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
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Enrollment grows at SMSA

Enrollment is growing at St. Mary's-St. Alphonsus Regional Catholic School in Glens Falls.

"For next year...we're anticipating 125 (students) for grades K to 8, which is a big

bounce," says Father Scott VanDerveer, pastor of both the school and St. Mary's Church.

From recent low of under 100 students expected

"We're anticipating potentially two kindergartens,

two first grades and a return of eighth grade, all in the same year."

SMSA suspended its eighth grade this year, rather than run with minimal numbers, Father Scott said.

New Principal Patrick Gormley said they aim to grow younger and especially middle school grades, to feed into the lat-

"Ideally," Mr. Gormley says, "at some point in the near future, if we had two classes per grade level, we would be at a point where we would be really thriving. The nadir," or low point, Father Scott

said, was "in the last couple of years," 2020-forward, when K-8 enrollment dropped below 100 students.

He called this "a linear regression

path," adding, "The program would not be able to survive for five years, based on trends. We were not willing to let that happen, especially because we know this school is such a jewel."

"In the whole corridor from Saratoga to Plattsburgh," he said, "educational options dwindle if St. Mary's doesn't thrive, and it's been very clear to us this community wants this to be an option for pre K through middle school.'

'We hear more and more people saying they would love to see us open a **high school**," as its once had, Father Scott said. "I would just say there's enough of an entrepreneurial spirit here that we take note of it. We're not actively moving in that direction, but there is an openness to see if the desire for that could reach a point where it would make sense for our community."

This year's program has 102 students in grades K-7. The breakdown: 21 in Kindergarten, 17 in first grade, 14 in second, 9 in third, 11 in fourth, 10 in fifth, 11 sixth and 9 seventh graders.

They still have a long way to go. The recent high was 238 students, K-8, in **2010.** The last time they had two sections in any grades was 2017, with 196 students — notably long-time principal

SMSA to join some **HF** modified sports teams

Chronicle Managing Editor Cathy DeDe writes: Beginning next year, St. Mary's-St. Alphonsus Regional Catholic School has been approved by New York State's Section II Athletics to partner with the Hudson Falls modi-

fied sports program.

SMSA Principal Patrick Gormley calls such a partnership between a public and private school "unusual."

Offerings are to include girls' and boys' soccer, swimming and basketball among others. Mr. Gormley says.

"It's not a merger," but rather a shortterm plan while they aim to grow their own sports in-house. He noted that even without combining forces, the SMSA girls modified basketball team just finished their season 8-0, against local public schools.

It's part of SMSA efforts to attract students by adding "robust" extracurricular programs, including sports, Mr. Gormley said. Transportation and other details are still to be determined.





Kate Fowler's last year, Father Scott adds. Tuition is \$5,800 for the middle school,

grades 6-8, and \$5,600 for grades K to 5. Next year that will rise by \$200 in both cases, Mr. Gormley said, who adds that

"a lot" of financial aid is available.

Noah's Ark pre-school charges \$215 a week for its full five-day program, which will rise to \$275 a week next year.

Father Scott said the preschool, added

in 1994, shortly after the high school program ended, has become "a cornerstone," with several sections and a waiting list.

Mr. Gormley said, even while looking

to grow the aim is "keeping the classes to a manageable number," something near their current 12-to-one student-teacher ration. "That helps us to promote the idea that smaller classes are better, and that students learn more effectively in a class where they can get more attention from the teacher."

They emphasize "using the community as a classroom," including programs at the Hyde art museum, Chapman Historical Museum and Crandall Library. Father Scott said, while spiritually based,

"We're not a very sectarian religious environment...or proselytizing." He said a third of students are non-Catholic.

They've enhanced sports with afterschool teams in basketball, soccer and track. Mr. Gormley said they aim to add golf and tennis and "hopefully baseball and softball in the future.

Music, art, dance and theater is part of classes and extra curricular activities.

They've brought the lunch program back in-house, with more home-made foods prepared by one professional and many volunteers; enhanced the library program with more volunteers — vetted, Father Scott adds.

out reputation.

"We haven't had anybody killed in here in over 30 years," he liked to tell people.

The bar's logo was a fist punching out of a clamshell. Everything about Sandy's was sort of tongue in cheek, like the "Café Sandu Club Entrance" at the back

door. Joe marveled at what Richie, a Siena College grad,

made of the place. He said to me one day, "Mark, he's making all sorts of changes, but they seem to work."

Rich turned Sandy's Clam Bar into the gathering place, the common ground of Glens Falls. People from every walk of

life gravitated there. It's where you went to see and be seen

Rich booked tons of live bands. The region's nightlife orbited Sandy's. People who might not know anything else about Glens Falls knew about Sandy's Clam Bar, knew it was a hot spot. It was fun!

One July night when you could barely move or hear the person standing next to you, I vividly remember Richie telling me: "No, you can't do business in downtown Glens Falls in the summertime."

Back then, of course, there was no ban on cigarette

smoking. After I met my future wife Sandra in 1987, she mandated that after a night (without her) at Sandy's, my clothes were to go directly to the washing machine before I ventured up the stairs. (Alas, Sandra cut my bar days short.)

My link to Richie went way back.

We grew up around the corner from each other, but I was Glens Falls, he was St. Mary's. I didn't know him until one summer we happened to both take driver's ed in the summertime with Mr. Haag. Sitting in the back seat when it was someone else's turn to drive, you get a sense if you're on the same wavelength. We were.

In those days, we Frosts organized a carnival to

benefit the American Cancer Society in our backyard on the first day of school, which was a half-day, the Wednesday after Labor Day. My mother baked a billion cupcakes. My brother Rich created the carnival. I

turned it into a juggernaut by approaching businesses like Animal Land, which brought a chimp and pony, and Ray's Beverage, the Ward 5 independent, which donated an unbelievable amount of soda



in long-neck returnable bottles in heavy wooden cases. Anyway, it turned out Rich Mozal remembered those carnivals. Decades later he brought it up to me one night at Sandy's Clam Bar. "I want you to know," he said, "I'm still mad at you for not letting me run the pony ride."

Like a lot of stalwart Glens Fallsians, Richie treasured the shared understanding, the well-placed quip.
Last October, my son Zander and I were in Baltimore for the Orioles' first playoff game vs. the Texas Rangers.

Just before first pitch, my cell phone rang.

It was Richie. "Mark, I just want you to know I'm pulling for your Orioles."


He didn't know we were there. We hadn't spoken in many months. But my Orioles and I were on his mind.

Just as Richie — and Sandy's Clam Bar in its heyday
— won't ever stop being on my mind. Thankful for the memories.

needed work. Pretty much every inch of this place needed work."

The previous owner, Hudson Falls Village Attorney William Nikas, who also aided in restoring the building, said it had been full of black mold. "You couldn't walk into this place without being coughing within 10 seconds," he remembered.

So how was such a dramatic transformation achieved, allowing the tavern to open for business on Jan. 3?

'We were here every day for over a year working," Ms. Bender said. "Any relatives we could find, any friends we could find have been working on this."

Ms. Bender's cousin and business partner Alice Huntington added, "We literally started at the rooftop, right down to emptying that basement. I'm just happy to be here finally after all the work we had to put in to get to this point."

Initially, after buying the building five years ago, Ms. Bender sold it and held the mortgage. She said that when payments weren't made, she moved to repossess the building but was delayed because the court system was halted by COVID. "So I kept paying taxes on it and insurance and I wasn't even allowed in it for three years." After that hiccup she simply bought the building back in late 2022.

Ms. Bender and Mrs. Huntington also renovated the upstairs floor that now houses Art with Alice, paint and sip sessions that Mrs. Huntington herself runs. The walls are filled with her paintings.

The adjoining area has offices for Ms. Bender, who works in real estate for Sotheby's. Ms. Bender notes that the upstairs can also be used for private dining if things get too crowded downstairs.

Ms. Bender, a Hudson Falls native, told The Chronicle she's a part of Phoenix Rising, a non-profit attempting to improve the quality of life in the village.

"I bought this building from Bill to be-

come part of the whole revitalization."
Ms. Bender moved to San Francisco at 17, where she was a project manager for 15 years for what is now AT&T. She said when she had her son, she moved back to the area because she wanted to raise him "in a better environment than San Francisco. The schools are better out here.

Mrs. Huntington, also from Hudson Falls, was director of SUNY Adirondack's Workforce Development Institute and



taught special ed at Hudson Falls School District, among other things.

"We work really well together," Ms. Bender said. "We're really close."

Hudson Falls Mayor John Barton and Assemblywoman Carrie Woerner both patronized Falcons soon after it opened.

"What they've done here is fantastic," Mayor Barton said. "The place looks great, it's nostalgic. They're good people, they're friendly. This is going to be very good for Hudson Falls."

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Falcons Brewhouse Bistro and Tavern at 171 Main Street in Hudson Falls has a full bar with beers on tap, plus specialty coffees, teas and other beverages.

The breakfast menu includes bagels, baked goods and breakfast sandwiches. Lunch and dinner fare includes pizza, chicken wings, chili, fettuccine and meatballs, flatbreads and lasagna, among other things. There's also a charcuterie board and nachos. The focus is on light meals instead of heavy.



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

window and a man sitting behind.

"Have you been here before?" an employee painting the mural asked.

I said no. He told me to pick myself out a sticker and bring it to the counter. There were hundreds of stickers on the

counter — some referencing marijuana, others more random, lots of pop culture.

I picked one with a photo of Shaquille O'Neal reacting to — I believe — eating something spicy.

I brought it to the man in the window.

In front of him was a multitude of mariiuana — some four different strains, labelled, with Indica/Sativa and THC per-

Plus pre-rolled joints and bags with faux Mega-Warheads branding. I believe they were gummies.

He asked me what I'd like — do I smoke

flower, do I smoke vapes?

I asked him some questions. He discussed the differences between indica, sativa, hybrids. Some relax you, some make you hyper, he explained. Eventually, I selected a strain called "jealousy."

It cost \$30 cash for an eighth ounce -3.5 grams. They've got an ATM on site.

asked them — you guys can sell this? I was told technically "we're selling you a sticker."

"Most expensive sticker you'll ever purchase," he added.

On my way out, I started chatting with the other staff member.

I asked if he was the owner.

No, he said. In fact, he said, the other employee had never even met the owner. He told me that the previous shop -BMillzz, had been shut down.

He said BMillzz has locations across the state that I could look them up online. This shop has two locations, he said, the other also in Queensbury.

I told him I was with *The Chronicle*.

He was not looking for publicity. "I don't necessarily think you should throw it in The Chronicle," he said. "I don't know if they want that kind of attention." I asked him — do they get hassled? By

law enforcement or otherwise? He said a State Trooper stopped by the

previous week, investigating a nearby break-in.

"We're not their problem until we're made to be their problem," he said.

He said that when New York State formed the Office of Cannabis Management (OCM), it also formed a Cannabis enforcement branch that "overstepped their boundaries...illegal searches and seizures.

He claimed that over 200 cases have reached the Supreme Court.

"Basically, they've been shut down to a point where they can't even sneeze without getting in trouble," he said.

"So if the OCM does decide to go after somebody, they have to call on $t\tilde{h}e$ local municipality. They call in the Sheriff, the State Trooper, the ATF," he said.

"They like to do that whole multiple branch thing so they can step on all the rights," he chuckled.

Is he worried about the place getting raided?

"The worst thing that will happen is

they'll shut this place down," he said. He said that when BMillzz was shut down, "all of the smoke shops started

selling [marijuana]. It's like the hydra effect. Cut off the head, you got nine more." He said he thinks cannabis will ultimately split between people who want the



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Stefanik, Haley, **Gillibrand gain** from pro-Israel political groups

U.S. Rep. Elise Stefanik, R-Schuylerville, has received a campaign finance boost from pro-Israel political groups since the Israel-Hamas War broke out.

They also aided U.S. Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand, D-N.Y., and Republican presidential candidate Nikki Haley.

Campaign contributions pro-Israel political action committees accounted for about 8.7% of the Rep. Stefanik's \$1.89 million in campaign contributions in the fourth quarter of 2023.

The fourth quarter contributions bring the total contributed through the political action committee to Rep. Stefanik's campaign in 2023 to \$146,124.

The PAC committee is bipartisan.

The American Israel Public Affairs Committee, in the fourth quarter, distributed more than 90 individual contributions to Rep. Stefanik's campaign ranging from \$5 to \$6,600 each.

The political action committee distributed \$46,278 to Sen. Gillibrand's reelection campaign in the fourth quarter, according to the PACs finance report.

The Republican Jewish Committee, a separate political action committee, distributed \$19,000 to Rep. Stefanik's campaign in the fourth quarter.

The political action committee also distributed contributions to Mrs. Haley's presidential campaign, as well as to the campaign of former Republican presidential candidate Doug Burgum.

Rep. Stefanik's campaign reported \$1.89 million received in the fourth quarter and \$5.6 million raised in 2023.

She raised \$319,482 in non-itemized contributions of less than \$200 each.

Her small-dollar contributions were more than three times the \$105,825 the campaign received from political action committees. So-called "small dollar" contributions are seen as an indicator of grassroots support.

The campaign had \$2.92 million on hand, as of Dec. 31.

Stefanik is seeking reelection to a sixth

Rep. Stefanik's campaign transferred \$33,850 from her campaign fund to other political campaigns or committees in the fourth quarter, including \$1,000 to the campaign of former Moreau Supervisor Todd Kusnierz, who lost re-election to Democrat Jesse Fish, and \$250 to the campaign of Republican Warren County Clerk candidate Emily McCabe McCar-

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







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☑ Dr. Fritz: Skepticism greets medical advances

I read the initial letter by Mr. Funiciello, and the follow-up letters by my former colleagues Drs. Monn and Leach, with great interest. I write to point out "big picture" concepts that may help your readers understand each position a bit better.

As for Mr. Funiciello's perspective, there is a valuable role for healthy skepticism of scientific breakthroughs. Such a stance challenges the promoting scientist to provide further data that proves

their hypothesis.

The skeptic, however, to be of value, should also be armed with appropriate scientific fact. There is a significant volume of poor science available that misleads the public regarding the efficacy of Ivermectin; at the same time, proof of a new breakthrough takes time — more than we gave it during the pandemic when there was so much unknown and fear of mass death drove early adoption of the vaccines.

Dr. Monn and Dr. Leach's historical perspectives are very valuable in reminding us of what humanity has gone through over the course of development of essentially every significant medical/scientific breakthrough. There have always been deniers. Imagine being a patient when radiation treatments were first proposed? Or antibiotics? Laparoscopic surgery? Robotic surgery? Or, yes, vaccines? It took time, but time has proven the value of these approaches, which are now commonplace tools for a treating clinician, and readily accepted as the norm by most patients.

Dr. Leach is entirely correct that our COVID vaccines are not vaccines in the traditional sense, and I do understand (to a point) the skepticism of some. But I suggest that these COVID vaccines are emblematic of new weapons currently in use to fight diseases. For example, monoclonal antibody-related therapies are now used to treat many diseases, and genetic therapies to treat cancers are in some respects based upon genomic manipulation as was used in the development of COVID vaccines.

Each breakthrough required testing, time to provide proof of concept — as well as time to win over the skeptics among the medical/scientific population, and the population at large.

The COVID vaccines are evidence of another major paradigm shift in medical therapy. I suspect that with time, there will be further refinement and a further gain in efficacy as well as a reduction in side effects. And I guarantee that skepticism will arise with each new advance. Hopefully, informed discourse will lead to the best possible breakthrough and the best understanding of that breakthrough.

As you can see, for a fourth straight week we are publishing letters to the editor about Covid vaccination and

Matt Funiciello: Free speech, bodily autonomy



tion, let's harness our resources and planning efforts to work on the issues we have within our control.

Older workers need to be reskilled to meet the new economy's workforce needs too. Registered Apprenticeship programs can be sponsored by a community college or an industry partner to create a pipeline of skilled workers to retain or attract industry and create economic opportunity for residents who want to live and work here.

Federal funds and bipartisan support for workforce development training have created an open policy window for local governments and community colleges to work together to plan for our economic future. We can prepare for clean energy jobs, reskill workers to meet the everchanging needs of the new economy, and plant seeds for years of economic growth through collaboration.

which large employer may be next.

At the same time, Warren County, the town of Queensbury and soon the City of Glens Falls are all renewing planning efforts through the creation of new

comprehensive plans. Our region must use this inflection point to take a proactive approach to planning for economic development.

When AngioDynamics explained their closure, one of the primary issues CEO Jim Clemmer

highlighted was a workforce shortage saying there were "perpetual vacancies" and difficulty "being able to find people that are willing to come in and be here and live here and grow their families here."

There are many potential reasons that have been proposed for this worker shortage — an aging population, lack of housing, NYS regulations that are unfriendly to businesses and high taxes that drive people away.

There has been far less emphasis on

what resources we already have that can be part of the solution. We have a

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valuable asset in our local community college, which can be a major driver of retaining and recruiting industry through workforce development programs. The college already has successful partnerships with multiple local industry partners.

There is broad bipartisan support for flexible education and training programs of different lengths and delivery methods that put people to work and supply businesses with the employees they need.

Last week, I attended a Community College National Legislative Summit in Washington DC. I listened to Energy Secretary Granholm discuss clean energy jobs and the workforce training needed to fill the more than 400 factories that are opening or expanding throughout the country.

In meetings at the Departments of Labor and Commerce, I heard repeated calls for community partnerships between industry, local government, and community colleges — partnerships that these departments have been funding through multiple economic development grants or programs that emphasize collaboration.

Sitting in these meetings as both a community college trustee and a local government official, I was interested in the difference we would make if we worked together to tackle these issues.

When I asked about examples of successful collaborations, a representative from the Department of Commerce told me about a microelectronics bootcamp in Nashua, NH.

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The municipality and a local manufacturing business had partnered to seek CHIPs act funding to launch a bootcamp at their local community college and had been able to expand company operations and increase their workforce. In addition, the program had created social mobility for students who could graduate with good paying jobs.

It's true that we need housing at all levels, but building housing needs to be part of a larger plan.


In some cases, Municipal contribu-

tions to Federal grant applications can come in the form of zoning changes that make it possible to create more housing.

We could, for example, work with an industry partner that wants to expand or relocate operations here and discuss building a workforce training program around their needs and a housing plan that includes zoning updates.

Instead of railing against NYS policies that we are unlikely to change at the local level or lamenting our aging popula-
