There's no good excuse for that."

Her one motivation for even talking about it for a newspaper story?

"If there's any takeaway, its that we really have a gem in the local community college. For people who can't afford private college, or have a family or a job and can't go off to school, I admire the heck out of those people. SUNY Adirondack is a place that works for a lot of people."

25 years off



between. It all still applied."

She paused one last time during the Covid pandemic. "What I loved was the exchange back and forth with the professor, the discussion. Once it went remote, I had no interest in Zoom. I like the connections we make in the classroom."

The kids are alright

"I was in biology lab and everyone had to have a lab mate. I'm sitting in a room of 18- to 20-year-olds. I know none of them. They all have friends, choose lab mates. I was left, and across the tables I see three people at one table, and this one young man, he looks at me. I said 'Oh, sure, c'mon over.'

The result: "We had the best time. He was so extremely helpful. I'm in bifocals looking through the microscope. He'd help. We laughed a lot. He even asked me to join with the other kids in a study group. If he thought it was a chore or awful to be with this older person, he never

She says, "I was pleased with the whole exposure to this generation. It was charming to find, they just treated me

like somebody else in the class."

She liked government and history classes. An Ethics class she took to fulfill requirements, "I enjoyed a lot because we got to talk about issues, abortion, right to die. The discussions were really interesting." A Civil War history class, another on the U.S. Constitution turned out to be relative to current events. "We were required to watch all of the presidential debates and critique them in the 2016 election. I learned a lot."

"Everyone was extremely supportive," Ms. Rehm says. The school allowed her to audit a math class in advance of fulfilling the credit requirement. "Math today, everything is with the backup of this thing, have you heard of it, a graphing calculator. Well, I was having a devil of a time with it."

She was directed to the math lab, where she met "a wonderful tutor, who really helped me, and he did it in such an easy, non-demeaning way. We really got

along. He's retired from GE, and tutors math two afternoons a week.

"I didn't take much away from the math, but I did realize now how young people are doing the math, and that was another person I made a connection with. It was a great experience.'

"At this juncture I don't think I need to boast about having a degree I should have long since accomplished," is Ms. Rehm's thought.

The message, she says, is "SUNY Adirondack is such a gem," accessible for anyone in any situation — or at any age to continue learning. Degree in hand, Ms. Rehm says she plans to continue taking classes, "in things I'm interested in."



[™] Isabelle: Got her kidney & 'doing great!'

Isabelle Perkett, the 17-year-old Lake George student profiled in The Chronicle who was suddenly diagnosed with renal failure last December — she has received her kidney transplant.

"I feel great and I am so grateful to my donor and for all my friends, family and community supporting me through all of this," Isabelle says.

Mom Donna Metivier Perkett tells The Chronicle, "We are beyond thrilled that this happened so quickly, and so incredibly grateful to our organ donor and to the amazing transplant team at Albany Medical Center.

"They truly do work magic!"

How it happened, Mrs. Perkett tells us: "On Tuesday, May 10, at 3 p.m., I was in my kitchen preparing strawberries for dinner when my phone rang. ... It was the

transplant Doctor from Albany Medical Hospital.

"He said we have the perfect kidney

available for Isabelle. Please come down as soon as you can for

transplant. OMG! "Our bag was packed as we had been instructed to do and I quickly ran to get Isabelle, who was staying after school."

At Albany Med, "We were welcomed to the transplant floor. The staff was so lovely and really helped Isabelle to calm down and feel comfortable about the procedure. Isabelle was definitely not prepared for this to happen so quickly and she was not shy about sharing her



feelings with anyone willing to listen, plus she was very nervous and scared.

"She had hoped to complete her junior

year and get the transplant sometime this summer.

"We knew the transplant would take place in the middle of the night because that is when the transplant team can get the operating room time.

"Finally after what seemed like weeks, she was wheeled down to the OR at 4:30 a.m. The monitor in the waiting area indicated the procedure officially started at 5:55 a.m. on Wednesday, May 11.

"I sat and watched that monitor for what seemed like 3 weeks!" Mrs. Perkett

The procedure was completed by 9:30

a.m. Doctors reported that the kidney "pinked up" immediately, Mrs. Perkett says. "They were very pleased."

Isabelle slept until 7:30 at night, "when she woke up and the true Isabelle was back!," Mom says. "She asked for food and water, which was quickly denied, and she also wanted to get out of bed. and she also wanted to get out of bed.

'She got up that night several times which definitely helps with recovery. She was a little sore, but she kept saying, 'That was not bad at all!'"

"She REALLY wanted to eat the next day, so they said Okay. She managed to polish off more than three meals with no side effects.

Now, Isabelle begins high doses of immunosuppressants that she will take for the rest of her life, which she also is tolerating "very well," Mrs. Perkett says.

By Friday, the doctors said she was doing so well she could go home, Mom re-

At home on Saturday, Mrs. Perkett said, "She looks better than ever. She feels great, is getting around just fine, is not sleeping any extra or taking any pain medication. She has just picked up where she left off."

Isabelle will finish her junior year remotely, and plans to return for her senior year in person in the Fall. However, for the next four months she needs to stay away from people and crowds.

"She will have many appointments and needs to get bloodwork four times a week for a while until all her medications are regulated and they can watch for possible infection or rejection."

Love and support; Donate!

Mrs. Perkett says, "Since this all started we have been absolutely amazed at all the love and support we have received from family, friends and strangers, both near and far. It has been the most amazing outpouring of love anyone could ever imagine and we are so grateful. Especially to our community we say 'Thank You!'

"Thank for the cards, the donations and for caring.

"As soon as Isabelle is back to 100% we will begin campaigning to get more people to be organ donors.

"It is amazing what the gift of life looks like, and so many people are waiting. Isabelle was very fortunate that she is under 18, so she did not have to wait for her kidney, but most people wait many years to get their gift."



Matt Rozell in Germany: Found train site, full circle with Johanna

Editor's note: This is the second in a series, following Hudson Falls historian and retired teacher Matt Rozell's documentary project on his best-selling book A Train from Magdeburg, about American solders' liberation of Jewish Holocaust surviors in 1945.

On April 12, film director Mike Edwards and I drove in our rented BMW

from near Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, to the city of Magdeburg on the Elbe River. Crew members Josh and Joel followed in another car.

we were greeted with a warm smile by 20-year-old Johanna Mücke, tall, with flaming

red hair and impeccable English.

Four years prior, in 2018 at age 16, Johanna had written to me, asking if there were any American soldiers still alive that she could correspond with.

We put her in contact with Combat medic Walter Gantz of Scranton, Pa., who wrote with her until his death in 2019.

Now, Johanna was to serve as our translator and guide on this important part of the trip.

From the city — almost totally rebuilt after the World War II bombings — Johanna led us to the hamlet of Farsleben, 10 minutes from her former high school, where the train pictured on the cover of

my book had been liberated.

Setting the stage

On April 12, 1945, the train had been abandoned by the engineer and guards. American soldiers were nearby; the

American soldiers were nearby; the Red Army was nearing the Elbe River across from Magdeburg. That evening, the abandoned Jewish victims witnessed the most spectacular carpet bombing of the city of Magdeburg, a preparation for what was to be the final battle.

Some of the young went into the town begging for food. Most of its terrified residents shuttered their doors. Over 2,000 sick and hungry people had descended on Magdeburg.

A culminating moment

In April 2020 during the pandemic, a square granite monument inscribed with the insignia of the 30th Infantry Division, the date "April 13, 1945," and "LIBERATION" in German, Hebrew, and English, had been unveiled, with the formal dedication postponed due to to Covid until the 77th anniversary — tomorrow.

I was scheduled to speak, and we were planning to film it. Today, my first time here, it was important to me to be at this site without the crowds.

This was a culminating moment of my life's work. The recent local German awareness, the new monument and signage all traced their roots to our Hudson Falls interviews and reunions, stretching back two decades.

This had to be it!

Mike and the crew wanted to find the exact location where the train had been in our photograph, and from there, to make out the exact location where Amercan soldiers Walsh and Gross's tanks had paused as their Major took the famous liberation photo.

As we walked back and forth on the ridgeline overlooking the ravine, through the trees that were not there in the 1945 photograph, a cargo train zoomed by. Josh filmed. The cars rushing by matched perfectly with the alignment of the train in the 77-year-old picture. On the opposite side of the ravine, hilltop and tree line matched perfectly over the top of the cars. This had to be it.

With 'my guys'

The morning before the dedication ceremony, I found the access road that the tanks would have taken, where American soldier George Gross took many photographs after his tank was assigned to spend the night protecting the train.

Here was where my guys had been. It was quiet, sunny, a breeze blowing through the locusts and the pines.

Seventy-seven years ago to the mo-

















New NYS Senate lines don't alter Stec's much







ment, at exactly that spot, people found salvation and tasted freedom.

A passenger train now rounded the bend as I neared the tracks. My heart raced with the long-ago soldiers at the blast of the wind, and I felt the sharp cry of the saved in their hour of deliverance as this modern day train shrieked past.

Survivor Leslie Meisels, age 18 at liberation, had recalled in interviews: "People were milling around outside of the wagons, talking about what had happened. Sometime around midday. I had made a fire from some twigs and I was starting to boil some of the remaining red beets in a pot when suddenly a huge cry went up.

When I looked over to the top of that little embankment, I saw some dirty, sweating American soldiers — the most beautiful human beings imaginable appear with their guns ready.

'Instead of the enemy, they found us and heard our screams and our cries of Oh God, we are free! We are going to be human beings again!'..

Agi Baker, who had been 10, recalled: "The first sight I had of the Americans from inside the train was of a vehicle such as we had never seen before - it had a great white star on it, and someone familiar with that star said, 'Oh my God, the Americans are here!'

..The soldiers came, and were gentle, and gave us food.

"As I was a child, I fantasized that the soldiers were angels, with their wings hidden under their uniform shirts. Today I know that this was no fantasy; in that place and at that time the American soldiers were angels indeed!"

both Leslie and Agi got to meet their liberators. Now I was at the site of their salvation, 77 years to the hour: We found it.

German community takes note

The following day, we filmed Johanna and some former classmates in their old history classroom.

Their teacher Karin Pederson had attended a lecture in the spring of 2018 by local father and son historians Daniel and Klaus-Peter Keweloh.

Daniel had written to me in 2008 from the German town of Hillersleben, some 15 or so km from the liberation site. During the World War, Hillersleben was the largest German military base for testing artillery, complete with barracks and a hospital. Hitler himself visited.

The base, captured also by U.S. forces on April 13, 1945, was where the liberated people were transported to get them cared for and out of harm's way.

Stranded Train Committee

Karin Pederson was brave to introduce her students to this history. They formed the "Stranded Train Committee" to create the signage and monument at the site.

There was some pushback, a knee-jerk fatigue of sorts by ordinary Germans feeling called to account for the crimes of their grandparents' generation, at home and abroad. But more common was incredulity, bordering on outrage.

Since the publication of the liberator photographs in my book and on my website, survivors and second generation family members have been coming here to see the site of their liberation, or where their parents or grandparents succumbed and were buried.

How could there be nothing at the site to recall, honor and remember?

It was a thrill to see how they had picked up on my research and created something important.

Inviting survivors back to speak at their school, they made a bond with the first Jewish people they had ever met.

Walter's nightmare

April 15, Easter Saturday, was grey, cold and overcast. With Johanna, we headed to Hillersleben to conduct interviews with Germans who were alive when the train was liberated.

This was the site of recurring nightmares for Walter Gantz, Johanna's American contact. He had told us of working long shifts caring for the sick Holocaust survivors in Hillersleben.

"In the wee hours of the morning, this young girl died. For some reason, I wrapped her up in a blanket and I carried her down the stairs and I was cry-

...I didn't have to do that, because we had a team that took care of those who died and placed them in the morgue.

"...[This girl] was actually 15 years old. Her name was Eva, and you might say, 'How was it possible that he could carry her?' She probably weighed 60 pounds, maybe. I thought about that many times, and I must have been attracted to her for some reason. That haunted me, really. It really haunted me.'

The liberation had greatly affected Walter for the rest of his days. I know on a special level that the frienship with Johanna helped heal the trauma that he could not speak about for most of his life.

Full circle: Eva's name

Hillersleben historian Daniel K. and his father took us to the now practically abandoned cemetery, surrounded by a sea of solar panels, where the hospital and garrison had been under first German, then Soviet occupation until the end of the Cold War. No individual graves were marked, but there was a memorial

There, with Johanna present, we found Eva's name. This German girl and her interest had been cathartic for the old American veteran, and now we stood before teenage Eva's resting place.

Another circle had closed.
