It's in the restricted zone - Canada Street and one block on either side of it where short term rentals such as AirBnB or VRBO are now allowed.

But the overlay condo district is fur-ther restricted. It's bounded by Beach Road and McGillis Avenue to the south and the crosswalk at Amherst Street and Pine Point Lane to the north.

"I feel like a big chunk of proper-ties in that zone could be utilized as condos, potential good use," Mayor Perry said. He cited especially The Boardwalk property and Duffy's restaurant.

The mayor said the zoning prevents motels and hotels like The Georgian

"From a business investment standpoint, it might make sense for a developer to tear down the motel, build condos, sell them for a good chunk of change and just walk away, but that is not supporting , tourism.

"What we don't want is what hap-pened, like with Capri Village" in the Town of Lake George, "which was torn down and converted, now all privately owned condos. The goal is mainly to keep hotel and motel rooms. Otherwise you run the risk of losing them.

Meanwhile, "we want to encourage development of second-story, third, fourth, even fifth and sixth where it's applicable," Mayor Perry said.

Second-floor condo units are currently planned, for example, in the former King Neptune's waterfront property that is slated for extensive renovation as a boutique hotel, and upstairs from Caffé Vero coffee shop at 253 Canada Street.

Mom of the HF boy hurt by truck disputes police report

Lexi North, the mother of Ryan North, 11-year-old badly injured on April 22 when he was struck by a pick-up truck, strongly disputes the Hudson Falls Police report on the accident.

Police said the driver Roger Rock "attempted to stop and swerve to avoid the child, but ultimately crashed into a nearby telephone pole."

Ms. North said Ryan was on her property, in her driveway — not in the street. Another caller took issue with the de-

piction of when Mr. Rock swerved. The Chronicle again contacted HFPD.

Captain Brad Lyon said he could not comment, but that the investigation is still active. He said the police would like to speak with any potential eyewitness that has yet to be interviewed.

A Gofundme for Ryan and Lexi had raised \$11,380 as of Tuesday.

An update posted Tuesday said, "Ryan had a rough day yesterday and was pretty sick most of the afternoon and evening."

"Today he had a cat scan to make sure that everything was ok, since he had such a rough day yesterday and they confirmed he was ok and no brain trauma or concussion just the laceration where he has the staples."

'Preparing for your demise'...

Editor's note: We first published in 2019 this piece that Deborah Ricci wrote as the Chief Clerk of the Warren County Surrogate's Court.

"Mom said I could have her gardening tools!"

Well. Mom said she always wanted me to have her garden tools."

While the above may sound a bit farfetched, situations like this happen all the time in Surrogate's Court.

You have worked hard all your life and accumulated some valuable, or at the very least, sentimental possessions. What happens to your belongings when you die?

The first thing you need to know is that the Power of Attorney you may have signed while you were alive is now WORTHLESS. Nobody has any authority to touch any of your STUFF — not even your spouse and/ or children — if your assets are titled in your name individually.

The second, more important thing, to know is that no matter what you may have SAID to your friends and loved ones during your lifetime. It doesn't matter now that you are gone, unless you have a properly executed Will.

You should also know that your Will is not valid until the Surrogate says it was properly executed by you and it is admitted to Probate.

A Will admitted to probate authorizes your Executor to legally sell or transfer your real and personal property.

New York State law details how your Will needs to be executed.

Your Will should be in writing - pref-

erably typed (as handwriting can sometimes be indecipherable) - pages numbered and STAPLED together in proper order.

You must ask two people — who are not beneficiaries under your Will - to be witnesses to the execution of your Will.

You must declare to the two witnesses that the document you are signing is your Last Will and Testament and that it expresses your wishes. (It doesn't hurt to throw in you are of SOUND MIND!)

You must sign your Will in front of the two witnesses. You must ask the two witnesses to sign your Will's attestation clause - after your Signature.

The two witnesses must also sign a separate document called an Affidavit of Attesting Witness, stating the proper formalities were followed during the Will execution.

All executed documents should be kept

together in a safe place. If you are comfortable doing so, a photocopy may be provided to your Executor.

Wash. County: 3 supervisors not running again; **no Democrats** file petitions; **Hogan primaried**

Town supervisors Dana Haff of Hartford, Matt Hicks of Granville and Jim Griffith of White Creek won't seek reelection this November.

Mr. Haff confirmed, "I am not seeking office in Nov. I think maybe 14 years from 7 terms should be sufficient."

Republicans Barbara S. Beecher and Scott Hahn will vie in a Republican primary for the supervisor nomination. Ms. Beecher, a Town Council member, also has the Conservative line in November.

Also in Hartford, three Republicans David Swezey, Darwin Casey Arlen and Kevin Eastman — will vie in a primary for two Town Council positions.

Kingsbury Town Supervisor Dana Hogan faces a Republican primary challenge from councilman William Haessly, who also has the Conservative line in November, according to the Board of Elections web listing.

Three Republicans submitted petitions for two seats on the Kingsbury Town Council, but there won't be a primary.

James T. Lindsay and Sean Akins will be on the November ballot. Petitions submitted by Les Macura, were invalidated, said Thomas Rogers, the Republican Commissioner on the County Board of Elections.

Mr. Rogers also confirmed that no Democrats — zero — filed petitions for any office up for election in Washington County this year.

Primary day is Tuesday, June 27. Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 7.

Will independents emerge?

Washington County has notably few contested races at the county or town level this year.

Mr. Rogers said candidates may still emerge. The window for filing petitions on independent lines, those not affiliated with an established political party, is from May 23 to 30.

The full list of candidates who filed petitions is available on the Board of Elections Website.

savs.

She left to be head baker at a cupcake shop in downtown Saratoga Springs, Bettie's Cakery, which later closed.

"I went back to Hannaford," Jordan says. "To me it wasn't like, Oh, I'm taking

a step back. It was - now I have a chance to really per-fect what I do." She developed a following. "I had peo-



ple coming up to me at Hannaford trying to place private orders. It was like, wait, I'm getting enough clientele here. I have word of mouth that I could probably do this. I could do this as a job."

She launched Baked by Jordan in 2015,

just before her husband, Scott Cleavland, deployed to Iraq. Scott, Glens Falls Class of 2008, was in Iraq for nine months, Jordan says. He's still in the Army Reserve.

Jordan's only assistant is her mother and "best friend" Robyn Weinberger, who wears a Baked By Jordan T-shirt "like a uniform," Jordan says proudly.

Jordan said her mom is the Boat Man-ager at Shoreline in Lake George and her dad Shawn works at Finch Paper.

Jordan, nee Weinberger, is the oldest of five siblings, with four younger brothers, all of whom live in the area.

Jordan now has a daughter herself, with a second daughter due this summer. "I'm realizing, oh my gosh, I don't have to live at a baseball field," she jokes. Jordan grew up around baking.

"For every single birthday, my mom made our birthday cake. And they were the coolest cakes," Jordan said. "And she let me play in the kitchen with her. Being the only girl, that was kind of our thing.' "The rainbow sprinkles, the butter

cream - it was all from watching my mom do it all those years," Jordan adds. Her business has grown organically

through social media and word of mouth. Her first "real big" breakthrough was

her Valentine's Day promo, "which I still offer every year" — a box of a dozen cupcakes. Initially, she did strawberries too, but not anymore — "it's gotten so big." "I had friends and family putting it all over online. And I got so many orders.

knew, okay, she's doing this."

Then Covid disrupted her progress. "My weddings were all canceled," she said. "And it was devastating because I wanted to still be baking."

This led to the Kelly's Roots connection. "Kelly [Ehlert], the owner, and I have been close friends for a while," Jordan said. Over breakfast, she said she raised the idea to Kelly of baking at the cafe.

This will be her fourth summer baking there. She does it two days a week.

Jordan does not book weddings for the following year until 10 a.m. on December 1. "I do a first-text-me type basis. And I'm normally booked on the first day for my entire season," she said.

"Booking too far in advance, it was just too overwhelming. I wanted to be able to solely focus on my brides who are getting married in 2023," she said.

Plus, "it kind of gives everybody who's getting married in 2024 a fair shot at getting me to be their baker."

Jordan said she bakes, on average, 150 cupcakes for a wedding.

"I'm a one person show." she says, first meeting with the brides and grooms to discuss flavors. "I'm also the one that sets up and delivers that day and creates that beautiful display at the venue."

Initially Jordan offered a full menu of cake items, but she now focuses just on cupcakes - with one exception. She often prepares a small traditional cake just for the bride and groom. "Just for them to literally cut into, to get that picture. That picture perfect moment," she laughs.

"It's funny because as the years are going on, I feel like my brides and grooms know Baked by Jordan because of my cupcakes. So instead of getting the cake, they each want a cupcake to just bite into. Because then they can each have their own flavor.'

Jordan has a "list" of why people should choose cupcakes instead of full cakes.

Number one: "A cupcake you can hold in your hands, and you can dance on the dance floor at the same time."

"I love how the cupcake display becomes a main focal point in the room," she adds. "Everybody's talking about the cupcakes, It's less waste.'

"I could go on and on!" she says. Jordan does confess, "I don't like cake.

I've never liked cake." Why bake then? "It's a creative outlet.

Doing something with my hands. And again, it's that attention to detail - that gives me that high," she said.

Personally she says she prefers a "bowl of cookie dough, or a bowl of ice cream." But she also points out that she can fill

her cupcakes with cookie dough. Regular flavors include Funfetti Cookie Dough and Strawberry Shortcake, seasonally; Cherry Limeade, Dirt Pudding.

"They're very animated," Jordan says. "I try to get down to those little details."

Her Neapolitan cupcake "is strawberry, vanilla, chocolate, that piece of the cone, the rainbow sprinkles. It's those details."

Much is at stake: The Best Actor and Best Actress winners go on to the national Jimmy Awards on Broadway in New York City, in June.

Winners will be announced at a **Tony Awards-style glittery tops-and-tails extravaganza at Proctors,** beginning **at 7 p.m. on Saturday night, May 13.**

The energy is through the roof, both sides of the footlights.

On stage: Show-stopping numbers by all nine Best Musical nominees; short solo performances by best actor and best actress nominees; eye-popping opening and closing numbers featuring actors from all 22 participating schools, which also include locally Fort Ann, Whitehall, Schuylerville and Saratoga Springs.

Note: **Hudson Falls**, a perennial winner, was not part of this year's program. The school auditorium is under renovation. Their storied troupe performed a student cabaret at the Strand Theater, rather than a full musical.

Winners give short thank-you speeches, typically heartfelt, sometimes teary.

The extravaganza clips along efficiently, overseen by Proctors chief Phillip Morris and a bevy of adult emcee-presenters.

Our local schools have sent several winners on to the Jimmys, and brought the house down numerous years with winning Best Musical performances. Queensbury's six nominations for

Queensbury's six nominations for Shrek also include Best Ensemble, Best Choreography and Best Set Design. Notably, a student — senior **Kendra Jones** was lead choreographer.

South Glens Falls' *Tuck* was also nominated for Choreography, Set Construction and Technical Execution.

Glens Falls's *Spelling Bee* is also up for Best Ensemble, Choreography, Set Construction and Technical Execution.

Likewise in Queensbury, I'd have liked to see Adam Spero, remarkable as Lord Farquaad, and Avery Magee, feisty as Donkey, receive further recognition.

I'm thrilled we'll get to see all three Best Musical Nominees again, Queensbury reprising "Let Your Freak Flag Fly" from

Please take notice that, on or about April 21, 2023, CHPE LLC and CHPE Properties, Inc. (collectively referred to as "CHPE") intend to submit Environmental Management & Construction Plans ("EM&CPs") for Segments 4 and 5 of the proposed Champlain Hudson Power Express ("CHPE") Project. This EM&CP includes installation of approximately 26.5 miles of buried overland cable running from the Town of Fort Edward (Washington County) through the Town of Milton (Saratoga County), primarily along railroad rights-of-way.

On April 18, 2013, the NYS Public Service Commission (Commission) issued to CHPE a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need (Certificate), pursuant to Article VII of the Public Service Law (PSL), to construct and operate the CHPE Project. The Certificate requires that, prior to construction of any portion of the Project, CHPE submit an EM&CP for review and comment.

In general, construction activities for these Segments are anticipated to commence in the summer of 2023. Where possible, construction will generally occur during daylight hours, though some limited activities would extend to later hours as needed.

The EM&CP provides detailed information regarding how these Segments of the Project will be



constructed, the specific locations of the proposed permanent right-of-way, Construction Zones, and temporary work areas, as well as descriptions of work to be performed, plan and profile drawings depicting the Project, and protocols to be used during construction to protect the community and the environment, and to comply with the CHPE Certificate. The EM&CP must be reviewed and approved by the PSC before construction on these Segments can begin.
