The Harvest Restaurant celebrated its 50th anniversary on Tuesday.

As is their style, Phil and Linda Hart didn't make a big fuss about it, although they did come up from their home in Florida for the occasion.

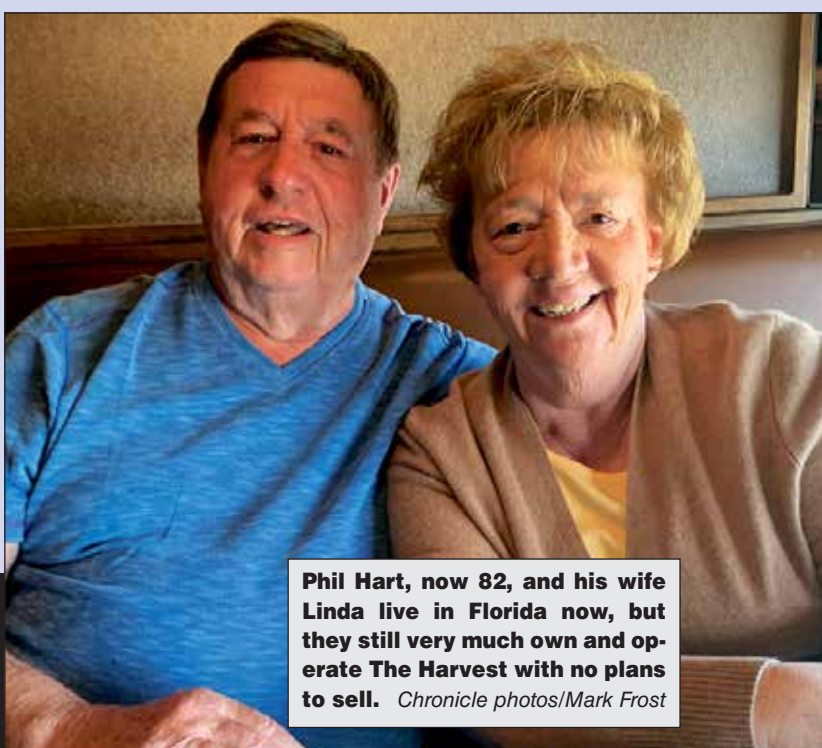
"We're not pushing for recognition," Mr. Hart said. "We don't advertise. We just do our job, do what do every day for the last 50 years."

His wife says, "Phil laid a big footprint and we all follow it."

The Harts keep an apartment in Glens Falls, but basically run the business — and keep a tight ship — from afar.

"We have all the set-up in Florida — cameras, computers," says Mrs. Hart, who





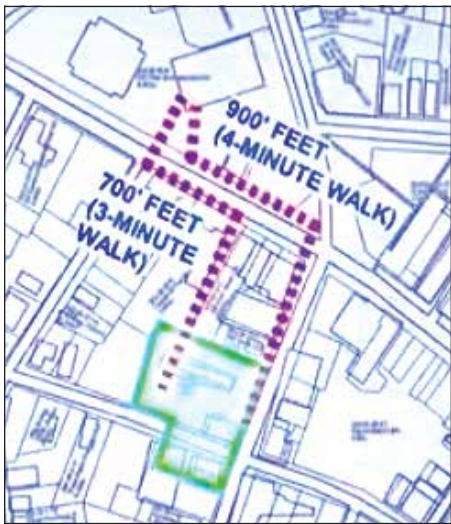

Bonacio South St. apts. seeks variance to park at Travelers garage; Board receptive

Sonny Bonacio's two-phase South and Elm Street project — including 69 apartments in the planned Farmers Market Pavilion building — came before the Glens Falls Planning Board on July 5 for a preliminary “sketch plan review.”

The plan is for 87 total apartments. Phase one has 18 in three buildings he'll renovate — the former Sandy's Clam Bar at 41 South Street, the old Hotshots Bar at 45 South, and the so-called incubator building at 36 Elm Street.

Phase two has the 69 apartments in the two buildings that will go up where the Farmers Market operates now.

On site, Bonacio/SpringCity plans to have 44 parking spaces behind the Phase Two apartment building facing Elm Street. Two of those are for accessible parking, 11 will be for commercial customers, and 21 will be for residents.

75 spaces in Travelers garage
To meet parking-per-unit regulations, the developers said they have an arrangement for 75 spaces in the 333 Monument parking garage, familiarly known as the Travelers building, on Glen Street.

They seek a variance because off-site “adjacent parking” typically must be within 300 feet of the building.

The Travelers garage is 900 feet by sidewalk — “a four-minute walk,” said Libby Coreno, general counsel for Bonacio Construction/Spring City — or 700 feet, via the alley between the McPhillips Building and the Church of the Messiah Parish house and McPhillips' parking lot.

The Planning Board, who can issue the variance, independent of zoning or other board, seemed amenable.

“You are not looking for a variance on the number of spaces,” Ethan Hall said, reiterating a point made by Ms. Coreno, “but only on the distance, from 300 to 700 feet.”

She said on-site parking would have drop-off zones to unload groceries or receive Uber /Door Dash-style deliveries.

“The focus is on urban living, single car ownership in favor of delivery services,” Ms. Coreno said. “Our goal and hope is the people who reside in these units will work downtown and be able to walk to work most of the time.”

Mr. Hall said, “It's not that far away... The younger people we envision living there could be more of a walking type of crowd.”

Dan Bruno, who chaired the meeting, spoke with *The Chronicle* a few days later. As of June 30, he retired after 20 years

chairing the Planning Board, but he said he agreed to step in at this meeting in order to meet quorum. Mr. Hall is expected to succeed him as chair.

then Hart's and is now Talk of the Town, on Hudson Avenue.

"I worked for him for 9 1/2 years before I came here. That's how I learned the business. It started out we were gonna do this together. Then my father said he didn't want to do it."

Mr. Hart went ahead anyway. In 1972 he bought a lot from Merwyn Pasco on the corner of Bay and Cronin Roads in Queensbury for \$17,000, "because that was what I could afford."

"Then I bought another lot in the back," and a third and fourth. "I bought the lots all around except for the power equipment business" that existed just south.

Why the name The Harvest? It's short for Hart Invest, Mr. Hart explains.

"And we're still vesting."

"I just continued the menu pretty much," he says. "Changed the sauce a little bit and the dough a little bit. Made them both a little spicier and a little sweeter."

Mrs. Hart recalls early days when Mr. Hart would stay all night making dough. He says of the long hours building the business, "You don't think about it. You just do it."

In the kitchen, "we have a pizza side and a short order side," says Mrs. Hart, and "we cross-train all our staff" to do multiple jobs.

"The kitchen is what keeps the res-



taurant successful," Mr. Hart says. "The consistency."

The Harvest's managers are Jaime Hobbs and Kelly Fuller, who are also sisters. They've been here for 26 and 22 years respectively.

"We couldn't have better managers," says Mrs. Hart.

Of the staff, "we've got people that have been here 35 years," she says. And customers that go back that long and farther.

Rachael Ray a loyal lifelong customer; a pizza named for her

Rachael Ray, the Lake George High graduate who achieved national stardom through her syndicated TV talk show, her magazine, books, pet food and other involvements, is a lifelong customer of The Harvest, who has touted it to her viewers.

"Her and her husband John [Cusimano] — they always sit at the bar, wearing baseball caps, inconspicuous," says Harvest owner Phil Hart.

"I've known her [he puts his hand down low] — I know the whole family. Her father Jim, Elsa the mom. He used to bring Rachael in as a child."

Ms. Ray has a standard order.

"Her pizza (which is now a menu item) — green peppers, onions, hot cherry peppers. Wings. Toss salad with house dressing," says manager Jaime Hobbs, who frequently serves Rachael at the bar.

Ms. Ray feted Jaime on her TV show, bestowing \$14,000 worth of gifts.

Ms. Hobbs said she knows the amount because she had to pay taxes on it the next year. — Mark Frost

They have about 30 employees. "We have huge payroll and they're worth every nickel," Mrs. Hart says. "They all have pride and they're loyal and they never say no to come in for work."

Manager Jamie calls it "a great gig. We have great customers, great bosses, great staff."

The Harvest operates seven days a week, closing only for Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas — and a week in September, "to give the staff a little time off," says Mrs. Hart, as well as make time for building maintenance and construction.

"John Cifone is our wingman," she says. His construction firm has done all their expansions over the years. The Cifones and Harts are close friends.

Mr. Hart is big on long-term relationships and buying local. He mentions now vanished local mainstays like Dobert's Dairy, Double-A Provisions and Leland Paper, as well as long-standing ongoing ones like Cifone and Mahoney Alarms.

The Harvest thrived during Covid — strictly on take-out — although Mrs. Hart notes that because of travel curbs, "we couldn't come for 17 months."

Despite his age of 82, Mr. Hart says they have no interest in selling.

"We have been approached many times, honest to God truth. The rumor spreads a lot," without basis, he said.

Mrs. Hart says in terms of managing staff, she's done "a lot of switching up from what I did 10 years ago." She says that today "they work when they want to," and that she's almost always says yes when she's asked for time off, but that she tell them "you gotta pay me back sometimes when I need to cover for someone."

Mrs. Hart says many servers are single mothers, and she understands their circumstances can be challenging.

Mr. Hart says he urges young people, "You should have a goal. What do you want out of life? Do you want a house? What's your goal?"



Presidential placemat a Harvest Restaurant tradition for 47 years, ending in controversy

A paper placemat showing the current President and all his predecessors was as much a tradition at The Harvest Restaurant as pizza and New York Yankees memorabilia. They were so popular that the Harts shared them with teachers for their students. The tradition ended in an onslaught of argument and accusation, typical of the times. Some customers thought the Harts refused to update the placemat after Joe Biden's election as President. But the Harts explained that the supplier Hoffmaster "merged with another firm and stopped making them." That left President Donald Trump in the featured spot as the last one. "Do you know how many fights that has started?" the Harts ask. Some customers tore out the Trump image. Manager Jaime Hobbs said a woman "from Massachusetts was so drunk at the bar one night" that she bit out Trump's face.

Waterslide World ‘has a buyer’; town seeks housing complexes there & at old Ramada

Three sets of regulations enacted in the Town of Lake George over the last several years are paving the way for what may be a new wave of development, especially in the commercial corridor along Route 9. This includes a potential high-impact multi-use development on the former Water Slide World property, which “has a buyer,” Town Supervisor Dennis Dickinson told *The Chronicle* on Monday. Separately, developer and electrical contractor Joe Gross has proposed a 99-unit apartment complex with commercial space at his former Ramada Inn and some surrounding properties. The Water Slide World property could be a mixed-use development, potentially with what Mr. Dickinson described as “60 high-end apartments,” for year-round or long term monthly rentals. “It would be the largest project Lake George has seen, maybe ever,” said Dan Barusch, the town Planning and Zoning Director. The new zoning laws ease regulations on existing tourist accommodations looking to upgrade; allows greater flexibility in configuring large-scale, integrated

Planned Unit Development or PUDs; and limit short term rentals such as AirBnB. Mr. Dickinson said the Town “tweaked” its zoning laws to encourage existing motels or multi unit cottage colonies to upgrade their facilities rather than subdivide for private homes, so long as they can upgrade stormwater and sewer or septic systems — “all the environmental bases,” he said. The PUD regulations double density limitations in the targeted Route 9 corridor “TCA zone” — Tourist Commercial Accommodations, Mr. Barusch said. Such development, meeting environmental requirements, is pre-approved by the Adirondack Park Agency. “So,” Mr. Barusch says, “we are telling people to come in and develop mixed use properties in a smart growth format.” The aim, says Mr. Dickinson: “To help aging properties to upgrade without subdividing, to maintain tourist accommodations and to keep this as a resort community.” He points to Bolton, which has become “more of a summer bedroom community,” as what Lake George hopes to avoid. “We want people to come here, drop their bags in the unit and go to the Great Escape, out on the boats, to dinner, then go back the next day and do something else.” Mr. Barusch said, “Existing law did not give opportunities to existing properties to redevelop. It was leading to purchasing and conversion to residential homes and subdivisions. We are trying to mitigate that, allowing older, primarily non-compliant properties to redevelop with the same density they had.” “Specific to new tourist accommodations,” he said, “we changed the formula” to allow, for example, multi-level development, by easing density regulations. “This is intended to save or ameliorate the woes of aging tourist accommodations, to preserve the hotel and motel stock,” while also “fending off the sheer volume of short term rentals.” Mr. Barusch calls Lake George’s regulation of short term rentals “very robust” and “extremely successful,” in limiting properties to commercial zones, restricting them from residential areas. He said the goal is “equity,” for lodging endeavors that are essentially commercial but avoid regulations required of hotels and motels. “There are also issues at the local level of maintaining housing stock, quality of life,” Mr. Barusch added. “Converting homes to short term rentals leaves dark areas. We lose heads in schools, with few-

er young families.” “We want to drive up housing and rental stock, to enhance the community character, and really make this a year-round community. 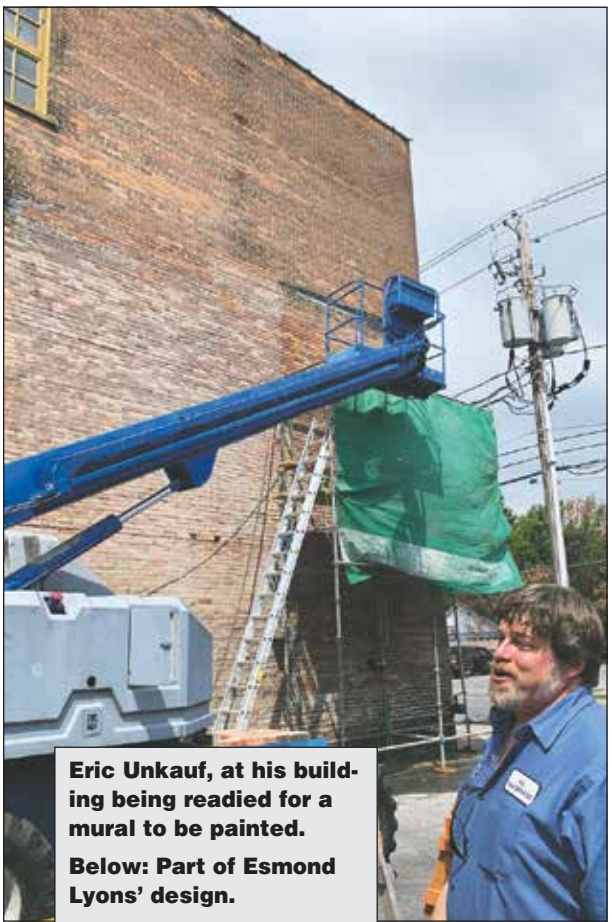

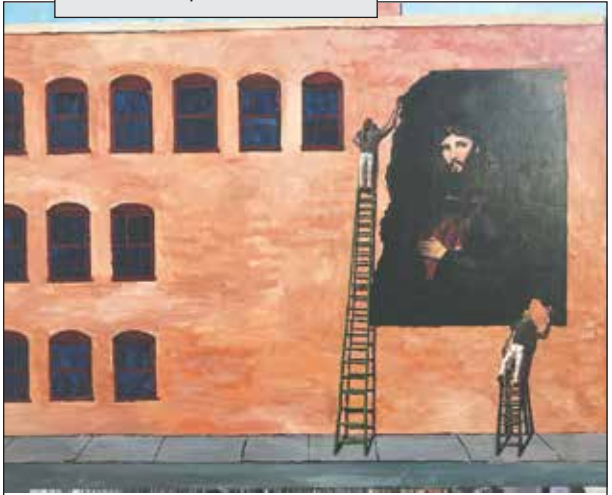


Vinny Potter isn't just doing the repair and prep, he's enthused about the bricks he's finding.

Moreau Biochar battle, meeting Monday 7/18

A tense fight over the proposed Saratoga Biochar facility rages on in Moreau. The next town Planning Board meeting is Monday, July 18, at 7 p.m.

The minutes say there will be “discussion and review of the resolution prepared by the Town’s Attorney Karla Buettner” for Saratoga Biochar Solutions.

Board member Ann Purdue, Esq., told *The Chronicle* “I believe the draft is going to be a proposed authorization of, or approval of, the site plan.”

The facility, which would be located in the Moreau industrial park, would truck in “biosolids” and heat them up with “pyrolysis” to create “a carbon fertilizer.”

Ms. Purdue said biosolids are “basically dewatered sewage.”

Saratoga Biochar CEO Ray Apy said they are “what comes out of a wastewater treatment plant, not what goes into it.”

Some Moreau residents have expressed concerns over the environmental safety of the project.

Mr. Apy is adamant that the facility has been thoroughly vetted and is safe.

He also downplayed the number of concerned residents. He said, “Moreau has got about 15,000 residents, and I think somewhere under 200, probably about 150 have gone as far as to sign a petition and less than 25 have been outspoken.”

Ms. Purdue is just as adamant that the project needs more evaluation.

But at the June 20 Planning Board meeting, her motion to start the process to hire an independent consultant did not even receive a second.

Ms. Purdue said she was surprised. “I do think that an independent review, advice from a consultant on what the impacts of this project might be and what the risks are, is a prudent course to take,” she said.

The Chronicle has made multiple

calls to Karla Buettner, attorney for the Moreau Planning Board, all unreturned. Ms. Purdue was the only Planning Board member who responded to *The Chronicle’s* inquiries.

Mr. Apy said he believes the Board’s time to bring in an outside consultant “passed quite some time ago.”

He said the planning board “...did the state environmental quality review work themselves. They chose to be lead agency, that’s their decision.”

Ms. Purdue, an attorney, says the Planning Board “can still rescind their SEQR negative declaration, they can still seek an independent review of the matters relative to the environmental impacts of the project.”

Ms. Purdue said the technology is “interesting” but that it is unproven, particularly in terms of “PFAS,” which she called the “forever chemical.” (PFAS are Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances.)

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency’s website says, “Scientific studies have shown that exposure to some PFAS in the environment may be linked to harmful health effects in humans and animals.”

When asked, Mr. Apy said, “PFAS is typically resident within any biosolids, Please turn to page 14

GF seeks grant so East Field can install seats & video board

East Field Stadium in Glens Falls is giving a demolished baseball stadium in New Jersey a second lease on life. A new scoreboard, video board and 1,500 stadium seats were all acquired in the spring of 2019 from the former Riverfront Stadium in Newark, New Jersey by Glens Falls Dragons owner Ben Bernard. He said another team owner in the Perfect Game Collegiate Baseball League, the league the Dragons compete in, tipped him off to the opportunity. "I received a phone call about the possibility of some seats being sold down in Newark," Mr. Bernard said. He traveled to Newark to see the seats in person, but there was still one big variable, the price tag. "The project manager said 'how many do you want?', so I said it depends on the price," said Mr. Bernard. "The project manager said 'how does \$10 a piece sound?' and it sounded good." Mr. Bernard said that a few weeks lat-

er, he and a crew from Rozell Industries came down to help remove the seats, place them in tractor-trailers, and drive them back to Glens Falls. Then the project manager offered the scoreboard and video board, which presented some challenges. "The scoreboard was 60 feet in the air, so we had a company from the area come down and look at it and they said they could do it" Mr. Bernard says. The scoreboard has been installed at East Field, replacing the scoreboard that dated from the mid-1990s. Mr. Bernard also acquired Riverfront Stadium's LED video board that was installed after its original LED video board was damaged in Hurricane Sandy. The video board is at East Field but has not yet been installed. Once installed, the 16mm LED board will stand 12.6 feet high and 29 feet long. Meanwhile, Mr. Bernard says they plan to install the seats from the New Jersey stadium at East Field to replace the wooden bleachers that date from 1980 and are in an advanced state of age. In some spots, especially the outfield, the seats are a little daunting. The replacement seats are being stored in storage containers at Rozell's on Queensbury Avenue. Mr. Bernard said they hope the improvements will help draw more fans. Right now the Glens Falls Dragons are drawing 100 to 200 fans a game. "I think we've found that the Perfect

Game League in other former minor league cities, where the ballparks are nice, they're drawing 800-1,200 people a night," Mr. Bernard said. "There's no reason we shouldn't be able to do that." Mr. Bernard said there is no timetable for the project, but that three concrete companies will come in the fall to see how difficult the project will be and how much it will cost. The City of Glens Falls plans to pay for the improvements with its share of ARPA

(American Rescue Plan Act of 2021) funds and the remaining \$100,000 from two state grants, so that fans will be able to enjoy a ballgame in the East End for years to come. The 2022 Glens Falls Dragons season runs through Friday, July 29. Remaining home games at East Field are scheduled for Friday, July 15, Tuesday, July 19, Sunday, July 24, Tuesday, July 26 and Friday, July 29. General admission: \$5 for adults, \$3 kids 12 & under. Info: 518-746-4121.

facing the Civil War monument. "Yeah," Mr. Bruno acknowledged. "It does look similar." Mr. Patten proposed leasing spaces in the Travelers garage. "It's a different situation," Mr. Bruno said. "Normally we require parking associated with any apartment building to be of a permanent nature." "This was still just a sketch plan review," Mr. Bruno said. "No actions were taken...There is always a possibility of requiring more parking." Noting that the Planning Board seems more amenable in this case, Mr. Bruno pointed to the Downtown Revitalization Initiative aspect. "They are getting \$1.5 [million] from

the DRI but the idea is that they leverage that to another \$5- or \$6 million or more. A big part of the DRI is to encourage and entice people to develop." "In general terms we are okay with it," said Mr. Bruno. "Parking, we'd have to look more into it. If I was buying or renting a condo or apartment I'd want more like they have at the Mill, with a parking garage and covered walkway." He said, "It is up to the developer to make provisions. If you're not able to entice people to rent or purchase, you need to know that up front for a project to be successful." "If parking is remote, it's incumbent on the developer to assure that it's going to work. We try to dictate having parking close by on the same parcel. If I'm the developer I need to be sure renters will want to walk 4-, 5-, 6- or 700 feet from where they park." The 333 Glen property, including the parking garage, is for sale for \$15 million.

The Bay-Glen "wedge," which prior mayor Dan Hall had hoped to purchase as a permanent park, was approved to subdivide from the 333 property, but that's been held up because of an issue with back taxes.

Building as soon as fall

Bonacio/SpringCity aims to submit completed application materials to the Planning Board this month, in order to be back on the agenda in August, with hopes also to set a public hearing. They are pressing to move quickly, citing several grants and funding they are seeking for the project. The overall time frame is to start the Phase One renovations this fall, the Phase Two Farmers Market site about a year later. "We are expecting a two year duration, and there will probably be a little overlap," said Larry Novik, Bonacio's Director of Operations.

Grant to Moreau Lake State Park: 1st disabilities use trail

Friends of Moreau Lake State Park (FOMLSP) announced it has been awarded a \$48,928 matching grant from the Environmental Protection Fund's Park and Trail Partnership Grants program to build its first trail designed to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Robin Dropkin, Executive Director of Parks & Trails New York, was quoted in the press release: "We propose to install an accessible trail following part of an existing nature trail, with a new accessible trailhead adjacent to a parking area that will be reconfigured for accessibility....A sturdy, level trail fully compliant with the Architectural Barriers Act and Americans with Disabilities Act...will be constructed.

"A kiosk set low so that it is easily visible to seated individuals will inform patrons of what to expect when exploring this trail. Kiosk placards will include brail and raised features for non-sighted patrons.

"Interpretive signs describing the surrounding natural world in multiple sensory styles will be placed along the trail....

"The project will involve at least 80 hours of volunteer labor. The trail will lead to an accessible platform and fishing pier that is an approved Eagle Scout project for Wilton, NY Troop 24. The troop welcomes your support of that project."

The Friends group must "provide an additional \$5,488 in matching funds, for a total of \$54,416 total project budget."

Mary Knutson, President of the Friends of Moreau Lake State Park, was quoted:

"Friends members will partner with community groups and other volunteers to help build this unique and inclusive trail. Including an interpretative trailhead kiosk and signs along the trail will enhance the experience for our patrons who find conventional park amenities inaccessible. Planning the route of the trail to reach an accessible fishing pier is a further step toward welcoming visitors of all abilities."

"This project will be the launching point for a fully accessible trail system which leads to gardens and natural features that were not accessible to limited mobility and visually impaired patrons before. GF Medical Mission 'is back!'; seeks volunteers for Guatemala, in Oct.

NIH: Having kids later in life

The National Institutes of Health writes: There are many reasons you might wait to have kids. You may want to focus on your career. Or save some money first. About 20% of women in the U.S. now have their first child after age 35.

You may have heard that getting pregnant can be more difficult as you age. Or that it's riskier for both the mom's and the baby's health. While these can be issues when having children later in life, many concerns are manageable.

Getting Pregnant. It can be more difficult to get pregnant with age. There are many reasons for that. One is that fertility decreases as you get older — for both men and women.

Women are born with a set number of eggs. Each month, a woman's ovary releases an egg to be fertilized. This process is called ovulation. But before that, her body recruits many eggs in preparation for this process. A handful of eggs are developed and matured, but usually only one makes it to ovulation.

"As women age, they're still fertile, but their odds of pregnancy are decreased because they're not making as many good eggs that will fertilize and divide normally and turn out to be an embryo," explains Dr. Alan Decherney, an NIH fertility expert.

After age 30, a woman's fertility decreases every year. The number and quality of her eggs goes down until she reaches menopause. Menopause usually happens around age 45 to 55. During that time, women stop having their periods and are no longer fertile.

Older men may make fewer sperm or lower-quality sperm. The age-related decline in egg and sperm quality is associated with a higher chance of the child developing certain health conditions. This includes autism spectrum disorder,

NIH advice: For a healthy pregnancy

- The National Institutes of Health advises:** No matter your age, certain things can help you have a healthier pregnancy:
- **Talk with your health care provider** about your nutrition, medications, and any health conditions. Get prenatal check-ups regularly.
 - **Take folic acid supplements.** Get at least 400 micrograms of folic acid daily.
 - **Do not use alcohol, tobacco, or drugs** such as marijuana.
 - **Avoid exposure to toxic substances,** like lead, radiation, or chemicals called solvents that are used in many workplaces.
 - **Follow a healthy diet** and maintain a healthy weight.
 - **Avoid certain foods that could be dangerous** during pregnancy, such as raw fish, undercooked meat, deli meats, and unpasteurized cheeses.
 - **Get enough physical activity.** Talk with your doctor about what's safe for your pregnancy.
 - **Limit caffeine** intake.
 - **Get regular dental checkups.**
 - **Take steps to prevent infections** that can affect your pregnancy.

Down syndrome, and schizophrenia. But most healthy women who give birth in their 30s and 40s have healthy babies.

Pregnancy Problems. If you're over 35 and haven't gotten pregnant after trying for six months, talk with your health care provider. You may be experiencing issues with infertility. Infertility is when a couple can't get pregnant or a woman hasn't been able to carry a pregnancy to term.

NIH-funded researchers are studying the causes of infertility for both men and women. There are many reasons for infertility.

"The most common cause of infertility in women is related to ovulation abnormalities," says Dr. Esther Eisenberg, who oversees reproductive medicine and infertility research at NIH.

Many factors influence your ovulation cycle. Being older is one of them. You may not ovulate regularly, or sometimes not at all.

Another cause of infertility is endometriosis. This is a disease in which tissue normally found in the uterus (womb) grows outside it. Endometriosis can cause painful periods, urination, or bowel movements. It accounts for at least a third of infertility in women. It's more common for women in their 30s and 40s.

Fibroids are also more likely as you age. These are abnormal growths made from the uterus's muscle cells. They can grow inside or outside of the wall of the uterus. These growths can prevent a woman from getting pregnant.

Most women get at least one fibroid in their lifetime. But they're most common between the ages of 40 to 50.

Other causes of infertility can be treatments for certain health conditions. "Women who have been treated for cancer might have a reduced number of eggs," Eisenberg says. "If you've had other conditions that require surgery to remove an ovary or fibroids—in which you've had surgery on the uterus—that might impact your fertility as well."

Seeking Help. "If being able to have a child becomes an issue, there are treatments," Eisenberg says. "The majority of women are able to have a child with help."

Treatments for infertility depend on the cause. Endometriosis and fibroids can be treated with drugs, surgery, and other methods. Medicines can help stimulate ovulation. These are called fertility drugs. Some are taken orally and others are injected.

Other options may be assisted reproductive technologies. Examples include in vitro fertilization (IVF) and intracytoplasmic sperm injection (ICSI). These procedures help you get pregnant using different methods of fertilizing an egg.

Decherney's group studies egg preservation, which involves freezing eggs. It may help some women facing health conditions that can reduce fertility. "But it's expensive," he notes.

Staying Healthy. Infertility isn't the only issue older couples face.

"Whether a woman can have a baby as she ages also depends on her health," Decherney says. "The chances of having diabetes or high blood pressure—which are the two major diseases that impact pregnancy — are higher."

Obesity, heart conditions, and cancer can also interfere with a woman's ability to get pregnant or stay pregnant. They can lower men's fertility, too.

Talk with your health care provider before becoming pregnant. They can help you plan for a safer pregnancy.

Being older when you're pregnant also makes you more likely to experience health problems from being pregnant or giving birth. These include heart disease, infection, bleeding, high blood pressure, and blood clots.

High blood pressure puts pregnant women at higher risk for preeclampsia. Preeclampsia is a serious medical condition that can cause you to go into labor early. It can also lead to death.

No matter your age, you have a better chance of getting and staying pregnant by living a healthy lifestyle. See the Wise Choices box for tips.

NIH: Taking on tinnitus

The National Institutes of Health writes: Do you hear sounds that no one else can hear? It might be a ringing. A clicking. Or maybe a buzzing, hissing, or humming. Hearing such noises can be disconcerting—especially if they don't go away. Some people hear these noises for a few hours. Others may hear them for a lifetime. This condition is called tinnitus. About 10% of U.S. adults have experienced tinnitus that lasted for at least five minutes in the past year. The noise can be soft or loud, high pitched or low pitched. You may hear it in one ear, or both.

Most of the time, tinnitus isn't a sign of a serious health problem. Many people experience temporary tinnitus after going to a loud concert or event. But it can also be a sign of damage to your inner ear and its connections with the brain. If it doesn't go away or gets worse, tinnitus can make it hard to hear, concentrate, or even sleep.

Many things increase your risk for tinnitus. "Noise exposure is a very common cause," says Dr. Fan-Gang Zeng, a hearing and speech expert at University of California, Irvine.

People who work in noisy environments can develop hearing damage and tinnitus over time. Examples include factory and construction workers, road crews, musicians, and military service members.

"Aging and many drugs, including aspirin, also increase your risk of tinnitus," Zeng says. More than 200 drugs are known to cause tinnitus when you start or stop taking them.

If you're experiencing tinnitus, see your health care provider. There's no test to diagnose it. But your doctor can check for possible causes. They can see if anything is blocking your ear canal. They can also look for medical conditions or medications that may be causing it.

If they don't find anything, they may refer you to an ear, nose, and throat doctor (ENT) or an audiologist. These specialists can determine if you need to be tested for hearing loss. Many people with hearing loss experience tinnitus, but it's not clear why.

Zeng says that, in certain cases, tinnitus may help protect the brain. Some brain areas may no longer be active after hearing loss. That may lead to brain

cell loss. Zeng's study found that people with both hearing loss and tinnitus are less likely to have cognitive decline than those who had hearing loss alone. He speculates that tinnitus may help keep certain brain areas active despite hearing loss.

But not everyone who has tinnitus has hearing loss. For those who do, hearing aids or surgical treatments for hearing loss may help.

There is currently no cure for tinnitus. But some treatments can help you cope—see the Wise Choices box. Researchers are also looking for new ways to treat tinnitus. For example, Zeng's team is testing ways to stimulate the nerve that goes from the inner ear to the brain, called the auditory nerve. His team hopes this can help reduce tinnitus.

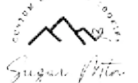

but is typically at very low trace levels."

He said, "We take that material and we treat the PFAS, we get rid of it."

"It's not a forever chemical, if you get it hot enough," he said. "That's the key, is thermal treatment, you have to get it hot enough to break the fluorine-carbon bonds."

Ms. Purdue contends, "The jury is out on the effectiveness of the process."

She cited a January 2021 EPA report that said pyrolysis could potentially destroy PFAS, however "this mechanism, as well as evaluation of potential products of incomplete destruction, remain a subject for further investigation and research."

Mr. Apy is confident that his facility would be safe and environmentally sound, by necessity, he said.

"When it comes to what comes out of the plant's air stack, or how much noise it makes, or if it smells nasty, if anything like that happens, that's going to be permit violations, and that's going to shut us down."

"So we have to do something that doesn't allow those things to happen," he said.

Mr. Apy insists there will be absolutely no odor generated from the plant, or the trucks bringing the "biosolids" in.

"Our process...end to end, it is designed to trap, contain, and treat odors."

"It's in a negative air pressure building. So we're always pulling air into the building, we untarp the truck, we dump it into a pit in the ground...All the ambient air from the building in the receiving area goes into our air treatment system..."

"We've got an odor guarantee from one of the largest producers of industrial air treatment systems in the world," Con-dorchem, he added.

Hoffman Car Wash plan for Rt. 9 Qby draws opposition

The *Albany Business Review* reported on July 2 that the Hoffman Car Wash chain wants to build a 160-foot car wash on Route 9 in Queensbury near the Walmart and that the nearby Whispering Pines residences and the owners of their building housing 40 Oak Classic American Grilled filed an Article 78 lawsuit in State Supreme Court seeking to overturn town approval of the project.

Claudia Braymer, representing Whispering Pines, was quoted: "[T]raffic on Weeks Road is really a concern. It is going to affect residents' ability to get to Route 9 or their apartments."

Hoffman Car Wash's Tom Hoffman, Jr., was quoted: "Obviously we are going to defend ourselves. The town was very deliberate in carefully considering all of the issues that were brought up by neighbors."

A car wash once operated at this site, the story noted, and that the property was sold to the Hoffmans last year after the death of prior owner Ken Ermiger.

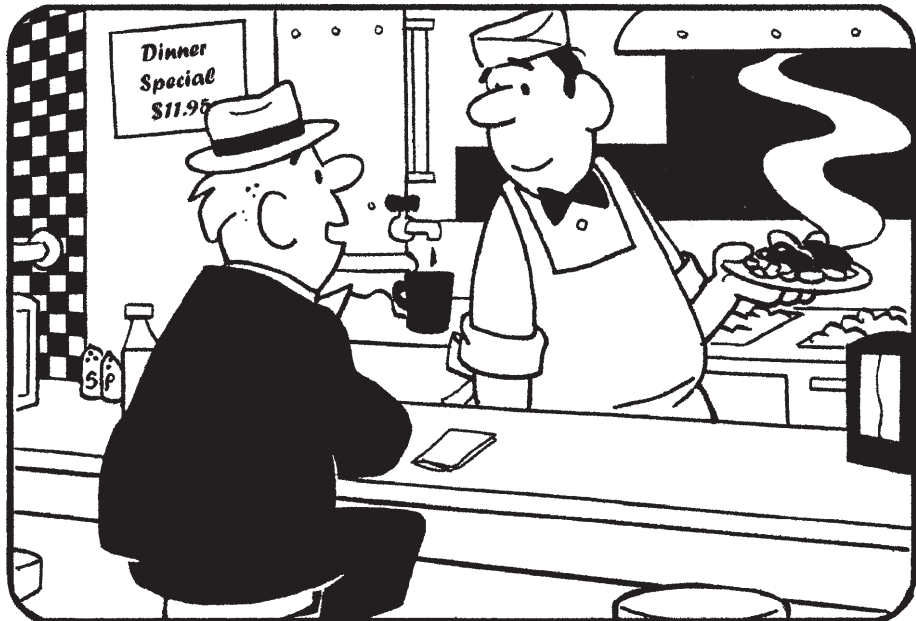

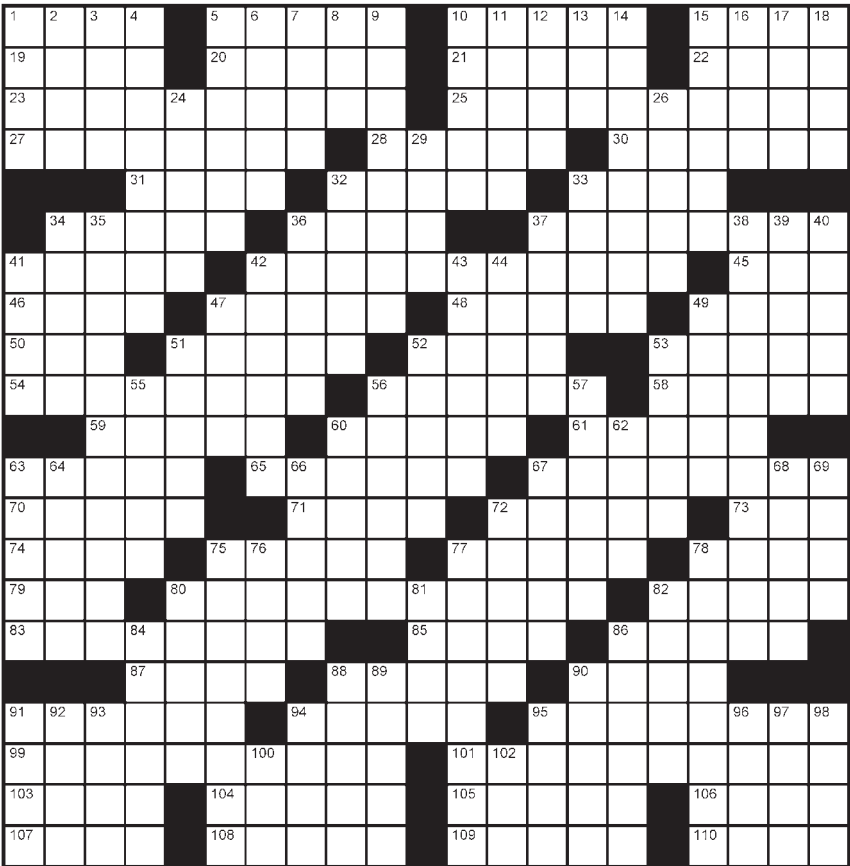

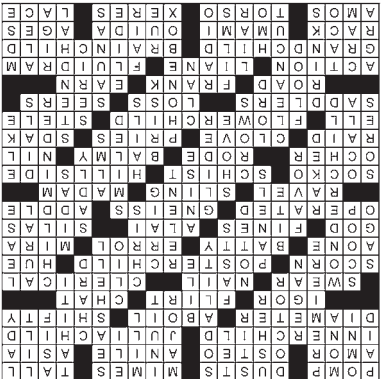

Alfie, lost dog for 16 days, found safe

with their dogs. Ms. Miranda said she went straight to the house, got down and called to Alfie, and he came to her.

Alfie lost about four pounds — down to just eight, but otherwise was no worse for wear. No ticks, “not even one,” Ms. Miranda said.

Ms. Miranda and Mr. Catarisano and their teenage children Natalia and Joseph came to Lake George on a three-day vacation in June.

Put dog in day care for a few hours

They put the dog in the care of GFK9 on Warren Street for several hours so they could go on a Lake George boat ride and tour of Fort William Henry.

When they returned to retrieve the dog, he was missing.

The lost dog was the subject of a *Chronicle* front-page story last week. Beyond the print and digital editions, the story reached more than 90,000 people via Facebook, and provided the couple's cell phone numbers.

Ms. Miranda and Mr. Catarisano maintained a presence in Glens Falls throughout the search, trading places.

“My husband was [leaving] today — so we switched again,” Ms. Miranda texted *The Chronicle* just after Alfie was found. “But I brought my work computer. I was not going back to Pittsburgh without my baby.”

Mr. Catarisano was in Syracuse late Saturday night when the dog was found. He said he phoned home to wake up their two children in Pittsburgh with the great news, and immediately returned to Glens Falls in the morning.

In the Peck Avenue backyard, he said, “There were two dogs like my aunt has, Shih Tzus. It must have been familiar to him.”

“The fence was like the same, too,” Ms. Miranda added. “Maybe he thought that was their backyard.”

She said Glens Falls Animal Hospital had told her to contact them any time if they needed help with Alfie.

They took Alfie there late night Saturday, Ms. Miranda said. “And Dr. Laura took care of him. They didn't charge us.”

It was the end of a grueling few weeks.

Search base: Rob & Deb's parking lot

Mr. Catarisano slept two nights in his Jeep in the parking lot of Rob and Deb's ice cream on Dix Avenue. The shop's owners supported the search effort; the parking lot became the searchers' base.

Many volunteers joined the effort, including Josh Grassi, whose Clifton Park Pet Search has found many lost pets.

At Mr. Grassi's suggestion, Mr. Catarisano cooked bacon three or four times in the Rob & Deb's parking lot.

“I guess the bacon smell lofts in the woods. So maybe that's why he was found right over past this place,” just a short walk from the ice cream shop, Mr. Catarisano said.

They're not sure exactly how Alfie sur-

Mike and Sherry Winfield found Alfie

Alfie the dog was found in the backyard of Mike and Sherry Winfield's home on Peck Avenue off Haskell Avenue late Saturday night.

Mike told *The Chronicle* that their dogs, Milo and Otis, a Shih Tzu and a Japanese Chin-Poodle mix, woke up late, barking at an animal outside.

Mike took them into the backyard for potty purposes.

“They were sniffing something, like they were they were alerted. I'm like, that's weird,” Mr. Winfield said.

“So I shine the flashlight...and I was like, oh my God, that's Alfie!

“I yelled to Sherry, ‘Hey, you need to come to the window, like right now. And call the owners!’”

Mr. Winfield said Alfie had gotten in through a hole in their fence — but could not escape the same way.

Sherry called Alfie's owners and “within minutes there was an entourage of cars here, everyone who was assisting with the rescue looking for him,” Mr. Winfield said.

“It was a very emotional reunion... Sandra got down on her knees and she was crying when Alfie came over,” he said. “Sherry started crying. It was a sigh of relief. I'm so happy that they got reunited with their dog.”

vived for more than two weeks, which included Fourth of July. “That was awful, his first experience with fireworks, all by himself,” Ms. Miranda said.

Expert Josh Grassi's advice

Mr. Grassi told *The Chronicle* he was always optimistic that Alfie would be found. “These guys, they're resilient. People often give up. Never give up, because I never give up. I've done hundreds.”

“They don't just deteriorate as quick as people think,” Mr. Grassi said. “I mean, I've gotten dogs that were running for months.”

He expressed surprise that Alfie's paws didn't even show damage from the weeks on the lose.

“He's very skinny, the vet said, so he probably didn't eat too much. But they'll eat animal poop, when it comes down to it,” Mr. Grassi said. “Bird seed from people's yards, they'll eat grass, stuff that's really not good for them, but they do.”

The searchers had several frustratingly close calls. At one point Alfie was spotted on video from Frozen Dreams' security cameras. There were sightings at the intersection of Dix Avenue and Quaker Road, at the U-Haul business and across the way near Binley's Florist.

“I was just like, defeated,” Ms. Miranda said of the last day. “And then we got a call.”

Couple's gratitude

Mr. Catarisano and Ms. Miranda repeatedly expressed their gratitude.

Ms. Miranda said of Rob and Deb's, “We call it a headquarters because we were always there and they were so nice about it too.”

“The guys from Lehigh [Cement] let us be there, with the safety equipment, looking for our dogs.”

“Everybody has been like really nice,” she said of the community. “Just calling and texting...people drop off snacks and drinks for us during the day to ensure that we were doing okay.”

Mr Catarisano said the ordeal “was a curse and a blessing. I guess it brought a lot of people that didn't know each other here together. Like a lot of friends now.”

His thoughts on GFK9

The Chronicle asked Mr. Catarisano what he thought of GF-K9, the kennel that lost Alfie. A group that included members of the search party picketed the business over the weekend.

“I wish we would have done our homework, that's basically it,” he said.

“I don't wish him any ill will. I just hope he learns from his mistakes and maybe has like a plan or a secondary plan if this ever happens again.”

Some examples of a better plan? Mr. Catarisano said, “getting a tracker quickly or getting someone that's an expert.

“We weren't experts, we just did was we thought right and we were doing it all wrong,” he said.

What mistakes did they make?

“Calling his name...trying to get him to

us, not getting down on the ground, non-threatening.”

Mr. Catarisano said they also learned from Mr. Grassi, “Our signage was too small. You've got to see something really bright on the side of the road...the shorter, the sweeter, the better.”

Will they return to this area?

“This is the safest place to come on vacation, as long as we don't board him,” Mr. Catarisano joked.

“We know the area very well!” Ms. Miranda added.

Josh Grassi a pro at Pet Search

Josh Grassi, 46, operates Clifton Park Pet Search. He joined the search for the lost dog Alfie.

The Chronicle talked to him Sunday, the morning after Alfie was found.

“There's no better feeling than uniting an owner with a pet,” Mr. Grassi says.

He said he's been doing this for 17 years, and “out of the 17 years this is probably one of the best organizations that we've had. I've never had people so dedicated.”

“I do it voluntary,” Mr. Grassi said. He said he's on disability and that two things geared him to start looking for pets.

“When I was 16, my sister lost her dog and it was never found. It really bothered me,” he said.

And 17 years ago, “I happened to be in a very bad spot in my life. I was kind of depressed.” He decided that even “if I can't find your pet, maybe I restore faith in humanity.”

Of searching for dogs and some other pets including “indoor cats,” Mr. Grassi said, “Of hundreds, maybe a dozen I didn't get. I have five awards from New York State.”

“I've gotten dogs that ran 17 miles from home. I kind of have an idea where dogs go.”

Sometimes the ending is sad. He has found animals hit by a car and “frozen in a pond.”

With Alfie, he says, “I jumped in late, beginning of July.” Alfie had been missing since June 22.

He has a whole technique.

“Posters are key,” he said, adding that they need to be big, simple and bright.

He said he aims to “make a perimeter of posters” in a half-mile radius where the dog is likely to be. He said he checks

with animal control officers and follows up on public sightings.

Then there is the bacon. “We grill bacon really slow. That's what usually draws them to our traps,” Mr. Grassi said.

For Alfie, there was a pop-up set up in the parking lot at Rob and Deb's Frozen Dreams on Dix Avenue. That's where they cooked the bacon.

Alfie was found Saturday night maybe 300 to 400 yards from the parking lot.

“I never get to work with people like these guys,” Mr. Grassi said.

“We had a pop-up. It was just called our meeting spot. I'd just drive up every morning at 10 or 11 a.m. We stayed 10 or 11 hours just waiting at our tent for sightings. We all brought coolers.”

He said, “The railroad let us put up a tent. They stopped the train and were looking, for us.”

“All these people are incredible and this is exactly what the world needs right now. I'll never forget the people.”
