





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# LG: 2 killed, one an 8-year-old, hit by motorcycle

Lake George residents **Quinton Delgadillo, 8**, and **James A. Persons, 38**, were killed Sunday afternoon when **a motorcycle** driven by Anthony J. Futia, 33, of Albany, **crashed into pedestrians on Route 9 at the Warren County Bike Trail** near the Lake George Expedition Park, formerly The Magic Forest.

Quinton's mother Jasmine Luellen was hospitalized at Albany Medical Center in stable condition as of Monday. Three other children in the group were not injured.

Mr. Futia was in critical condition with "life-threatening injuries" at Albany Medical Center as of Monday, said State Police. Their initial press release said "a pre-

Their initial press release said "a preliminary investigation determined that a motorcycle was heading north on Route 9 at a high rate of speed [when] it went off the east shoulder of the road and onto a paved bike path, striking a group of six pedestrians...standing at the entrance to the bike path."

CBS 6 reported Tuesday that a DMV spokesperson said **Mr. Futia was not licensed to operate a motorcycle**.

The Warren County Board of Supervisors offered its "deepest condolences" and said the County Department of Public Works would "review safety measures in that area of Warren County Bikeway."

Christian Dutcher, who organizes the Americade touring motorcycle rally, said in a press release, "Our community suffered a terrible tragedy on Sunday afternoon and like everyone else are shocked and heartbroken for the family of the victims." He said Mr. Futia was not a registered Americade participant, and that Americade week ended "fully" Saturday, prior to Sunday's crash.

**Quinton was a student** in Mrs. Gershen's and Ms. Gearing's third-grade class.

Elementary School Principal James Conway described him as "well-liked, super polite, and loved by all. He was a good friend to all of his classmates."

Lake George Superintendent Douglas Huntley told *The Chronicle* Tuesday that "the school is handling it well as could possibly be expected. The whole school has come together. They're supporting one another."

Dr. Huntley wrote in his press release, "I encourage parents and guardians to talk with your children about this tragedy. Discussing thoughts and feelings about this situation is important in helping your child work through her or his grief, shock, confusion and sadness."

Community member Shannon Kelly started a **Gofundme campaign** for the family Monday. Tuesday morning, it **had raised \$22,169 of a \$25,000 goal**.

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# LGA wins in court: LGPC's herbicide treatment halted until suit resolved

Sate Supreme Court Judge Robert J. Muller granted a preliminary injunction preventing the Lake George Park Commission from using the ProcellaCOR her-bicide to treat invasive Eurasian watermilfoil, "pending the conclusion of this proceeding."

It's the latest development in the LGA's suit against the Adirondack Park Agency. LGPC, and New York State Department of Environmental Conservation to prevent ProcellaCor's use on Lake George.

# **DEC: Must inspect** boats when launched in new ADK water

The DEC announced that all motorized boats must receive a certificate that they have been inspected for invasive species before they launch in a new waterbody in or around the Adirondack Park.

The law applies to any motorized boat launching within the Park and within 10 miles of the Blue Line.

Certificates can be obtained through free inspections or decontaminations at aquatic invasive species inspection sta-tions located at popular boat launches.

Boaters can also follow Clean, Drain, Dry steps and fill out a self-issued certificate available on DEC's website.

DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos was quoted, "Aquatic invasive species like hydrilla, the round goby fish, and zebra mussels are detrimental to the health of lieves that everyone should have an opportunity to he heard — and without the issuance of this injunction — petitioners will be denied that opportunity.

"While petitioners may not ultimately prevail, they have set forth the minimum degree of proof required to demonstrate a prima facie case on several causes of action — and respondents have been unable to provide any compelling reason why ProcellaCOR must be applied now."

The LGA called the decision "a major victory for Lake George and everyone who believes that science should prevail when it comes to protecting these incredible waters.

The LGPC said although disappointed, it "respects the court's conservative preliminary decisions and looks forward to the full hearing whereby the extensive volume of scientific study and regulatory review of this case can be made very clear.'



# **Scoop: Dyed in the wool**

Trump were to face off today for President — as they might in 2024 — who do you think would win?

I hope it doesn't come to that — as either candidate. I'll tell you that I think Biden is a disaster as President. The nation, whatever your allegiance, needs to move on from Donald Trump.

On June 3, *The Wall Street Journal* ran an article headlined, "The 11-Minute Harvard Speech That Re-

built Postwar Europe." It said, "It's been 75 years since George Marshall outlined a bold plan to counter Soviet influence by revitalizing a foreign foe.'

The Marshall Plan in 1947 was incredibly bold, that we should

spend billions building up the country we just defeated: Germany.

"Marshall was newly confirmed as President Harry Truman's secretary of state and known by virtually every adult as the five-star army general who had guided the nation to victory in World War II," wrote David L. Roll. Marshall was so revered that his crazy idea got approved.

The story said, "When political adviser Clark Clifford recommended that it be called the Truman Plan, Truman scoffed. 'If I send that plan up to the Hill,' he said, 'it will quiver a couple of times, go belly up, and die. Even the worst Republican will vote for the plan if Marshall's name is on it."

Why do I tell you this story now? Because George Marshall was a genuinely great and visionary man (and Harry Truman was good enough to get out of his way). Marshall thought "outside the box" and hatched an idea that propelled the U.S., Germany and much of the world

# She asks: Who is the Socialist?

Chronicle editor Mark Frost writes: There's an interesting writer from San Francisco I started following on Twitter because she clued me in early to what was going on there — how one of the world's most liberal cities was ousting three progressive school board members and now did the same to radical District Attorney Chesa Boudin.

Last week she tweeted:

'Two men, from very different circumstances. "One born rich, white, destined for a private college education & inheritance.

The other born poor, brown, who hustled his way into becoming a business owner and top plumber in the Bay Area.

"Who is the socialist ...?"



What we need is our own George Marshall to break through the hopeless despair that engulfs us now.

The parties aren't lacking for burning issues. Democrats have so much to fire up the base - not

just Trump but Supreme Court's expected reversal of Roe v. Wade; the mass shootings in Buffalo and Uvale, Texas, ratcheting effort to curb shooters and weapons both; perceived racial, ethnic, economic and gender inequities; saving the nation; oh, and, climate change.

Republicans are as fiercely lit about sky-high inflation, unaffordable gas prices, unavailable baby formula, uncontrolled borders, the sense of rising crime and societal breakdown; saving the nation (all sides' issue). Even the Ukraine war now seems to be going badly. And people gag when woke gets rammed down their throat.

Who has the advantage? Republicans right now.

For the average American, the bread-and-butter, pocketbook issues characteristically trump social.

Alarmingly for Democrats, polls show they're losing many Hispanic voters, a big reason Republicans are widely expected to regain the House majority this fall.

Coincidentally, Tuesday night, came this press release from Rep. Elise Stefanik's E-PAC: "Congratulations to E-PAC endorsed Mayra Flores on her inspiring and historic Special Election victory in TX-34...As the first Mexican-born woman elected to Congress, Mayra has sent a resounding message to the Democratic Party in South Texas and across America — Democrats do not own the Hispanic vote." (Hillary carried this district by 22% in 2016, Biden narrowly in 2020. It turns bluer with redistricting. Ms. Flores is a longer shot this fall.)

In politics things can change, quickly, substantially, but every passing day suggests it won't happen before the November election.

The expression that recurs to me lately is "dyed in the wool." I think most people this election cycle are dyed in the wool, opinions set, minds made up - or they're paying it all no mind to begin with.

All the jockeying, the politicking, the onslaught of media narratives won't change the color of 2022

The case the House Committee is building vs. Donald Trump may make longer term impact; I doubt it will change the complexion of 2022.

Two years from now, when we next vote for President? My hope is that two different — and, frankly, better candidates emerge than Trump and Biden.

If what I wrote above came across as bleak, let me shift in a different, more hopeful direction.

Lately, I think, at the grass roots level, more people across the political spectrum — are signalling toler-ance, a refreshed desire simply to get along. I've sensed and seen it in several recent interactions I've had.

I've said for many months that if the nation is to be saved, rescue will percolate from the bottom up. Up from ordinary people, whose decency I always bank on, not down from ideologues and know-it-all elites.

# NY Senate: Jean Lapper challenging Dan Stec

Democrat Jean Lapper filed petitions to challenge Republican Dan Stec in the race for the 45th District of the State Senate. The district includes Warren, Essex, Clinton, Franklin and parts of Washington and St. Lawrence Counties.

Both candidates live in Queensury.

Ms. Lapper, a Certified Public Accountant, said in a press release, "Many of the constituents in the 45th feel underrepresented in Albany. I have the skills, the energy and the temperament to work constructively for our communities to bring real results."

Sen. Stec, a Navy veteran and former state assemblyman, was first elected as State Senator of the 45th District in 2020. He also previously served as Queensbury Town Supervisor and chairman of the Warren County Board of Supervisors.

# Daphne Jordan angry but won't contest GOP primary vs. Tedisco

Republican 43rd District State Senator Daphne Jordan announced Tuesday, "I have made the difficult decision to not actively campaign for the Republican and Conservative Primaries that Jim Tedisco has unfortunately launched against me."

"By law, my name will still appear on the ballot in both primary elections in August, but I will not contest these races," said Ms. Jordan, who has been a senator since 2018.

The pair sought to become State Senator for the redrawn 44th District, which contains all of Saratoga County and part of Schenectady County. Ms. Jordan lives in it; Mr. Tedisco does not. He would have faced Democrat incumbent Neil Breslin in the newly redrawn district.

Mr. Tedisco has been endorsed by the

questions, doubts and outright objections, during and after the meeting.

The head of the Farmers Market said he was shocked to see that their market space has been cut from 10,000 to 5,000 square feet. Mayor Collins defended the plan, said he was eager for the farmers market to capitalize on it, but added that he couldn't give sole priority to a user of the space for four hours a week.

Questions were raised about vehicle access to the building and feasibility of its use in colder weather.

An audience member urged solar collectors on the flat rooftops and more environmental emphasis all the way around. The developers said it is an emphasis and that the construction industry as a whole has shifted that way. What was once unique in LEED-certified buildings, they said, is now standard procedure.



tic rethinking that would move the farmers market to the first floor commercial space in 14 Hudson that has never found a tenant

Also offering a drastic rethinking was Ed Moore, the owner of the currently expanding Queensbury Hotel, who spoke in conversation after the evening meeting.

"Keep the farmers market where it is," he urged. He said he can accept the plans for the former Sandy's Clam Bar, Hot Shots and business incubator buildings, but he strongly urged that Mr. Bonacio's planned Phase 2 five-story mixed use apartment building should instead go to the vacant former OTB lot where Glens Falls wants to build its Market Center.

Mr. Moore acknowledged that he's been told it's impossible to change direction now and that the state agencies whose





approval is needed are set on this plan. Mr. Moore hasn't given up.

Mayor Collins previously pushed hard and has sought federal money to turn the current Elm Street parking lot into a transportation hub/parking garage.

He admits it drew a lot of opposition, that he has backed off, and that now the city will take a fresh look and has commissioned a comprehensive study of the parking throughout the downtown.

### Some juicy tidbits

Mr. Bonacio touted to the crowd the possibility of there being a year-round food market on the first floor of the former incubator building on Elm Street.

The Chronicle approached him after the meeting and asked if that is possible given that Price Chopper just closed its market launched in a building developed in recent years in Saratoga Springs.



Mr. Bonacio asked if The Chronicle realized he has purchased that building and said that he will have a major announcement in two weeks that he seemed to indicate will have a food thrust.

Glens Falls Development Director Jeff Flagg, in reference to parking, said the city has money to install street sensors that will identify available parking spaces people can find through a phone app. It can also track how long a car is parked.

## **Glens Falls' original DRI** South Street plan in 2016

Chronicle Managing Editor Cathy DeDe writes: The original state-approved Downtown Revitalization Initiative award included three South Street projects:

• \$5 million for the "Market on South Street and Parking Structure," described as a "downtown anchor building" with space for the farmers market, retial and an incubator-test kitchen.

• \$1.2 million to redevelop four parcels containing vacant buildings on the southwest corner of South and Elm Streets, "key intersection in downtown Glens Falls

• \$600,000 to create a new park including green infrastructure for stormwater management on the corner of South and School Streets - since shifted to landscaping for the Market Center.

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# Grand opening: Moran-Derby Park athletic & event complex, in HF

On **Saturday, June 18**, the Village of Hudson Falls will host a **ribbon-cutting ceremony and day-long celebration** for the grand opening of Moran-Derby Park, the newly re-named, \$1.8-million community athletic complex and festival space between Coleman Avenue and William Street, said a press release.

"The park was made possible by the generosity of people and organizations from across the region — most notably a **\$500,000 lead gift from** longtime local sporting goods retailers and philanthropists **Brien and Mike Moran** in memory and honor of their late parents, Henry G. and Gladys Moran," the release said.

"Other major financial support includes a \$600,000 grant from the state Office of Park, Recreation & Historic Preservation, and generous donations from the Sandy Hill Foundation, Wheelabrator Technologies, and Boralex."

Mayor John Barton was quoted: "What a great time for the Village of Hudson Falls and the Town of Kingsbury. This park was such an important part of growing up in Hudson Falls for so many years, and **now it's back and better than ever** for the enjoyment of people of all ages across our entire region. Combined with our growing downtown arts district, we're putting Hudson Falls back on the map." Mike Moran was quoted: "There's a

**Mike Moran** was quoted: "There's a real passion for this park that's shared by me and my brother and so many others around the region. **It hurt to drive by and see empty fields and not hear the laughter** and sounds of the games. But that's all going to change now, and we're thrilled to have had the opportunity to help. Our parents would be so happy, too. They felt very strongly about how important athletics and physical activity are to growing healthy bodies and minds and communities, and Moran-Derby Park will do all of those things."

The release said, "**Moran-Derby Park feature**s a new basketball court, a regulation-size soccer field; a softball field; three pickleball courts; a quarter-mile walking path; two new event spaces for community festivals; new lighting and fencing; and a new parking lot. A commemorative brick walkway with engraved bricks purchased by community members is also complete.



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# **GF** psychologists: **Take these steps** to help stem mass shootings

We are both mental health providers and are alarmed at the way mass shootings are being framed in our national dialogue.

As a diverse country, we may hold different beliefs and ideas about moving forward, but surely, we are all sick and tired of this violent cycle playing out over and over with no signs of improvement.

If we want that to change, we must be willing to look at our own culpability in perpetuating one-sided, flawed solutions.

### **Data-based Violence Project**

As providers, we look to data and evidence-based research to make sense of things, and to understand our nation's infuriating inertia on preventing mass shootings.

Our search led us to The Violence Project, a National Institute of Justice-funded nonprofit, nonpartisan research center dedicated to reducing violence in society. We encourage everyone to read their

2021 book on this subject.

### **Start with statistics**

Statistics from The Violence Project: Mass shootings — killings of 4 or more people, outside of domestic instances, organized crime and gang violence — have become more common and more deadly.

More than half of the 167 mass shootings since 1966 occurred after 2000. • Such shootings claimed 8 lives per year in the 1970s, now up to 51 deaths per year between 2010 and 2019.

From their research, including interviews with mass shooters, and those who knew them before they committed their crimes, The Violence Project identified four things that nearly all mass shooters have in common:

### 1) Unresolved childhood trauma and

exposure to violence at a young age. 2) An identifiable grievance or crisis point. This is often an angry and suicidal crisis. It involves a noticeable change from the person's baseline behavior.

3) Online presence, researching other mass shooters, susceptibility to radical-ization, and leakage — posting online or talking about their plans with other people.

**4)** The means to carry out an attack.

### Flawed & incomplete

Many people try to frame mass shootings as only a mental health problem or only a gun violence problem.

We contend that either position is flawed and incomplete.

The American Psychological Association notes, "Although the United States makes up less than 5% of the world's population, we are home to 31% of all mass shooters globally

"...This difference is not explained by the rate of mental illness in the U.S.

We also know that most people who have experienced trauma or are in crisis will never commit a mass shooting.

### Can't write off mental health

At the same time, it is not accurate to say, as some policy makers on the left do, that addressing mental health is a distraction from the solution

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The Violence Project and its related site, the Off-Ramp Project, list ways to address mental health in schools and other organizations.

They offer training to identify early warning signs, build a crisis team, and intervene appropriately. In many cases, they say, the intervention should be supportive rather than punitive.

All the mass shooters interviewed said they could have been stopped if they had

been offered help.

### 'Deaths of despair' also up

The Violence Project also found that "deaths of despair" — such as drug over-doses and suicides — are on a similar upward trajectory in our country.

This indicates that effective mental health responses may help curb both mass shootings and other tragedies, and that removing the means to carry out harm is also warranted.

When the UK started requiring blister packaging, in smaller quantities, for overthe-counter analgesic drugs, they saw a reduction in suicide overdoses from these pills.

People usually choose to harm themselves or others in a temporary state of desperation. Having to pop individual pills out of blister packages that are acquired in small quantities over time forces the process to slow.

It creates more time for intervention.

Similarly, a person in crisis who faces a mandatory waiting period when trying to purchase a gun may no longer be in the same state of desperation once the waiting period ends.

### Are they 'monsters?'

It is over-simplistic and flawed to label mass shooters as "monsters," outsiders who are not like us. Psychology would tell us that framing mass shootings as isolated events carried out by monstrous outliers is a defense mechanism.

The childhood girlfriend of a person who became a mass shooter told The Violence Project, "When you label them monsters, you erase the ability for anyone to think someone in their life could do this."

Most shooters come from within our communities, our schools or organizations. If we pay attention to changes in behavior and respond appropriately, they can be offered support before they become desperate enough to engage in harm to others and themselves.

The metaphor used in the book is that of a balloon about to burst. If we can get to the person and let some of the air out, we can prevent them from bursting. No root cause can justify or excuse vio-

lent acts, but mitigating root causes may reverse these alarming upward trends.

### Blame vs. accountability

If we accept our vulnerability that someone from our community could commit one of these acts - we feel less in control. We feel more in control when we have a simple person or policy to blame.

Dr. Brene Brown, an expert on shame and vulnerability, describes the need to blame someone for things that feel out of our control as a short-term remedy that temporarily makes us feel better.

However, she says, simply placing blame sidesteps accountability.

In the case of a mass shooting, if we can blame "the right" for refusing to address gun regulations, or "the left" for trying to take guns away from those who could protect us, we have a target for our anger. But we lose the ability to see the bigger picture, or accountability for our failure to work together to stop this.

### Keeping 'monsters' at bay

When we're scared, the rational part of our brain shuts down and survival instincts ramp up. Our brain prioritizes the quickest route to safety. If we can label the shooter as a monster, we can focus on how to keep monsters out of our buildings, falsely reassuring ourselves no harm will come to us.

We've spent billions of dollars trying

creased their school security spending.

Law enforcement miscalculated their response, and 2 teachers and 19 students died. They were not superheroes; they were humans who wanted to help and either miscalculated or were afraid.

This is not an anomaly.

In Parkland, the armed officer did not enter the school for 45 minutes, and 17 people were murdered.

The Violence Project found the rate of deaths was nearly three times higher in schools with an armed police officer.

Shooters may have elaborate plans for carrying out their crimes, but those rarely include an exit plan. They are usually in a suicidal state and may even choose locations with armed officers because they want to be killed.

Our current laws are not working. 77% of mass shooters obtained their guns legally. 80% of teenage school shooters obtained their firearms from adults in their lives, many who had not properly stored their weapons.

### Not one approach, alone

Securing schools alone is not and has not been the answer.

Securing schools and addressing mental health concerns are also not the complete answer.

The research is clear: We must prioritize early intervention and reduce the easy access to guns.

Universal background checks, permits to purchase, raising the age, red flag laws, proper storage enforcement - all have data-driven results.

### 'Constitutional & necessary'

Common-sense gun regulations are both constitutionally sound and a necessary part of the solution.

In the landmark gun case, Heller, Justice Anton Scalia wrote that while his opinion guaranteed an individual right to self-defense that was "most acute" in the home, that right was not unlimited.

He wrote:

"...nothing in our opinion should be taken to cast doubt on longstanding pro-hibitions on the possession of firearms by felons and the mentally ill, or laws forbidding the carrying of firearms in sensitive places such as schools and government buildings, or laws imposing conditions and qualifications on the commercial sale of arms.

Many conservative politicians misuse Heller to label gun regulations as unconstitutional.

Yet Justice Scalia was clear: The Second Amendment is not an all-or-nothing right. Believing that one must either support the Second Amendment and oppose regulations or be against the Second Amendment and want to regulate guns is false framing.

### 'We are the adults'

We are taking the easy way out when we focus on only some of the evidence and data - the parts that support our political leanings, the elements that allow us to blame the other side.

But guess what?

We are the adults. We are supposed to protect our children and our communities, and we must face problems in their entirety rather than putting on blinders to block out the parts of the problem that make us uncomfortable. Securing schools and mental health

care are parts of the solution, but they alone are not the answer.

Gun regulations are a necessary part of the solution, but so is funding mental health.

Until we have the courage to consider comprehensive solutions that embrace the full complexity of mass shootings quality mental health funding, security, online radicalization, and gun regulation - we will remain stagnated, failing to act with accountability, and waiting for news of the next mass casualties.

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to keep the monsters out by securing schools, arming resource officers, and engaging in active shooter drills.

We've normalized mass shootings in schools to the point that our kids have active shooter drills or lockdown/lockout drills like they have fire drills.

Learning to hide and be quiet so someone will not kill them at school is not a normal way for kids to grow up. Yet this is the American student experience.

### **Does police presence help?**

In Uvalde, the district had greatly in-

# **Strawberry** season: Fewer places to go pick

It's strawberry season. Picking opportunities are not as available locally as they are for blueberries and raspberries in their seasons, and there's one less option this year as Strawberry Ridge Farm in Granville has exited the strawberry business

Two farms locally that do have strawberries to pick are Hand Melon Farms in Greenwich, at 533 Wilbur Ave., across from the Washington County Fairgrounds, and Ariel's Farm in Gansevoort at 194 Northern Pines Road (north of Saratoga Springs).

John Hand of Hand Melon Farms says the two farms are friends. "There's not a lot of competition in the area anymore. I'm friends with Ariel's farm in Wilton. And we don't really feel that we compete for each other's customers. There's not a lot of other places nearby."

Catherine Ariel of Ariel's Farm says, "A lot of our customers were from the North Country, as far up as Brant Lake.

Both farmers believe the limited U-pick strawberry farms in the area could be a generational issue.

Mr. Hand suggests, "I think it may be an issue of legacy. A family grows strawberries, and then the parents retire and the next generation decides not to continue on."

That isn't the case with Hand Melon Farm. "My great grandfather bought this land in 1909, so we've been here over 110 years," Mr. Hand said.

"My son says he's interested in coming back to run the farm. He's doing an internship to finish up his college bachelor's degree from Cobleskill currently, and I think it's a challenging undertaking for him in the next generation. But I'm cautiously optimistic that he's going to want to do it, continue to want to do it."

Ms. Ariel at Ariel's Farm, in business for more than 50 years, says, "We need more young farmers." She adds that there are not just fewer strawberry farms but fewer farms in general.

Strawberry Ridge in Granville is facing the exact dilemma that Mr. Hand Iva Liebig, who died in March at the age of 95, was the longtime proprietor of **Strawberry Ridge** Farm in Granville. Chronicle 2010 photo/ Mark Frost



and Ms. Ariel described. In order to take a new job, third-generation strawberry farmer Derek Liebig said he had to make the difficult decision to discontinue the farm's strawberry patches.

'It enabled me to support my family and have a little bit more free time than I would have continuing to grow strawberries. So it was not an easy decision," Mr. Liebig said.

"Like I said, my family's been growing strawberries in this area for over half a century. And so I took tremendous pride in that business and what we've gotten accomplished."

But the farm is continuing to maintain its blueberry and raspberry patches, said Mr. Liebig.

The farms face natural challenges, too. "Strawberries are finicky," said Re-becca Devaney, Community Horticulture Coordinator with the Warren County Cornell Cooperative Extension.

"It's a highly labor intensive industry, the growing season is very short, so the opportunity for profits is somewhat limited.'

But local strawberries stay in demand. Mr. Hand touts, "Most of the strawberries that are carried by the grocery stores are shipped in from other growing regions, and they're typically just not the same. They are larger, tend to have less flavor, have been shipped a long distance, so they're bred and designed for longevity of shelf life, at the expense of flavor. Local berries, I believe, tend to have a lot more flavor, but do not have the shelf life. They

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# North Queensbury & Bay Ridge **EMS** are merging

The two-step process has already begun, with the agen-

ary 1, 2023. Conni Tucker, a spokesperson for the consolidation committee, told *The Chron*icle. "To consolidate both agencies will help fiscally and ensure that this end of the town is covered. Additionally, we will be able to buy our supplies in larger quantities, meaning there will be less of a cost over time".

She said the number of volunteers at the North Queensbury Squad has declined in the past few years, sometimes creating gaps in EMS coverage and causing the squad to rely on Bay Ridge to cover some of their calls.

The folks in the north end haven't been fully covered in a long time because of the lack of volunteers. The few folks that are up there are very dedicated,

however," Tucker said.

A 2019 study of EMS services in the Town showed that North Queensbury EMS had only eight total volunteer members, compared to 50 volunteer members at Bay Ridge EMS.

From Memorial Day to Labor Day, North Queensbury has a full-time paramedic from an outsourced hiring agency on duty 24/7 and a paid EMT-Driver only 12 hours a day, with the remaining 12 hours being covered by volunteers.

One of the first tasks as part of the merger was to form a consolidation committee of six members, three from each agency.

The committee members from North Queensbury are Todd Mahoney, John Hodgkins and Lisa Munzenmaier.

Committee members from Bay Ridge are Conni Tucker, Kim Thom and Shane Irwin.

Tucker says the committee is working well together with a primary purpose:

meeting the emergency medical needs of the residents of the Town. "The residents of Queensbury want good medical services, we want to make sure they are getting that in return," she said.

While the process of consolidating the agencies may seem like a simple task, Tucker explained that it's quite the opposite, which is the only downside of the merger.

"There's a lot of paperwork that needs to be done for the Department of State and the Health Department, there's a whole laundry list of things that need to be done and we're kind of chipping away at things one at a time," she said.

Once the merger is complete, the agency will operate under a new name;



"Queensbury EMS." The committee felt it made the most sense since it's the simplest. "Nothing sounded as good as Queensbury EMS," Tucker explained.

She says the Stronger Together mantra has already proven true, even in the early stages of the consolidation.

"We have a wonderful committee," Tucker remarked. "This is something we've all recognized needed to be done, so we are all going to try to get it taken care of and do what's in the best interest of the Town of Queensbury."

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# Cathy's take on **South Street** plan unveiling

More than 60 people attended the Monday afternoon update by the City of Glens Falls on its \$10 million NYS Downtown Revitalization Initiative project, held in the community room at Crandall Public Library.

Glens Falls Mayor Bill Collins, Development Director Jeff Flagg and guest speakers, Larry Novik of Bonacio Construction's Spring City Development of Glens Falls, and Scott Townsend, principal architect at SWBR in Troy, recapped progress in the City of Glens Falls, DRI projects already achieved, and plans for the centerpiece South Street projects.

### 'Street of Dreams'

Mr. Collins described the South Street corridor as "the final missing piece" of Glens Falls revitalization efforts.

"South Street is perhaps slipping now," he said, "a sad shell of its former self."

He recalled nights at the old Sippy's bar in South Street's heyday, and remembered Sandy's Clam Bar as a home for local bands, "many a fund-raiser," and "our place, even though it was dark, dank and rundown."

"Sadly, South Street is no longer 'the Street of Dreams," Mr. Collins said. "Fortunately, that is not where the story ends."

With a series of slides, the presenters introduced the latest plans for a Market Center slated to house the Glens Falls Farmers Market and community events, mixed use renovations of Hotshots Bar a historic building that Mr. Novik noted was originally the first private hospital in Glens Falls, the Incubator Building at 36 Elm Street, and Sandy's, all designated for Phase One of the DRI project.

The second phase includes construction of two joined buildings in the current Farmers Market lot — one mixed use facing South Street, one with 68+ apartments on Elm.

### To begin as early as Oct. 1

Mayor Collins said the City plans to go before the Planning Board in July.

Development Director Jeff Flagg told The Chronicle, "The goal is to begin construction on Phase I in early fall, around October 1.'

He said, "I believe the hope would be to open for tenants sometime over the summer of 2023. "Perhaps Phase II would be a year behind."

### Still many public questions

Mayor Collins planned to close the meeting and talk individually with members of the public - but one audience member called out, "Freeze!"

She said, "I wouldn't mind a few question, to hear what people are thinking." Thus followed a public Q&A.

Deborah Liddle asked: "Why jam so much into one small area of South Street, when you could go to Cooper Street, or the Shirt Factory, that part of town where there are undeveloped buildings?"

Told that DRI funds are earmarked by he state for South Street only, Ms. Liddl persisted, "Don't let them trap you into ruining your city.

"Don't trap us into putting everything into the same pot, a bouillabaisse instead of a nice, spread-out meal."

Several people questioned the lack of on-site or nearby parking for the planned Market Center.

Maureen Monahan-Chase noted that she and other caterers and restaurants typically purchase "\$3- to \$500 worth of produce — which we couldn't do without close parking."

Others added that senior citizens, and families with young children, need easy parking access.

More comments:

One said, "I question, were the farmers even consulted on this?"

Dan Hazewski said of the City's cur-rent parking garages, "I can't even tell which ones are open to the public."

Diane Collins described these as "exciting plans," but also was "alarmed," she said, "at not a word mentioned about the climate crisis" including (paraphrased) expectations of harsher weather, blackouts and even climate-related disaster

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planning, and, regarding parking, the prohibitive cost of car ownership at all in the future.

Another, self described as a "walker and bicycler" said, "I like the idea of more people living downtown. The two biggest employers here are Finch and the Hospital. Employees may self-select not to have a car and live here. There has to be a campaign for that."

### Parking meeting in Fall

Mr. Collins said he plans to hold another round of public meetings in early fall, reporting results of a parking study and the City's federal grant application to fund a transportation hub, potentially on Elm Street.

Dr. Flagg noted that the state's \$10 million was specifically to support eight designated projects in the downtown and on South Street. "Other projects are planned

in other parts of the City," he said. Architect Mr. Townsend said the planned buildings are "state of the art," environmentally speaking.

sor Circles is the organization responsible for resettling the Afghan refugees who were evacuated from Afghanistan last August. **Afghan families are given the option of where they wanted to resettle.** Most choose areas where there are already other Afghan refugees, and where services such as mosques, halal grocery stores, and people speaking their native language have already settled. Sadly, after months of waiting, **our community has not been chosen.** 

In March the war in Ukraine resulted in a flood of refugees escaping the fighting. As of now, about 8 million of them are displaced outside Ukraine.

President Biden offered to resettle 100,000 refugees in the U.S. through Sponsor Circles, and **we were just informed that a Ukrainian family will be sent to resettle here** with us.

We are excited to welcome them here, and we know our community will help to make them feel welcome as well.

The support required for Ukranians is somewhat different than that for Afghans. For instance, we are required to be prepared to support them for up to 2 years if they choose to stay that long and still need financial support.

For those of you who donated to the Adirondack Welcome Circle because you felt you wanted to support Afghan refugees, we fully understand your disappointment. # Says GF City Hall favors business, 'kicks pedestrians to curb'

The Glens Falls City Council issued encroachment permits to downtown businesses, taking space from pedestrian walkways. Hence, downtown pedestrian sidewalks are cluttered with tables, chairs, potted plants, barriers and signs and pedestrians are kicked to the curb.

The costly red brick "beauty strips" are not sidewalks. "Beauty strips" are obstructed with light posts, tree/ flower plots, street signs benches and hydrants. Great esthetically, but not engineered for pedestrian traffic.

Traffic on sidewalks has increased as apartment complexes like 14 Hudson, the Mill and Realize were constructed. South Street-proposed projects will add more apartments and pedestrians to the downtown walkways.

These projects do not include sidewalk expansions.

Bicycles, scooters, skate boards and similar vehicles add congestion to the shrinking downtown sidewalks. Heavy automobile traffic and the absence of separate bike lanes push these vehicles onto sidewalks.

You would not move tables and chairs onto downtown streets without an alternative route for cars and trucks. Yet tables, chairs, signs, barriers and even flower pots, are allowed on sidewalks without adding alternative safe, smooth and straight routes for foot traffic.

Providing pedestrian (and bike trail) infrastructure is a primary responsibility of City government. It must be met before ceding public sidewalks to private businesses.

City Hall fails its responsibility here. It isn't asking much to expect straight 3-foot-wide concrete sidewalks for pedestrians. They too are critical for the business functions and for access to the newly declared Arts District.

Pedestrians should not be pushed to the curb. If you agree the city should provide safe downtown sidewalks, please register your concern on the Glens Falls web page daily.

City Hall should provide infrastructure for the wants of businesses AND the needs of citizens. It is indeed poor government to meet business wants at the expense of citizen needs.

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





# **Owl prowl follow-up**

The Lake George Land Conservancy led an "Owl Prowl" on April 30. Alan Belford, who led it, provided a followup at *The Chronicle's* request. (Sorry it took so long for us to publish it)

"We heard 2 Barred Owls — one with the entire group and then another when about half of us were chatting in the parking area after we were back. The American Bittern was probably the highlight calling back and forth with my recording.

While we were doing that, we were also surrounded by a mesmerizing and deafening chorus of spring peepers which was accented by singing Song Sparrows and Swamp Sparrows.

At the same time we watched a beaver ply its trade. We also heard an odd vocalization which may have been a mammal — perhaps a red fox, but I can't say for certain. The fun thing is that you always hear odd things when you are out in the dark.

We also heard a few other songbirds when we first started — species like Redwinged Blackbird, Pine Siskin, Yellowrumped Warbler, and American Robin."

"Alan Belford has spent much of his life

outdoors exploring and learning about wildlife — particularly birds..." said a biography from the Land Conservancy. "He is a licensed guide in New York State, he has traveled widely both domestically and internationally, and he is also a published travel writer and photographer - focusing on outdoor and nature writing.
