Diana Palmer, the Ward Three councilwoman challenging Mayor Bill Collins in the June 24 Democratic primary, is out-raising the mayor by a 3-1 margin, according to new campaign finance reports the candidates filed with the state Board of Elections on May 23.

Councilwoman Palmer raised \$28,917 over roughly four months, bringing her campaign fund-raising total to **\$34,442** so far in the election cycle, as of May 19.

Mayor Collins raised \$10,620 over roughly four months, his total so far in the election cycle, as of May 19.

Mayor Collins draws most from relatives and his inner circle. Councilwoman Palmer drew heavily from Democratic politicians and labor unions.
