Cushman & Wakefield/Pyramid Company in Albany has the listing. They had not returned a call by press time.

"Entire 66,008 SF Class A office building available for lease," says the listing posted on the Internet.

"Excellent location off Exit 18 of the Adirondack Northway (I-87). Situated on 6.86 acres with 425 private parking spaces. Monument and building signage is available."

No lease rate was cited in the listing. Built by the Tribune company, it was the headquarters for the TV listings and data business that was pioneered by Jim West and Ted Zoli in Glens Falls/Queensbury. It continues under successor owners as a significant local employer.

When Covid struck, most staff shifted to working remotely — and have never returned to the office.

Stefanik closing Glens Falls office; 'flagship' now in East Greenbush

Rep. Elise Stefanik has established "her new flagship NY-21 district office in East Greenbush," in the Rensselaer County Office Building, said a press release from her office.

Cites her

It said, "Stefanik will also have district offices in Plattsburgh, Ogdensburg, and Herkimer County."

kimer County."

The release was
the first indication
we had that she
was closing her

office in Glens Falls. We asked the Congresswoman for comment.

She replied, "Due to redistricting, our district geographically grew from 12 counties to 15 counties — covering over 1/3 of the geography of New York State."

She cited "The addition of a significant population south of Albany and south of I-90 west of Albany in the Mohawk Valley.

"We will have new offices in Ogdensburg, Herkimer, and East Greenbush and are maintaining our office in Plattsburgh and continuing to participate in community events across all of NY-21.

"I will continue to serve Warren County as we always have with a focus on exceptional constituent services and with a strong, active presence in the community.

"Last week, I participated in the Adirondack Regional Chamber of Commerce [Legislators Lunch] and I look forward to delivering the same level of excellent representation for families across all of the 15 counties in NY-21."

The Republican Rep. Stefanik won Warren County again last November, defeating Democrat Matt Castelli, 14,888 (52.97%) to 13,221 (47.04%).

In 2020, Rep. Stefanik defeated Tedra Cobb in Warren County, 19,315 (53.73%) to 16,604 (46.19%).

Overall, in 2022 Rep. Stefanik won the 21st District over Matt Castelli 168,579 (59.15%) to 116,421 (40.85%).

In 2020, she defeated Tedra Cobb, 188,655 (58.84%) to 131,995 (41.17%).

'Moreau United': Jesse Fish aims to unseat Kusnierz; oust VanTassel too

Moreau United — a "bipartisan alliance" — launched an effort to oust Moreau Town Supervisor Todd Kusznierz and gain a majority on the town board.

Retired water superintendent Jesse Fish is running for Town Supervisor.

Incumbent Democrat John Donohue and Patrick Killian will seek the two available town council seats versus endorsed Republicans, incumbent Alan VanTassel and Radici restaurant owner Carly Mankouski.

Mr. Fish said he retired as Moreau water superintendent in 2019. He said Mr. Donohue put the party together and approached him to run for Supervisor.

"We're obviously not happy with the way things are," Mr. Fish told *The Chronicle*. "And there's a lot of people that aren't. So it's just time for a change."

Mr. Donohue frequently calls Mr. Kusnierz a "bully." Monday he called Republican council members Kyle Noonan and Alan VanTassel "enablers."

"People haven't had a choice, and they've got a choice now," he said.

"They can have a career politician with two hand-picked enablers. Or they can have three just regular guys, not politicians," Mr. Donohue added. "We want to be public servants and do what's right for the people of the Town of Moreau."

Mr. Killian responded via text, but did not take specific questions. He wrote, "My perspective is that I will not engage in any antics. The town, the village and our community deserves more then what's been happening in our town!! Time for change."

Moreau United said its candidates will take positions on big topics. Like the planned Biochar carbon fertil-

Like the planned Biochar carbon fertilizer facility?

"I don't know," Mr. Fish said. "I'm not in favor of Biochar. Is it so deep that we can't stop it from coming here? I don't know."

"To say, well, if I'm elected we'll stop this. I can't say that," but "I don't think it should be shoved down the people's throats. I'm against Biochar. I don't think it should be brought here."

What about enabling solar farms in the

Moreau ag district? "That's something

"That's something that I'm not involved with at all," Mr. Fish replied. But, "to help the farm farmers out. I mean, if that's going to subsidize their income somewhat, and it's not hurting anybody else, I don't see why it's turned into such a big issue."

Mr. Donohue said, "I don't want to see our agricultural district lined with solar panels. I don't. But there are some projects that were proposed and are waiting on a solar law that would be perfect in the agricultural district."

Mr. Donohue says some projects would allow farmers to continue farming. He said, "We should have a solar law on the books, sit down and hash one out, good, bad or indifferent."

Moreau United also cites the Exit 17 sewer extension.

Mr. Donohue said in 2018 the sewer district extension "was specifically voted on and passed to be a stimulus for growth along the Exit 17 corridor."

He says, "79 properties were going to vote on this, and people were promised that they weren't going to have to pay for this thing, that there was going to be a big warehouse...[and] office complexes coming in, that they had people lined up to come in here...


"Well, none of that has come to fruition. You know, it just hasn't happened."

Mr. Donohue said, "The debt is going to be paid by assessed value of your property...These people were sold a bill of goods."

Mr. Donohue said now, others "want to put all their eggs in one basket and spend millions of dollars on a 'build it and they will come' extension down to Saratoga County."

Mr. Fish said, "Everything is lined up

Qby. Town Board appoints Hilary Stec to Seeber's seat

Chronicle Managing Editor Cathy DeDe writes: The Queensbury Town Board on Monday chose Republican Hilary Stec to complete the term of Rachel Seeber, who resigned as a Queensbury At-Large Supervisor on the War-

ren County Board of Supervisors.

"I am honored to have received the appointment..." Ms. Stec wrote in a statement she provided to *The Chronicle*. "I am appreciative of the time spent by the Town Members to interview all the candidates and

ensure it was a transparent process.

"Thank you to the Queensbury Republican Committee and the Warren County Conservative Party for their endorsement of my candidacy as well.

"I look forward to serving the Town of Queensbury and Warren County immediately and then achieving a successful election result in November to continue to serve in this capacity."

All four Queensbury At-Large seats on the county board, including Ms. Stec's, will be on the ballot in November.

Seven hopefuls sought the appointment.



Ms. Stec prevailed with votes from all three Republican Town Board members, George Ferone, Tim McNulty and Tony Metivier. Democrat Harrison Freer voted for Democrat Robin Larkin. Supervisor John Strough, also a Democrat, voted for Democrat David Strainer.

Mr. Strough commented, "Any of those three — Robin Larkin, Dave Strainer or Hilary Stec — would have made a good replacement. All three said they are planning to run (in November), and if they do run, I believe all three could get in."

Democrat Mike Parwana, independent Travis Whitehead and Republican Bradley Stark also sought the appointment and have said they plan to run in November.

Republican hopeful Don Stack withdrew his name prior to Monday's vote, citing health reasons.

Incumbent Brad Magowan is seeking re-election. Incumbent Doug Beaty is instead running for Queensbury Town Board in Ward 2 against Mr. Freer.

Incumbent Mike Wild was denied the Republican endorsement and said he hasn't decided yet whether he'll run.

Tonko: ban 'predatory' online sports gambling ads

Congressman Paul Tonko introduced the "Betting on our Future Act, new legislation that bans all online and electronic advertising of sports gambling."

In a release Mr. Tonko said. "These ads pose a particularly dangerous threat to adolescents and young adults unaware of the risks involved in gambling, and to individuals prone to addiction."

to go [to Glens Falls]...Everything right now is going to Glens Falls, everything that's hooked up. So to spend another \$4 million to go the other way to send everything to Wilton, I don't know what the advantage to that is."

Mr. Donohue suggests, "We could buy capacity as we need it right now from the City of Glens Falls, and see where we're at and see how things develop."

Mr. Fish said, "I don't want to get into bashing people. That's not what it's about. I don't agree with some things. But that doesn't mean that I'm right and they're wrong. It just means that I don't agree.

Moreau United said it will hold a meeting at the Moreau Community Center on March 11.



Chronicle managing editor Cathy DeDe writes: Three new apartments upstairs at 170 Glen Street — above the new Rude Betty retail store — are ready for show time. Billed as "luxury" short term rental accommodations, they'll be available through Airbnb, VRBO and other platforms "within the week," owner Tom Elliott tells The Chronicle.

Mr. Elliott purchased the building for \$275,000 in September 2021. He says he put "north of a million dollars" into it.

Mr. Elliott, a Sarasota, Florida, native with a chain of Irish pubs there, is a long-time Bolton Landing property owner. He previously purchased 12 Warren Street, which has Black Anvil Body Art as a first floor tenant and a short term rental apartment upstairs that he uses as home base when he's here.

The three 170 Glen apartments are:

• A 700-square foot one-bedroom corporate apartment available by the month or for several months for \$3,000 a month. It's targeted to visiting executives and doctors or traveling nurses. Mr. Elliott said he is reaching out to Glens Falls Hospital. Decor includes a wall of vintage black-and-white cartoon illustrations of doctors and medical personnel.

· 2-story, 3-bedroom 1,800-square foot short-term rental unit at the front of the building, overlooking Glen Street, that also has an outdoor rooftop deck looking toward West Mountain. They're seeking to charge up to \$500 weekly. It has an open, high-ceilinged kitchen, casual and formal dining areas, living room/seating areas with wide windows. Upstairs are three bedrooms, one a massive master bed- and sitting room, plus two baths. A long hallway leads to the rooftop deck. The hall itself will accommodate a wet bar

• Single-level, 2-bedroom 800-square-foot short-term unit envisioned to rent in-season for \$300-\$400 a week, "in the \$200's" off-season. They'll see how the market responds, said Mr. Elliott and his property manager Brittany Townsend. "We're just getting started putting it out there," she said.

Mr. Elliott says, "The worst hotel is \$100 a night. And here you have all new appliances, washer-dryer, it's fully furnished, and you can walk everywhere.

He said it's high-end, but "I don't want it to be so crazy that people don't get to experience it. I like to make these beautiful spaces, and I want people to enjoy it."

Upstairs was 'a bunch of nothing' when he bought the building, Mr. Elliott said. "There were newspapers there from the 1950s. There was just a ladder to get to the third floor." Renovations included fully replacing the roof.

Room furnishings are typically "clever restorations" and "eclectic" refurbished or repurposed antique items, Ms. Townsend noted. She said most are Mr. Elliott's own

Mr. Elliott says he recently purchased 428 Glen Street, Dr. Vincent Koh's former office, which he said he expects to renovate with as many as four short-term rental luxury apartments.

His 45-acre property in Argyle, already available to rent, includes a renovated house and a small cottage, plus he

restored three classic Airstream trailers and arrayed them as "glamping" bedrooms, attached to a smaller out-building that serves as kitchen and living space.

'I like doing short term spaces,'' Mr. Elliott says. "Long term tenants, a lot of them develop a sense of entitlement. Short term people actually tend to take better care of the place. And there's a need for it. I do have some long term rentals in my portfolio, but it is not my preference. I'm not 100 percent committed only to short term, though."



Scoop: No knockout blow

Both sides are always looking for the clincher

in the ceaseless fight between the left and the right.

Left landed a haymaker this week — or, rather, Right punched itself in the head. Here came revelations that Fox News commentators like Tucker Carlson and Sean Hannity, back in 2020, privately dismissed Trump's

claims that the election was stolen, but they and Fox fueled the allegations anyway for fear of alienating their core audience.

Inside stuff about
Fox News surfaced because Dominion Voting
Systems is pursuing
hard its \$1.6 billion

defamation lawsuit against the cable news company. In a deposition under oath, Fox boss Rupert Murdoch essentially threw his biggest commentators under the bus, admitted they distorted reality.

Faux News, CNN chortled, and no doubt many on the left thought the final blow had been struck, discrediting not only Fox, but Republicans, the right, the whole kit and kaboodle. Down the drain goes the GOP.

But not so fast, my friend. At the very same moment that the left felt vindicated and triumphant, comes inconvenient news in the opposite direction.

"DOE Says Lab Leak Is Likely Origin of Covid-19," read the page one headline in Monday's *Wall Street Journal*. It said the Department of Energy and the FBI both believe Covid came from the Wuhan lab in China, not a jump from animals (though DOE acknowledged its conclusion is made with "low confidence" for now).

When Arkansas Senator Tom Cotton suggested Wuhan as the virus's source early in the pandemic, he was ridiculed and practically branded a traitor. As the news media enforced (and enforces) orthodoxy, no questioning is allowed. 'You must think only this way.'

More challenging news keeps coming on the Covid ont, too.

Respected medical journal *Lancet* published an article acknowledging that natural immunity isn't some ignorant, outlandish claim. There's truth to it, too.

Cochrane Library, which I'd never heard of but which has NIH backing and a substantial reputation, even came out with a report suggesting that masks are of limited value in stopping the spread. To be sure, the conclusion was nuanced and not a slam dunk, but it was big that they went open-minded to the topic at all.

The point isn't that anything is now settled once and for all. Just the opposite. It's that questioning is mak-

ing a comeback even in some establishment places.

No knock-out punch exists for left or right as things currently stand amid the nation's wide, equal divide. Each party can proceed smugly in certainty it's right—but it carries no sway at all with foes on the other side. The world needs a powerful dose of humility

Here's another way things have changed.

The woke police set about rewriting Roald Dahl, the World War II British flying ace and later spy who also wrote ever-popular books like *James and the Giant Peach, Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, Matilda* and *Fantastic Mr Fox.* (I admit I never read any of them.)

Dahl, who was born in 1916 and died in 1990, used some language not sufficiently "inclusive" — so today's empowered enforcers hacked at its transgressions.

What's new is that a backlash quickly and substantially developed, and in just a few days, the publisher announced that while it will bring out the new sensitized rendition, it will also keep publishing the books as Mr. Dahl originally wrote them.

The pendulum has some swing to it again, instead of always heading in one dictated direction.

Uh-oh. Now comes word that they're about to give Ian Fleming's James Bond books the same going-over. What will the result be? I'm thinking it might end up being a matter of vigorous debate!














Back to the school for first time since 2020

After two years as a shortened one-day outdoor event at The Great Escape because of the Covid pandemic, the 46th annual South High Marathon Dance returns home this Friday and Saturday, March 3 & 4.

"I'm super excited to have the dance back to its pre-Covid form," said Brandin Luman, one of the nine student chairs.

The full 28 hours, back at the high **school**, letting the parents watch — $i\bar{t}$'s all so exciting!"

Jillian Capozucca, another chair, said, "Everyone is so happy about the dance being back at the school, especially the seniors. Our freshman year was the last time the dance was at the school and I know that every one of my fellow classmates wants to experience this amazing event again, back at the school."

Some 630 South High students have signed up to participate, each committed to raising at least \$150. Fund-raising events abound, both as part of the dance and in the greater community.

In its 45 years, Marathon Dance officials say it has raised \$9.9-million. It's poised to break the \$10-million mark. Last year's dance raised \$515,440.74

The students themselves select the recipients who benefit from the money raised. This year they selected 12 individuals, ages 2 to 63, and 10 not-for-profit organizations.





□ SGF students chose 12 people, 10 non-profits as recipients

The student committee selected 12 individuals, ages 2 to 63, and 10 non-profits to receive proceeds from the 46th annual South High Marathon Dance. There were 90 applications for help.

The dance continued during Covid, but in an altered way, is finally back at its traditional location — the high school on its traditional first weekend in March, Friday to Saturday, March 3-4.

The recipients:

• Tayton Bowen, 20, of Ballston Spa was nominated by his mother and by family member Rachel French, a South Glens Falls teacher, for help with medical bills and lost wages resulting from injuries. "Tayton was in a terrible accident that caused a broken femur, hip, tibia, ribs, collapsed lung, lacerations to both kidneys, sacrum S1 separation, and the

amputation of his left leg."Donald Crandall, 52, is a past recipient from South Glens Falls with quadriplegia. "Don describes himself as a proud Bulldog who requests assistance from SHMD to repair or replace his aging handicapped-accessible van that is in desperate need of expensive repairs."

• Crue Duswalt, 2, of Hudson Falls was diagnosed with Noonan Syndrome, a genetic disorder. "Because of the many complications related to his condition, his family is requesting assistance for spe-cialized glasses and leg devices, a ramp and railing to help him get upstairs, a service dog, as well as a handicap accessible bathroom.

• Kathleen Evarts, 63, of Hudson Falls, has ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease. She was nominated by her brother and sister-in-law, long-time South Glens Falls residents and SHMD volunteers, to help purchase a specialty ALS wheelchair and a wheelchair accessible van. "In the last few years, Kathleen has undergone knee replacement, spinal fusion, thyroid removal, and for the last year and a half, struggled with walking."

• Hunter George, 24, a South High

graduate and past Marathon Dancer, seeks help with lost wages due to continued treatment from a recent motorcycle accident that almost took his life, and from which recovery was "miraculous." said the school. "The accident was caused by a ruptured internal carotid brain aneurysm, and resulted in multiple serious injuries. Hunter has had six surgeries, with two more pending."

• Christopher Goodness, 11, of Hudson Falls was diagnosed with Stage 4 Ewing Sarcoma, a bone cancer. His family seeks help with lost wages and medical travel expenses to Boston, Mass., for his treatments. "Christopher is currently going through chemotherapy and has received radiation treatments. He relapsed in October without going into remission."
• Grace Netti, 18, a South High grad-

uate recently diagnosed with Postural Orthostatic Tachycardia Syndrome, or POTS, requests assistance to purchase a service dog. "Grace was diagnosed with POTs after four years of trying to find an explanation for her chronic symptoms. This service dog would provide...more independence, by being able to help if anything happens when she is otherwise without assistance."

• Gabrielle Potter, 14, is a student at Oliver W. Winch Middle School in South Glens Falls. She was diagnosed with a motility disorder (IBS-c), bleeding disorder and chronic sinus disease. Her family requested assistance with the cost of travel and medication.

• Aiden J Rodriguez, age 7, of Hudson Falls, was diagnosed with Choroid Plexus Carcinoma, a rare brain cancer. His family requested help with costs related to his medical expenses, travel for treatment, and lost wages. Diagnosed this past fall Aiden "has already been through one surgery at Albany Medical Center, where they were only able to remove 15% of the tumor. He has had four chemo treatments and just recently underwent surgery to attempt to remove the rest of the tumor. He will also be receiving stem cell treatment in Rochester."

• Randy Strong, 56, a 1984 graduate of South High who participated in modified, JV and Varsity wrestling "is now wrestling with esophageal cancer" and seeks help with medical expenses and lost wages associated with his condition.

Diagnosed in October, the day before his daughter's wedding, "Randy enjoys time with his wife of 31 years, his two sons and his daughter, who is expecting a child, Randy's first grandchild, in July." Currently he expects to receive six chemo treatments and 28 radiation treatments before surgery.

• **Shane Walsh,** 45, of South Glens Falls is a past SHMD recipient diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia. His wife Stacy teaches at Moreau Elementary, and their triplets Andrew, Hannah and Lukas attend Oliver Winch Middle School.

Shane had a second full bone marrow transplant in September of 2021, then learned in September 2022 that the cancer had returned and he couldn't have a third transplant. "He is currently undergoing intensive chemo to try to kill the cancer with the hope of using his recent donor's T-cells once the cancer is gone."

• Megan Willis, 51, the mother of three South Glens Falls students, a teacher and active community member, seeks help with medical bills "for treatments that will allow her to regain the role of caretaker for her children."

Megan was diagnosed with Breast Cancer and a brain stem infection that caused stroke symptoms and resulted in missing 13 months of teaching.



"We also have an online donation link on our portion of the shmd.org website that anyone can donate to!


"We hope to in future years expand and have more interactive fund-raisers for alumni!"

"Any alumni are welcome to come volunteer! It's definitely great to give back to the community.'







Shuttle bus parking areas

Shuttle parking for Marathon Dance volunteers and for spectators will be available at the following locations:

- South Glens Falls United Methodist Church at 15 Maplewood Pakway
- Kingpin's Alley Family Fun Center at 166 Saratoga Avenue
- Mr. Bill's Carhop at 1720 Route 9
- The First Baptist Church at 1721 Route 9.
- There is NO shuttle parking at Tanglewood Elementary School this year.

How to shuttle

Bus shuttles from the designated parking areas to the Senior High School and to Tanglewood Elementary School will run in continous cycles:

- Friday, March 3, from 5 to 11 p.m.
- Saturday, March 4, from 8 a.m. until 9:30 p.m., and again after the conclusion of the Marathon Finale.
- When parking at a satellite site, the committee suggests you get out of your vehicle and wave to the bus as it cycles through the parking lot, to be sure the driver sees to pick you up.
