The Waterhouse and 9 North Wood Fired Pizza & Pub adjacent to Bend of the River Golf Course all having closed.



Queensbury High School will send two seniors, Brigid Duffy and Tyler Spaulding, to service academies — where both will also compete as Division I athletes.

Brigid will attend the United States Military Academy at West Point and play soccer and lacrosse.

Tyler will play baseball at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs.

Both Tyler and Brigid said they intend to pursue military careers beyond their five years of required ser-

"I really do want to serve my country,"

Brigid told The Chronicle. "And then on top of that, I'll be able to play sports in college.'

Tyler said he is considering a degree in aeronautical engineering or military and strategic studies. Brigid is leaning

towards civil engineering.

They were nominated for the academies by Congresswoman Elise Stefanik.

While the school year is just ending, their summer training camps are already nearly here. Brigid departs in a week.

Tyler will miss his high school graduation, having departed for boot camp. He received his diploma early, at Queensbury's Senior Awards Night.

"I think what we're going to be doing is really exciting. So being able to do it sooner, and not having to wait is good," Tyler said.

What is summer training? "Like very traditional boot camp," Tyler said. "It's learning how to shoot, learning how to march, learning how to salute, just introduction to the military.'

"And then a lot of like, physical activity things," said Brigid.

"Everyone, they're like, oh, good luck. It's gonna be so hard," Tyler said. "I'm

more excited than nervous. I think it'll be Ever the athlete, Brigid said, "I'm ex-

cited for the competitive aspect of it."

While they're both looking forward to what's next, they have fond memories of their Queensbury athletic careers.

Brigid looks back on her senior year soccer sectional title. "We hadn't ever [won sectionals]. So that was really cool," she said. "And it was such a close game and so emotional.'

Tyler referenced a baseball game from his freshman year as a Spartan. "We lost to Ballston Spa at St. Rose, I think was a sectional of semifinal game.

That was a cool game because that was a really good team. And we had a lot of seniors that I looked up to. But just to be on that field and share the field with a lot of those guys was cool."



The second of 12 children, Mary started her life in Pittsfield, MA to Italian immigrant parents Alberico and Carmela.

She grew up in the hamlet of Fenimore. She and her siblings would walk over the Hudson Falls bridge to and from school daily. On cold days, they would stop half-

way to warm up at a commercial building. Her Fenimore friends include the Binetti's, Rosati's, Luciano's, the Abodeely Family, and her neighbor, Gerard.



LG Village: 1st public dissolution meeting

The Lake George Village Board's first public informational meeting concerning the scheduled vote on possible dissolution of the village is Monday, June 27 at **6 p.m.**, in the Lake George Town Hall.

Representatives from LaBerge Group, hired as consultants by the Town and Village Boards, will explain the scope of the planned work, timetable, State laws and other pertinent facts of the study.

Their work is expected to take place over the next two months and be followed by additional public meetings.

The vote is scheduled for **Tuesday**, **September 13**, from noon-9 p.m.

The consultants will prepare a fact sheet, create a website with updates and answer questions concerning the study and impact of dissolution upon the affected taxpayers.

'Bubblers' meeting **Wednesday in Horicon**

The Horicon Town Board will hold an informational meeting about De-Icers also known as "Bubblers" — on Wednesday, June 29, at 7 p.m. in the Town Hall.

The subject is also expected to be on the agenda of the Town's regular meetings in July and August.

Bubblers or de-icers are used to agitate or warm the water around a dock to protect it from ice forming in the winter.

Cindy Mead of Brant Lake sent notice of the meetings and added, "Our aim is not to 'ban' bubblers, but to enact some sort of guidelines regarding size of open water allowed and safety precautions."

In a letter to the Chronicle this winter, January, Cindy Mead said her daughter's dog died in open water she believed was caused by a bubbler system.

She said in the letter, "New York State has regulations on everything we do," yet, she learned, "there are no guidelines regulating personal ice eaters/bubbler systems on our lakes?"

I agree with the new policy of The International **Swimming Federation** (FINA) — passed with 71.5% approval of its Extraordinary General Congress. CNN says it stipulates "that male-to-female transgender athletes will only be eligible to compete in the women's categories in FINA competitions if they transition before the age of 12 or before they reach stage two on the puberty Tanner Scale.'

I thought it was unfair and absurd that Lia Thomas — who swam as a male two years ago — now as a woman so dominated women's college swimming, breaking records, winning the NCAA championship.

Talking jobs: EDC speaker on the bad news (& some hope)

"Today I'll be largely the bearer of bad news," Dr. Rachel Sederberg told the Warren County Economic Development Corporation's annual luncheon last Friday at the Great Escape Lodge.

Dr. Sederberg's topic was "The Demographic Drought," or "Bridging the Gap in ouor Labor Force."

The research manager with the consulting firm Emsi Burning Glass in Boston brought sobering data to the gathering of business leaders, elected officials and community members.

"It's not just a perfect storm, it's a hurricane, earthquake, and tornado all rolled into one," Dr. Sederberg said.

Low birth rates, slowed immigration, Baby Boomers retiring — these all contribute to what she deems the future labor crisis. "You can't employ what you don't have," she said, "and this train is going to keep coming at us."

Cut to the conclusion: "Disengaged not unemployed is the problem," Dr. Sederberg said. Millions of males, ages 16 to 19, are not looking for work. 2.6 million people retired during Covid.

"There are 3.5 million disengaged

"There are 3.5 million disengaged people, not consciously looking, but on the sidelines. But if the right thing came around, they'd jump."

around, they'd jump."

She asked," "How do we reenergize them?"

"We need to go find them. We need to get our message out to the people who are out of the labor force. That's where the missing worker is."

Baby boom set the stage

"We need to know where we are, so we can make progress," Dr. Sederberg said.

Quoting and paraphrasing from her

Baby boomers, who have long exerted "massive power" over the social and economic landscape, were already aging out of the workforce, beginning around 2002 "well before Covid."

The baby boom saw rising birth rates,

a "huge" leap in the number of women in the work force, and increased college enrollment. It drove "massive" and unprecedented gains in household wealth.

"In February 2020 we had record low unemployment. Then our world turned upside down."

She cited 7 million job openings, with 5.9 people actively looking for work — "and millennials can't make up for that."

Also on the decline, since before Covid:

the number of prime-age working men.

More people 55 and older were already choosing to work part time, "because they wanted to, they had the savings and they could."

Where we're at now

Since Covid: "Labor force participation is not improving. About 3 million people dropped out of the work force, with no intention of returning."

Almost a million dropped out of the workforce to start their own businesses.

Seven million of today's 11.4 million job openings are meant for those without a college degree — and those are the ones largely going unfilled, Dr. Sederberg said — "a huge 7 million job problem."

An epidemic of opioid addiction and overdoses has depleted the youth male work force. More than 100,000 "prime age working men" died of opioid overdoses last year, she said.

Meanwhile, there's a "birth dearth" — U.S. birth rate is 1.6 children per woman,

below "the replenishment rate" of 2.1.

By 2034, "older adults will outnumber children — for the first time ever in this country," Dr. Sederberg said.

She asks, with dependent children and seniors outnumbering those of working age, who will support them? c

Can't we use robots, she asked?

"Fun fact," Dr. Sederberg answered herself, even generating a laugh, "To build and run robots requires 12 million more jobs than now.'

Meanwhile, "If you can't get workers from within, you get them from outside," which is also not happening. "We are essentially missing 2 million immigrants — 638,000 immigrants in 2021, versus as many as 1,063,000 in pre-Covid years.

Beyond manual labor in agriculture and elsewhere, "Health care relies on foreign workers," she said.

She said one in four U.S. medical doctors and health aides and one in five nurses are typically foreign born.

A skewed bit of hope: With Covid stimulus payments over, "How are people paying for things if they're not working?

Dr. Sederberg said credit card debt is up. Household savings are down. People are selling assets. That's not sustainable."

"I'm not sure I should say 'Thank you'," deadpanned Kathy Muncil, CEO of Fort William Henry, after the talk, to introduce the next speaker.

LG: Adirondack Wine & Food **Festival back** — full barrel

The Adirondack Wine and Food Festival is back in Lake George at the Festival Commons at Charles R. Wood Park this weekend, Saturday and Sunday, June 25

It's their first time pouring since 2019 said Sasha Pardy. She is co-owner with her husband, Mike, of Adirondack Winery, and founder-organizer of the Fest.

They sold tickets then cancelled in 2020, due to Covid, and outright didn't run the festival last year.

This year, the Festival Commons will be full barrel ahead, Ms. Pardy said in an email interview. "We've got the 120 vendors we promised" to ticket holders.

"While many vendors have been struggling with staffing issues like the rest of us, so some had to bow out, we had no problem filling our spaces!"

Ms. Pardy says small "mom and pop" hand-crafted producers need festivals like this "to introduce people to their products, to get their brand out there."

Meanwhile, "Ticket sales are ahead of our goals, all is looking bright!" she adds.

The goal is 4,000 visitors each day. "We have sold out Saturday in the past, and it looks like that is possible again,' Ms. Pardy. "Sunday is usually much

Again this year, they've partnered with the non-profit Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Southern Adirondacks.

"In 2019 they raised \$15K from this event. In 2022, they're already on track for more," Ms. Pardy said. "They supply us with over 100 volunteer shifts over the course of the weekend," she adds. "We couldn't do it without them!"

Ms. Pardy touts "the opportunity to try so many different wines, craft beverages and foods...that you would never pick up and try at a grocery store or have the opportunity to try at a restaurant.'

New this year, she said, "We've even got a great range of non-alcoholic beverages.

From fruit-infused wines, to award winning dry red wines, to sparkling rose cider, dry mead and unique beers; to biscotti, jerky, pickled vegetables, cheeses, jams, salsa, and more!

Adk. Theatre Fest: Lovely, not so delicate, this 'Chinese Lady'

Chronicle Managing Editor Cathy **DeDe writes:** Sami Ma, as Afong Moy in Adirondack Theatre Festival's first show of its 28th season, made me think of a China doll in a music box — if it's okay to say that. She is luminous, frail, delicate, hard edged in the prettiest way.

Ms. Ma represents on stage — in her words, from Lloyd Suh's self-conscious, sometimes poetic, even funny script, "represents" — the real-life Afong Moy, who was 14 years old when she was brought to America to be put on display

as the first Chinese woman in the U.S.

The setting is diorama-like: A little curtained stage representing her dis-play "case." Her chopsticks, her tea ceremony, and especially her bound feet were objects of fascination. Along Moy met President Andrew Jackson, toured the country in a sort of triumph, but finally she was reduced to a gawkers' attraction for no less than P.T. Barnum.

We watch her and her translator/ protector Atung, played by Whit K. Lee, weather changes wrought by time and too-long under an unkind American gaze in a country that is, finally, not so kind to them or their people.

Afong Moy with bright smile and cheeky spirit, believes that her presence can help foster peace and understanding of two countries. Well. It doesn't play out quite like that.

We know some of the horrors of the Chinese experience in America. She reminds us of more. The Gold Rush, building the Transcontinental Rail-

road, the Chinese Exclusion Act.

I thought I knew what was coming - this is a show that starts largely like a history lesson. I was unprepared for its beauty, Mr. Lee's choreographically

stunning performance, both actors' sharp yet gentle interpretations.

What transcends the specifics of a story about race? When the playwright, actors, director (Shannon Tyo) encourage us to consider bigger questions. How do we, any of us, look at each other? What do we see? Can we understand?

I was quite moved.





work at UpRiver Cafe at night.

Not this year. "If we had brought in foreign kids, they would have left," said Mrs. Merlino, "because they wouldn't have been able to find a second job in Lake Luzerne at night.

Mrs. Merlino would love to see "a trolley that [comes] down into Lake Luzerne and brought these kids into Lake George to work the second job."

She thinks all local businesses would benefit, listing horseback riding, whitewater rafting, Huttopia campground, the rodeo, and Revolution Rail rail biking.

Mrs. Merlino said guests likewise miss UpRiver Cafe — "it was so well thought

UpRiver's owners, Chef Andrew Van Bourgondien and his wife Betsy Brandt, tried for several years without success to find a buyer for the restaurant. They closed UpRiver in 2020; the building was converted to a residence.

At nearby Waterhouse Restaurant, Dan Waterhouse said, "I'm out, thank God." He said, "I'm 55. And it's really a young guy's game."

Mr. Waterhouse said he sold the property to an LLC which is seeking to sell it again, packaged with the trailer park next door. He does not expect them to reopen it as a restaurant.

Staffing challenges became too much for him, Mr. Waterhouse said. "When you have to pay minimum wage of 15 bucks and you've got to pay a chef \$20? Is he going to stay for 20 bucks?"

"That's the real problem...guys that have skill and that your reputation is based on, what do you have to pay them if you're paying the dishwasher \$15 that you have to monitor all the time.

"Between that and the big chains are offering big bonuses to steal away employees... I couldn't do it myself anymore."

Mr. Waterhouse said of Lake Luzerne, "It's hard to make money 12 months a year here. It's easy to make money three months.

"I still think it's a great place to be," he said. "I think a restaurant would do great right now, because the area is full of those Airbnbs...people are in town spending money, but when you don't have the help to accommodate, it makes it very difficult.'

Incidentally, last year Mr. Waterhouse ran against long-time incumbent town supervisor Gene Merlino — Linda's hus band — in a heated race Mr. Merlino won.

Nettle Meadow's new tasting room/eatery

On an up-note, Nettle Meadow Cheese has reopened the long dormant classic log Hitching Post restaurant, as its cheesemaking facility with tasting room, bar and cafe, in Lake Vanare, a few miles up Route 9N from downtown Lake Luzerne.

Nettle Meadow co-owner Sheila Flanagan said, "We're very lucky because we have the cheese plant as well. So if the restaurant has a terrible week, and the cheese plant has a great wholesale cheese week, then we're balanced out."

York's Department of Environmental Conservation, warned in a video of extreme conditions.

"Last year," he said in the video, "we had about 730,000 acres of defoliation that was mapped. This year, based on the reports we're getting from the public, and egg mass surveys that we completed over the winter, we're expecting this year to be another big year of defoliation."

The good news, said Mr. Cole in the video, is that "outbreaks usually only last two to three years, so we don't treat regularly because the outbreak will end on its own." He said "we can go 10 to 15 years in between" outbreaks.

"Spongy moth caterpillars eat young, tender leaves in the spring," DEC said.

"Deciduous trees (trees that lose their leaves each fall) can regrow a new set of leaves by July and can usually withstand 2-3 successive years of defoliation with-

But "defoliation does reduce the vigor and resistance of the tree, and it becomes more susceptible to pests and diseases," says the DEC. "In the short-term, the tree can use sugars stored in its roots." But "after multiple years or damage from

Former gypsy moth now called spongy to end use of insult

The insects formerly known as Gypsy Moths are now called Spongy Moths. The change is the first action of the Common Names Project, a new initiative of the Entomological Society of America, zoologists who study insects.

The group determined that "gypsy" is a derogatory word used in reference to Romani people — traditionally nomadic people of Romania, Ukraine, Spain and other European countries.

It said, "While the use of an ethnic slur is enough reason to stop using a common name, the former common name was doubly inappropriate in that it linked to a group of people who have been treated as pests and the targets of genocide with an invasive pest insect that remains targeted for population

other pests, these energy reserves are depleted. This can cause decline and death of the tree.'

Ms. Kubik says, "The main problem with spongy moths is their sheer numbers. A single egg mass can have upcontrol and eradication, all of which combined to have lasting dehumanizing effects for Romani people."

In general, the Society said, "Problematic names perpetuate harm against people of various ethnicities and races, create an entomological and cultural environment that is unwelcoming and non-inclusive, disrupt communication and outreach, and counteract the very purpose of common names."

Potential issues the Society listed:

· Names that contain derogative

• Names for invasive species with in-

appropriate geographic references Names that inappropriately disregard what the insect might be called by native communities.

tree care in relation to the outbreak. "When populations are low or when you have just a few trees you want to protect, spongy moth caterpillars and adults can be killed by squishing them.

"Egg masses can be destroyed by scraping them off trees or other structures and dropping them in a container of detergent."

Prior to their summertime spread, "in late April, sticky/barrier bands may be placed around the tree's trunk to catch caterpillars when they hatch and crawl. These bands can be bought or made at home using common household materi-

But DEC warns, "if you choose to use a barrier band, please check it often in case unintended wildlife pass through, and replace as necessary after rain events."

Insecticide use is their final suggestion. "If you are considering spraying, start planning in fall or winter as many of these services book up early. Various insecticides for spongy moths are available at garden centers."

But Ms. Kubik notes risks. "Insecticides used for spongy moths are usually non-selective and will kill any insect that comes into contact with them, be it a spongy moth or a monarch butterfly or anything else."

She said they "can impact many beneficial native insects" and that "a known impact of spongy moth-targeted insecticide" resulted in "killing bees in significant numbers.

"Insecticides should be used only

when necessary and very carefully," Ms. Kubik urged. She said, "follow ALL pesticide label instructions."

Mr. Cole said in the DEC video that the agency is combating the spongy moth in some places. "This year, we decided because last year was such a heavy defoliation year, that we couldn't risk being defoliated again...

"The aerial treatment that DEC is conduct-

ing this year is...on state forest land and state parks. Those areas were chosen because they contain high value ecosystems where rare, threatened or endangered animals and plants live and need that ecosystem to survive....."

Spongy moth is an invasive species, says the Cornell College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, because it is "non-native" and has "the ability to cause harm to the environment, economy, and/or human health," explained Ms. Kubik. She said invasives "usually have...high reproductive rates and a lack of natural enemies that allows them to act invasively."


